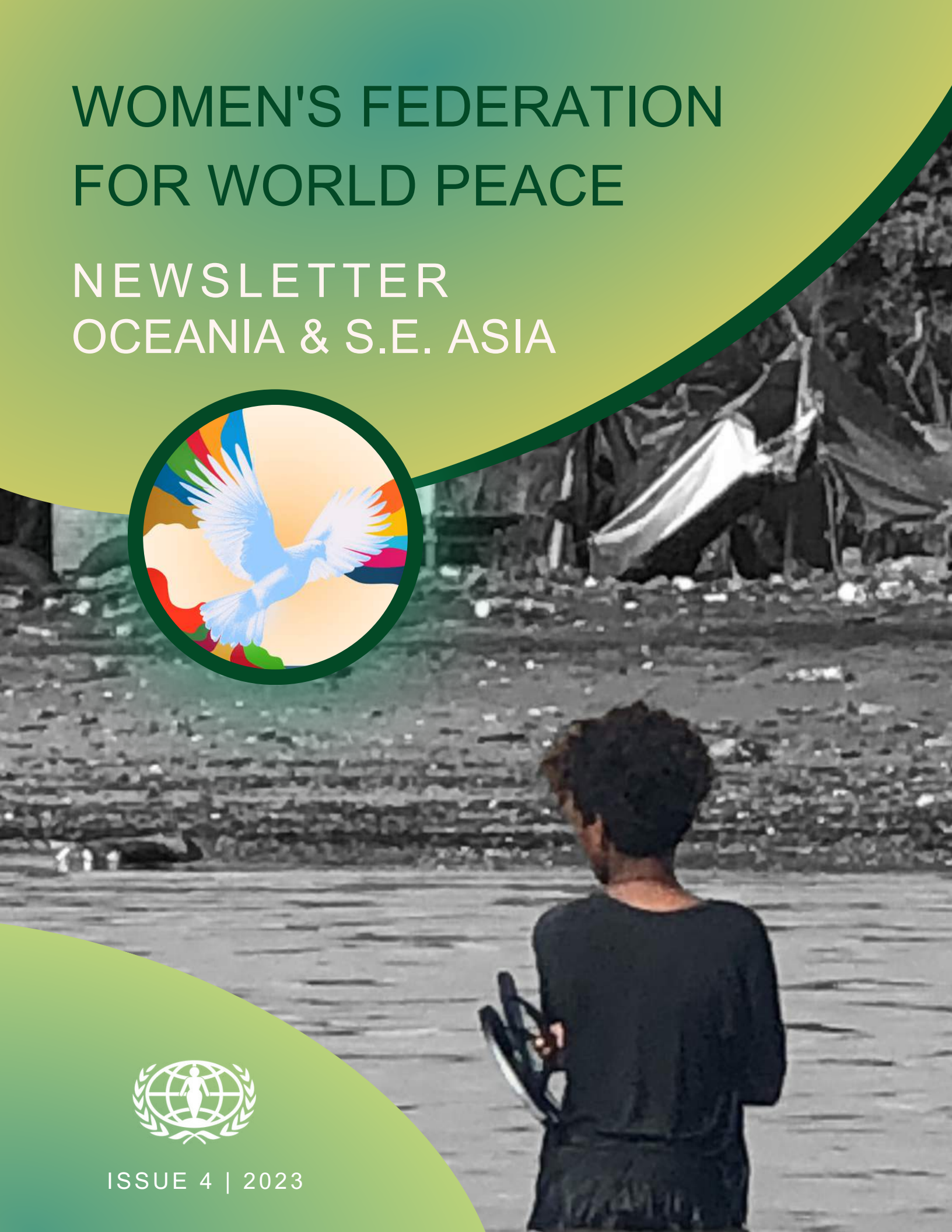

United Nations Day of Peace 2023 A Headwing Approach to Reconciliation

OVERVIEW

- THE 2023 UNITED NATIONS DAY OF PEACE THEME IS “ACTIONS FOR PEACE: OUR AMBITION FOR THE #GLOBALGOALS”.
- WITHIN THE AUSTRALIA CONTEXT, THE UN GOAL OF PEACE, JUSTICE, AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS WAS SEEN AS PARTICULARLY RELEVANT BECAUSE AUSTRALIA WILL BE VOTING YES OR NO IN OCTOBER THROUGH A REFERENDUM ABOUT INCLUDING WITHIN THE AUSTRALIAN CONSTITUTION AN ABORIGINAL VOICE TO PARLIAMENT.



UPF Australia (UPF), Women's Federation for World Peace Australia (WFWP) and Family Federation for World Peace Australia (FFWP) decided that it was appropriate to address issues surrounding reconciliation and justice during this annual Peace Day conference. Recognising the cultural heritage of Australia's First Nations peoples in the Constitution was seen as an important step.



It was also recognised that there is a need for distributive justice due to the ongoing disadvantages faced by our fellow Australian Indigenous citizens. Conference speakers shared their views about how Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Australians can talk, walk, and work together to make this ancient culture an integral expression of Australia's nationhood for the benefit of all.



The spirit of the event was Headwing – A Common Humanity Identity Approach to peacebuilding that was proposed by Dr Moon in 1986, co-founder of UPF, WFWP, and FFWPU. 50 people from four states took part in the blended face-to-face and online conference. Masters of Ceremony were Tua Manase-Ale, President of WFWP Samoa and VIC Advisory Committee member of WFWP Victoria and Will Abdo, who is Assistant to the President of UPF Victoria.



The conference was co-sponsored by the Centre for Global Nonkilling, the Australia Arab Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Global Opportunities Commercialisation, and the Global Somali Diaspora.

EDUCATING WITH VALUES REPORT

Launched at the conference, the Values Report is a Holistic Approach to integrating Values in Education. This report will now be distributed widely to politicians and decision makers.

