Run for Your Life

God is about to destroy Southern California for its sinfulness. Driven by this conviction, nearly 600 members of half a douzen pentecostal churches in the Golden State are pulling up stakes and getting out before the holocaust.

The inspiration for the exodus comes from the Rev. Donald Abernathy of the Apostolic Gospel Church of Bell Gardens, a Los Angeles suburb. Last spring he had a series of visions that convinced him that the Los Angeles area would soon be torn apart by an earthquake. In his graphic revelations, Abernathy said, "buildings crumbled, freeways buckled, water gushed up from cracks in the ground and volcances erupted in the nearby mountains. Then the destruction moved north toward San Francisco." In two subsequent visions, Abernathy saw an airplane ticket stamped with the word "Atlanta." Taking this as divine direction, he led 180 members of his congregation on a migration to Atlanta last month. They traveled not by airplane, however, but in cars with trailers.

Before leaving California, Abernathy repeated his vision to several other pentecostal congregations. Most of them, too, have decided to move....Theobold, who claims to have received mystical confirmation of Abernathy's vision, believes that the earthquakes "will leave Southern California like Sodom and Gomorrah before the end of 1970." Theobold says that his flock will leave before Oct. 12, "the deadline given me by God for departure."

While there are personal hardships involved, members of the emigrating churches are convinced that they are obeying God's will in leaving their homes and jobs. They also believe that Southern California has only itself to blame for the imminent disaster. Pastor Theobold despairingly cites "the amount of wickedness here: Hollywood, big business, prosperity, homosexuality, topless places." If the horrible event happens, seismologists will not be surprised. They have repeatedly warned that, because of the stresses along the San Andreas fault extending through the state, California is overdue for a disastrous earthquake.

Visions Prompt 5 Churches to Leave Los Angeles Area by John Dart

LOS ANGELES, -- Predicting a disastrous earthquake for California, four pastors and their congregations have moved to other parts of the country and a fifth church is in the process of leaving.

More than 300 persons have left the state, following instructions their pastors said they "Received from the Lord."

The exodus all began last June when the Rev. Don Abernathy, 28-year-old pastor of the Apostolic Gospel Church in Bell Gardens, a Los Angeles suburb, felt he had convincing evidence that he and his 150-member congregation should go to Atlanta.

The Rev. Mr. Abernathy, contacted by telephone at his Atlanta home, said his visions of Los Angeles showed "buildings crumbling, the earth shaking underneath and the water rushing in."

Before he left the Los Angeles area, he said he attempted to talk to ministers and other churches about his visions. "We've done our best to warn the people of the disaster to come," he said.

Only about 20 members of the Bell Gardens congregation-which completed building its large church only two years ago-are remaining.

In the case of Mrs. Boneta Whiles and Cordelia Carpenter, for instance, they are still trying to sell their house trailers. Everyone from the Bell Gardens church plans to go, they said.

The visions of disaster seen by the Rev. Mr. Abernathy, who was described by Mrs. Whiles as "a real prophet of God," came to the attention of other congregations in a fellowship of seven independent churches in California.

Since then pastors of three of those churches received the word themselves. The result:

The Rev. Mr. Abernathy's 32-year-old brother, Noland, took his congregation of more than 100 members to Kennett, Mo., from their church in Avenal about 50 miles southwest of Fresno.

The Rev. D. W. Porter of Porterville, who started his church of less than 50 members a year ago, took all or most of his flock to Independence, Mo. The pastor of a small church in Lompoc, the Rev. Troy Perkey, joined the Rev. Mr. Abernathy in Atlanta.

The Rev. Robert J. Theobold, 28, pastor of the Friendly Bible Apostolic Church at Port Hueneme, said he will lead a series of motorcades from that coastal community and nearby Oxnard on or before Oct. 12, "the deadline given me by God for departure."

The Rev. Mr. Theobold said his congregation of 15 families, totaling 90 men, women and children, are preparing to settle in Murfreesboro, Tenn.
