'Conflict Minerals and the International Response'

Gave an update on the effort to establish a legal framework for multi-national companies to work in areas of weak governance. There is a growing recognition for the need to prevent natural resources from being used to fund conflict, militias or rebellions. This is coupled with the UN initiative to establish guiding principles for multinational companies to confirm standards of human rights within their supply chains. The role of a National Contact Point for these issues is in its infancy but has a significant future.

Mulumba Kabongo: UPF member from the DRC

Mulumba emphasised the need for sacrificing for the other as a basis for development in DRC. That includes sacrificing for the sake of the nation and for the good of the future. He also explained that without God there could not be long term healing and peacebuilding. He explained that prayer was very important for finding the way forward.