The Values Report represents the contributions of Australian and International presenters during summits undertaken in 2021-22. This report is unique because contributors came from a broad spectrum of society in the fields of academia, primary, secondary, and tertiary education, as well as the community and business sectors.

PRESENTERS



YUTAKA YAMADA

Introductory remarks were given by Rev Yutaka Yamada, Chair of UPF Oceania. He encouraged participants to learn from Dr Moon’s Headwing thoughts and reflect on how peace can best be achieved in Australia. Before his appointment as the chairman of Universal Peace Federation Oceania, Rev. Yutaka served in various roles promoting peace building. He was President of UPF Malaysia, Director of the Youth Leadership Program in 10 nations throughout Asia and served as a Youth

Leader in Korea. Rev Yutaka Yamada has widely travelled around the world and trained thousands of youths. In 2014, he received his master’s degree in theology from Sun Moon University, Korea.

PEARL WYMARRA



Ms. Pearl Wymarra is from the Gudang Aboriginal Clan. She holds a master's degree in health science (Primary Health Care), a Diploma in Primary Teaching, and soon to graduate with a Diploma of Theology from Charles Sturt University. Pearl is an Honorary Fellow at the University of Western Sydney and an Ambassador for Peace with UPF.

Speaking on the topic of “Restoring Good and Proper Cultural Ways of Love, Joy and Peace”, Pearl shared about the values she inherited from her family as a

modelled way to achieve harmony through being loving and respectful to all. She shared her very personal story of how her son committed suicide after being bullied. She urged us to create a culture of respect, not one of name calling.

Pearl's life is an example of service, healing, and reconciliation. For many years she provided leadership by addressing the crisis of violence experienced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families. She is a distinguished teacher and researcher in the restoration of people's emotional health and social well-being.

