

## CARP Hawaii Takes on the Big Island with our first-ever Kona retreat

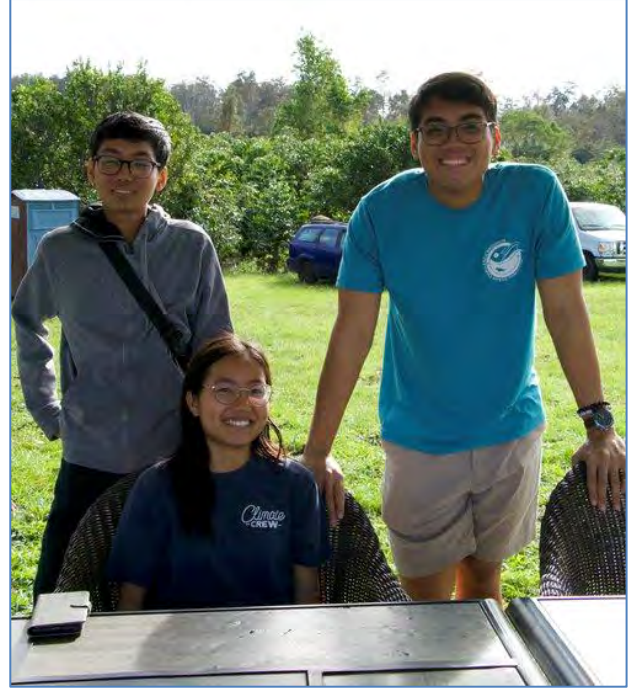