DR JOHN BELLAVANCE



Dr John Bellavance spoke on the topic “Headwing – A Common-Humanity Identity Approach to Peacebuilding”. Dr Moon said 30 years ago, “that neither left-wing ideology, nor right-wing ideology will work. We need a movement through which a new advanced right-wing type can be supported by the left-wing, and a new advanced left-wing type that can be supported by the right-wing.”

Such a Headwing approach is truly needed in our social climate of increasing polarisation. The common-enemy identity that we see in politics, mainstream media,

and social media tries to unite a coalition using the psychology of us versus them to promote their cause and get attention. This causes the public to lose a sense of the values we share and binds us as people.

A common-humanity identity, a Headwing approach, seeks to find common ground based on shared spiritual and moral values. John reflected on “What if the Yes and No sides got together to find a way forward?” This question has not been raised in the Australian media. Rather, polarisation has occurred over the constitutional changes being proposed through the ‘Voice to Parliament’ referendum. The long-term benefits of the Aboriginal Voice to Parliament cannot be achieved through political processes alone, but must involve a commitment to truth, shared values, and personal change.



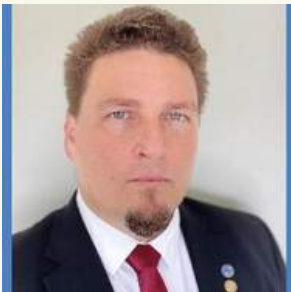
SOPHIE YORK



Sophie York is a speaker, writer, and a barrister, who in recent years has been working as a university lecturer at the Sydney University and the University of Notre Dame. Sophie is also a Naval Legal Officer in the Reserves. She was National Spokeswoman for Marriage Alliance for 3 years.

Sophie spoke on the topic of 'Australia the Lucky Country - united in making respectful room for each other!' With her extensive experience as a professor of law ethics, Sophie raised concerns about rushing through constitutional change without knowing the full details of how these proposed constitutional changes will work out. She argued that we all agree that better outcomes are needed for Indigenous Australians, but not at the expense of future peace, national unity, and equality with all fellow Australians. She pointed out that what is being proposed via change in our Constitution through the upcoming referendum requires further examination for us to forge the way forward to reconciliation and unity.

PASTOR DANIEL MEADOWS




Pastor Daniel Meadows is the Victorian Director of FFWPU Australia and has been involved in the Not-for-profit sector for 15 years. During this time, Pastor Daniel has directed several youth organisations such as the Oceania Leadership Team, and Youth and Students for Peace. Daniel is the founder and Director of Camp Belgrave and is undertaking a master's degree in Peace Studies. Together with his wife Chizuru, they are raising a family of 5 children, with a sixth child expected this year.

Daniel spoke on the Topic: "Peace Begins in My family". He reflected on the topic of Headwing and how this applies to family values. He asked "how can we raise wiser children who will not fall prey to the untruth of us versus them and the self-righteous 'call-out' culture it breeds. How can we foster a way of thinking about a common- humanity?" Daniel shared that when children fight in the family, the parents love and values come in to reconcile the conflict. Just as parental values bring harmony, the broader society should also reflect such values and practices.

MOHAMED MOHIDEEN OAM



Mohamed Mohideen OAM, is a Victorian Multicultural Commissioner and is also Chair of the VMC Regional Advisory Committee for Gippsland. As a microbiologist by profession with over 30 years' experience in the field, Mohamed is a Professional Member of the Australian Society for Microbiology. He was an academic at Monash University's Department of Microbiology for over 20 years, and from March 2021 to June 2022, was Head of Priority Communities and Engagement for the COVID-19 Vaccination Response at the Department of Health. Mohamed also sits on the Victorian Department of Health CALD Advisory Group.



Mohamed spoke on “The Need for all Australians to engage with 1st Nations People and make an informed decision on the referendum.” Mohamed shared his values as Muslim. Whenever a Muslim visits another persons’ home, it is the custom to acknowledge the owners of the home with a greeting of peace. He argued that recognising the traditional owners in the constitution was an important step towards reconciliation and a no brainer for Muslims.

NEW HOPE ACADEMY GRADUATION AND AWARDS ASSEMBLY

Anne had the blessing to attend and speak briefly with students during the New Hope Academy (NHA) 2023 Awards and Graduation assembly held on October 26th. All the schools, colleges, and universities throughout the SI ended their academic year early due to preparations for the Pacific Games, hosted by the Solomon Islands.

A VIP from the Department of Education was in attendance, as were parents of students in both the primary and secondary school departments. The SI Peace Embassy assembly hall was brightly decorated and full of excited students and proud parents.



All graduating Year 6 students received Primary School completion certificates. Within the Pacific Islands, some students are unable to continue with their education. Some NHA graduates move into Year 7 at NHA, while remaining graduates move to other secondary schools.

The highlights of the assembly were the academic awards and class dance and singing performances. Parents crowded the stage to take videos of the Tong Il Moo Do martial arts performance with the instructor and students. Students who attend this after school co-curricular activity also received their new belt colours.



NB: Some of the top athletes from the South and West Pacific region will be in action from November 19th to December 2nd, 2023. The Games bring together sports athletes from many countries and territories in the area, plus invitational teams from Australia and New Zealand.

SI CHAPTER MEETINGS



From October 27-29, WFWP SI members gathered to share their progress and discuss future activities. Updates to the SI Constitution was addressed and the Annual General Meeting was conducted. A big addition was the introduction of WFWP membership fees that can be used to conduct future activities. There was an encouraging push to welcome SI women leaders as Global Friends, set up the Global Women's Peace Network and introduce environment initiatives.

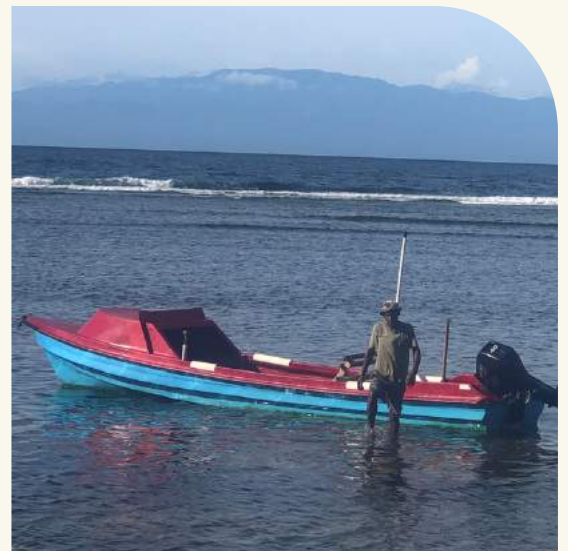
On the final day of meetings, Anne worked with the new leadership team to answer questions, share development ideas and general capacity building for the team. Afterwards, we all went out for lunch, sponsored by WFWP Australia.

VISIT TO CENTRAL ISLANDS PROVINCE

Travelling by banana boat to the neighbouring Central Islands Province, Anne accompanied Monica and Judith's family to Monica's ancestral Village of Longapolo, located on the south-east end of the main island.

Children, adults and produces purchased from Honiara, travelled the two-hour open sea. It was an experience never to forget!

For the next two days, travelling with as many children who could fit in the banana boat, we visited many small uninhabited islands to swim, snorkel, and picnic.





The stark reality is the presence of washed-up plastics and garbage that travel across the ocean to all the shores in the Pacific Islands.



Village families are custodians of nearby uninhabited islands. These pictures are taken from Mandoleana Island. On an annual basis, villagers travel across the open sea to conduct beach clean-ups. On a monthly basis, Longapolo Village residents clean their beach foreshore, but the garbage continues to wash in, especially during storms. Collected garbage is placed in dug out holes.

Ever wondered where our garbage ends up? It travels to the Pacific Islands' beautiful beaches, now permanently littered with our thoughtless waste!

WASTE IN THE CAPITAL CITY OF HONIARA

On the waterfront of Honiara where the Matanikau River reaches the sea, garbage is everywhere! At the site where travelling banana boats dock from neighbouring islands, directly on the shore of downtown shops, is washed up garbage from the sea. Local waste flows down the river due to Honiara residents using the river as a dump. Clearly, a lack of awareness and education about plastic pollution is necessary. WFWP SI will be conducting education and clean up campaigns to help address this pressing issue.

With the heart to support the developing P-12 New Hope Academy in the Solomon Islands, WFWP Australia reached out to organisations and businesses within Australia to donate staff laptops. Most businesses and schools upgrade their staff laptops every two years. If these laptops can be serviced and donated to not-for-profit charities, such as WFWP Australia,

they can be shipped to institutions in the Pacific Islands that are in desperate need of this technology.

In 2023, New Hope Academy begins secondary school classes with its first intake of Year 7 students. With WFWP Australia's donation of sewing machines this year, the Academy



opened the Technology Department. The secondary campus also aims to establish IT as a Technology subject and are seeking good quality, second-hand laptops and computers for this purpose.

WFWP Queensland conducted their second official event at Mantra on Queen Hotel, Brisbane. Each esteemed speaker discussed topics relating to women's empowerment, leadership and life skills, resilience and how the values of sportsmanship enabled them to build holistic and healthy practices in their lives. This event also sought to educate and inform participants how sporting practices can assist them in developing clarity in the mind, body and soul, in order to achieve their life potential.



During the event, one of the Indigenous Australian speakers, Yvonne Orley, also shared her unique story about her tribe and the importance of the Voice referendum to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. The Voice

was a proposed federal advisory body created by the parliament. Australians voted on the Voice on October 14th, 2023. Dr Yejeong Kim De Geer concluded the heart-warming and empowering event by sharing the visions by Dr Hak Ja Moon and how WFWP was first created. All attendees were feeling moved and grateful, acknowledging that hope and love exist within all of us, as ambassadors for world peace and cultural diversity.

A massive thank you to Nadia Anand, secretary of WFWP Queensland, who put her heart into organising this event. We are profoundly appreciative of all her efforts and hard work. The event was also generously supported by the Foot and Ankle Experts Health Clinic. \$1500 of



its funding contributed to the location rent and catering services.

As a result of this event, three participants pledged to become WFWP Queensland members. Dr Catherine Norton signed up as a diamond WFWP member, donating \$600 a week later after the event finished. All attendees showed interest in attending the next WFWP forum. It was inspiring to have at least 85% of the guests in their early 20's and 30's. There were many men in attendance to support their partners. Committee members will soon be organising another forum in a few months' time.

PRESENTERS



DR CATHERINE NORTON

Dr Catherine Norton was nominated as the next Global Women's Peace Network ambassador by Dr Yejeong Kim De Geer. Dr Norton shared her comprehensive stories about the 7's that empowered her to transform into a successful business woman. She is a strong advocate for women rights. In the past, she travelled to South Korea to visit SookMyung University in regards to empowering women's rights and preventing burnout for working mothers.



AMELIA JACKSON

Amelia Jackson is a former two-time national champion in figure skating who represented Australia in the 2014 Winter Olympics. Amelia talked about her professional life experiences as an athlete after retirement, and how she managed to reframe her expectations being a double degree student in law and journalism. She discussed her experiences staying at the Athlete's village in Russia when she injured her ankle. Amelia emphasised how privileged we are living in Australia with

access to high quality medical staff and technologies. She also shared her passion of becoming a news anchor in the future, encouraging others to always dream big



COURTNEY SIPPEL

Courtney Sippel is a current Queenslander and Cricket player from the Brisbane Heat. She could not attend the event in person due to sickness. During the event, WFWP Queensland Secretary, Nadia Anand, presented on Courtney Sippel's behalf. Courtney comes from a very remote town in Queensland called Moffatdale. In her high school, she was one of the only 16 students attending. She was always self-driven and passionate about achieving her life goals. She pushed herself to be

better, participating in many programs to improve her skills. Courtney remembers the day when she was selected as a future state cricket player by Brett Jones. She always dreamed of playing for Australia. Courtney played men's cricket in Murgon and bowled to professional male athletes, always holding her own ground. She always wanted to be at the top of her game and that drive simmered down when she joined the state cricket team. She stopped training, as there were more mature players whom she thought deserved more attention. Later, she realised that she wasn't fully committed to her dream. She nearly quit her dream because she struggled with her team mates because she didn't know how to communicate with them. Cricket is a team sport - if you don't have good communication skills, the team does not function well. Courtney taught us about how she overcame her personal and professional struggles, and how she regained her path to move closer to her dreams.



ANGEL CENIA LINDING

Angel Cenía Linding is a Fitness and Holistic Health Coach and Personal Trainer. As a Holistic therapy and counselling student, Angel shared her chronic condition which hindered her from living an ordinary life. She was abandoned by her mother due to her mental health issues at the age of 6, which caused her to develop an auto-immune disorder that affects her blood pressure regulation system. Her cardiologist informed her that she will not be able to exercise for more than 30

minutes. It is likely that exercise is the very last thing which helps extend her life span. However, she challenged the prognosis and became a personal trainer. She found strength within herself to control her sympathetic nerve system. Angel shared her advice with everyone who was in the conference room on how to overcome mental barriers. Many of the participants were moved and comforted by her story, shedding tears after Angel finished presenting.



YVONNE ORLEY

Yvonne Orley is an Indigenous Australian elder and business woman who is active in the field of Indigenous rights, disability, health and environment awareness. She shared her life experiences and ways of contributing to world peace our multicultural society. She shared stories about her childhood, as well as her passion for Indigenous culture and people as a First Nation citizen. Yvonne shared her perspectives about the global climate crisis and violence, including the events occurring in Ukraine.

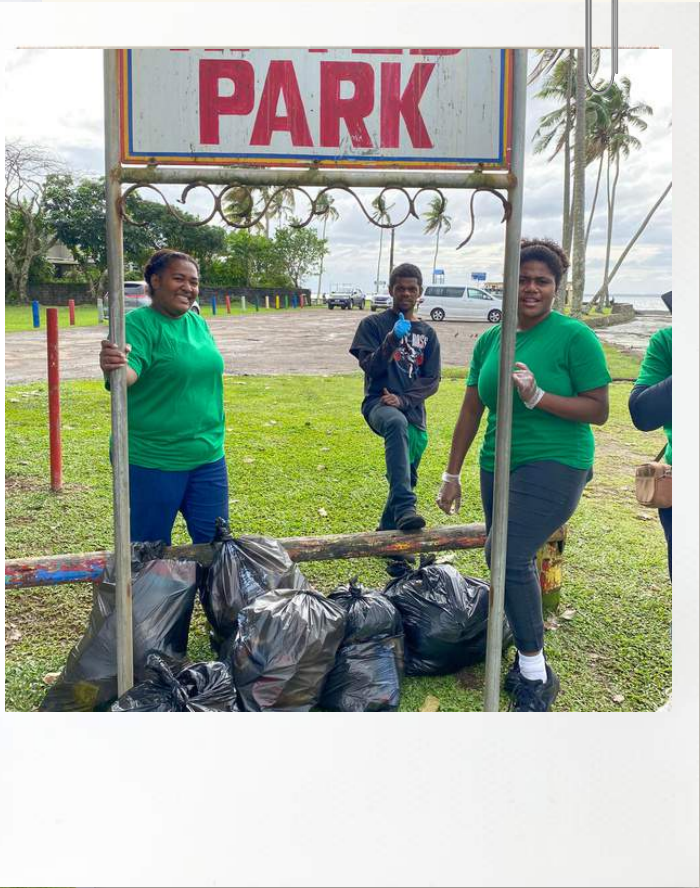

UN International Day of the Girl Child

October 11 | Suva, Fiji

OVERVIEW

- WFPW FIJI CELEBRATED THE UN INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL CHILD AT NASINU SECONDARY SCHOOL IN SUVA.
- PARTICIPANTS OF THE PROGRAM CONSISTED OF 350 FEMALE STUDENTS, 16 FEMALE TEACHERS, 3 OFFICIALS FROM MINISTRY OF HEALTH FIJI, A COUNSELLOR AND WFPW FIJI MEMBERS.



This event aimed to build awareness about women rights to access equal opportunities, the challenges they might face, and the supportive environment they would like to build in the future. In many developing countries, girls lack the knowledge, support and resources (sanitary materials and facilities), to manage their menstruation with confidence. In some areas of Fiji, there is still a lack of information regarding menstrual hygiene management. Young women continue to face unprecedented challenges to their education, their physical and mental wellness, and the protection needed for live healthy lives.



This event aimed to build awareness about women rights to access equal opportunities, the challenges they might face, and the supportive environment they would like to build in the future. In many developing countries, girls lack the knowledge, support and resources (sanitary materials and facilities), to manage their menstruation with confidence. In some areas of Fiji, there is still a lack of information regarding menstrual hygiene management. Young women continue to face unprecedented challenges to their education, their physical and mental wellness, and the protection needed for live healthy lives.





Our annual event united hundreds of female students from Nabua Secondary School in Mead Road, Suva. The school has an enrolment of about 700 students, with around 350 female students. The school roll includes mostly iTaukei students and 11 from other culturally diverse backgrounds. The knowledge base program also included distribution of menstrual kits in the school.



The WFP Fiji President spoke about the goals of the organization and the purpose of attending at such an important event. Afterwards, the Ministry of Health shared a detailed presentation on reproductive health and hygiene. The Counsellor also imparted some words of wisdom. There were two doctors and a medical officer acting as representatives from the Government's Ministry of Health. Mrs Letila Sandys was the counsellor presenting the knowledge-based program. We concluded the program with distribution of sanitary pads and a fabulous photo shoot.

The 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development embodies a roadmap for progress that is sustainable and leaves no one behind. These goals depend on achieving gender equality and women empowerment. We can achieve justice and inclusion and preserve our shared environment by safeguarding the rights of women and girls across all the goals. This project was a fantastic opportunity in achieving this. It is obvious that in the last decade, there has been an increased awareness on women issues. Nevertheless,

investments in women rights remain limited and they continue to confront a myriad of challenges to fulfilling their potential.

This program not only addresses health and well-being practices, but to also inform, educate, and empower young women. Many students shared how this event was the first time they had celebrated the UN International Day of Girl Child. It also gave them life-changing opportunities to learn about holistic self-care practices.

Authentic Encounters Communication Skills Workshop

The goal of this exciting workshop was to empower and educate youth to develop effective communication skills and engage authentically with others. There were a total number of 20 participants, including 6 WFPW members and 14 guests. The workshop aimed to help attendees discover their inner qualities, build self-confidence skills, and improve their ability to communicate, both in public and personal settings. In her opening remarks, WFPW Malaysia President Madam Lina Cheng highlighted the importance of personal development and growth while encouraging young students to be proactive in their learning journey.



The main presenter and facilitator of the workshop, Madam Annie Ling, is a certified educator with Personality and Human Relations International (PRH). She is a Certified Professional Trainer by the International Professional Manager Association, United Kingdom. Madam Annie Ling led the participants in an interactive and informative session. The workshop covered topics about personal development, self-improvement, and the importance of effective communication in building positive relationships. It emphasizes the concept of encountering others authentically, utilizing one's inner strengths, and fostering inner qualities such as kindness, empathy, and understanding.



Participants were divided into pairs and engaged in role-play conversations. Afterwards, they were asked to share how they felt during their conversations. Some participants stated that they were nervous while conversing with strangers. Others were excited about the prospect of making new friends. Madam Annie Ling guided participants to discover and identify their positive qualities and strengths to communicate effectively and confidently.





This successful workshop provided a valuable platform for youth to improve their communication abilities, encourage personal development, resilience, and the importance of cultivating love and patience in effective communication practices.

This program has now aided 200 disadvantaged students with educational and financial assistance. Students were given refurbished laptops and funds to support their tertiary education. In today's digital age, access to modern technology for educational purposes is crucial to the success of future generations. This program ensures that all students can participate equally using online learning and educational platforms.



This program also supported students' health and well-being while pursuing tertiary education. Underprivileged families and their children may lack access to necessary resources for their education, affecting their learning outcomes. By supplying essential food items, the initiative ensures that families also have access to basic needs. The groceries giveaway was held in conjunction with the Deepavali festive season, a cultural celebration of the Hindu community.

All students received grocery packs at the event held in Teluk Panglima Garang Tamil Primary School, Selangor. The program also provided the community by presenting a public lecture and encouraging attendees to participate in further community and social services.

- THIS HEALTHCARE MISSION WAS CRUCIAL IN RAISING AWARENESS ABOUT THE QUALITY OF CARE MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES PROVIDED IN OUR LIVES. THE EVENT ENCOURAGED LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY MEMBERS TO SUPPORT OTHERS IN NEED.



The Medical Mission addressed the significant challenges in relation to the lack of access to essential healthcare and dental services provided in underrepresented communities. This event aimed to overcome these barriers. Collaboration between partnering organisations exemplified the power of unity by creating a positive impact on communities' health, well-being, and relationships.

This project was organised by the WFWP's senior adviser and former President, Madam Minerva de Leon, the current WFWP President, Mrs. Almera Grace Mayo, and the Family Federation for World Peace Philippines (FFWPU) National Leader, Rev. Leo Angelo Halog.

In many regions of the Philippines, there is a lack of access to quality and affordable medical and dental services. This event provided free medical consultations, dental extractions, and various ECG and laboratory screening procedures, to over 200 community members.

Healthcare services began at 7am and concluded at 5pm. Several established medical and dental volunteer organisations, including the Asian Mobile Medical Service (AMMS), HOG Manila Chapter Ph., Inc., DZRH-VOLTRACOM, and Pilipinas Ngayon Emergency and Rescue Unit (PNERU), joined forces with TRMPC as local representatives in support of this mission.





The TRMPC was led by Dr. Liu Chi-Chun, who arrived in Manila on October 4th and departed on October 5th, before heading to Pagadian City, Zamboanga Del Sur, for a three-day medical and dental mission hosted by Governor Yu. TRMPC returned to Manila on October 9th for the final phase of their project scheduled for October 10th, in Quezon City, Metro Manila, hosted by WFWP. After a delicious feast with Ambassador Wallace M.G. Chow of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO), TRMPC returned to Taiwan on October 11th.



The medical mission concluded with a presentation program and dinner hosted for both international and local counterparts. All attendees expressed their heartfelt gratitude and enthusiasm to participating in future medical and dental missions. The collaborative efforts between WFWP, local medical organisations, and TRMPC in organizing the mission was a resounding success. The dedication and hard work of all those involved, including the leaders and volunteers, were truly commendable

individuals but also fostered a sense of gratitude and a shared vision for future endeavours. It serves as a testament to the potential for positive change that can be achieved when organizations and individuals unite with a common purpose. The success of this mission serves as an inspiration. More importantly, this event established a strengthened bond between diverse nations, reaffirming the importance of international cooperation in advancing the cause of health and well-being for all humanity.
