"God, Women and Our Changing Times"

When women take responsibility to come together in godly leadership, good things truly happen. A feeling of warmth, wisdom and action characterized the Women's Federation for World Peace seminar on "God, Women and Our Changing Times," held January 22 at the WFWP headquarters in Manhattan. The women who created the seminar and the participants who attended all contributed to the sincere and heart-felt consideration of these important issues: how do we, as women, relate to God, women and our changing times?

National WFWP president, Nora Spurgin, opened the seminar with an insightful look at our new age, the age of femininity and healing. She spoke about a change of spirituality coming with the new millennium and the need for women to give of their gifts in marriage, family and community leadership. Commenting on the divisiveness of the ultra-radical women's movement of the past, Mrs. Spurgin affirmed that WFWP emphasizes the goal of harmony together with men.

Debby Gullery gave the first presentation on the essence of God, expressing God's maternal and paternal origins and nature. Unlike a secular women's plat-

form, her discussion clearly situated women's source of meaning and spirituality in God and added an explanation of our purpose in life, the stages of growth, and spiritual development. Mrs. Spurgin ended this session with a discussion on the spirit world, referring to Raymond Moody's classic book, *Life after Life*. In researching this topic, Mrs. Spurgin also works as a therapist with the elderly.

Betsy Jones, a psychotherapist in Albany, New York, gave the second session on the cause of human conflict. After discussing the misuse of love, sin, the results of the fall, and the immorality in present society, she showed the videotape "Lethal Risk."

Sandra Lowen, a psychotherapist working with adolescents, presented the third session on the struggle between good and evil. Describing the restoration principle in history, she emphasized that a person's attitude and willingness to make amends determines the outcome of his or her circumstances. Both Mrs. Spurgin and Mrs. Jones led the final session on the restoration of the family, presenting True Parents as the prototype of the Completed Testament age.

In my opinion, this WFWP seminar was an excellent model for future seminars and can be modified for specific audiences. Various religious groups are honoring the family in today's world as the center of values, spirituality and blessing. In India, Mother Theresa is sanctifying families. The Catholic ministry views marriage as a sacrament to restore the world to true love. The family rosary ceremony calls the blessing of God's love to enter each family's home. According to Unification Theology, the call to join a larger family, True Parents' family, is the central call of our providential age. Mrs. Spurgin's message was embracing and evangelical. "We are all invited to be part of the adopted family of True Parents."

At the seminar conclusion, Karen Smith described the action-oriented plan of Operation Heal Our Nation, a WFWP organization which encourages community involvement in family and social concerns from women nationwide.

Breaking Barriers

In October 1993, the Belvedere community came together around a truck of oranges, WFWP's fundraising product used to make an offering to the Irvington school district. Many parents of blessed children in, or soon to enter, the Irvington school district felt the need to become a viable part of the community through some kind of service and offering.

The fundraising effort, easily pulled together by men and women who have been trained in mobilization and teamwork, resulted in a donation of around \$4000 to the school district.

On January 28, eight WFWP members and seven key local women community leaders gathered at the Belvedere main house for coffee and cake,

The opening of the historic Belvedere main house to these local women enabled them to see beyond the myths of the Moonies and experience something of the spirit of True Parents. The atmosphere had elements of beauty, peace, professionalism, harmony, and most essentially, spirituality. When Phyllis Kim offered her apologies for being part of past misunderstandings that have arisen in the community, her initiative of humility brought the previously pleasant discussion to a new level of sincere, heartfelt communication. By the end of the two hours, the boundaries between the originally distinct groups had shifted and blurred substantially. Unificationists determined to increase their involvement in the larger Irvington community, and the school invited us to head a special fundraising committee, a solid step of recognition at the community level.

At heart, all the women present had the same concern for the future of their children and the community. Local women were amazed at the ability of Unificationists to implement the project, and they realized that Unificationists are not intent upon remaining separate from the rest of the community but rather are kindred spirits and women of substance. - Karen Smith

WFWP Activities Around America

Region 6

Those who are trying to witness and bring results found that the best way to work was to help both the Eastern and Western women achieve their goals. When the Western women saw the wonderful International Teas being held each month under the direction of Tokiko Richardson, they began to be more inspired to bring guests as well. Since November, Minnesota WFWP has been meeting in homes on a rotation basis. American guests seem to like the uniqueness of the ethnic foods brought to the International Teas, while the Japanese guests feel embraced and respected by having their traditional foods featured. Someone gives an overview of WFWP. After this, one of the Western sisters presents a topic or an area of concern, followed by discussion and refreshments.

Regional WFWP leader, Mary Jane Anderson, spoke in South Dakota on America's destiny for the next century and in St. Paul, Minnesota on Women's Role in World Peace.

Region 7

Shirley Chimes attended a meeting of the board of Build a Generation, a grassroots organization that seeks to build youthful self-esteem and help educate parents and children. Among those at the meeting were the mayor, the chief of police and state representatives, all of whom Shirley had met personally. "I went to the meeting to learn about the group and walked out a member of the board," Shirley reports.

Region 10

The Northern California WFWP is conducting bi-monthly one-day Divine Principle workshops. Our challenge is to stimulate interest in the blessing among the 550 guests who have heard Father, Mother or the True Children directly in the past 15 months. Poppy Richie leads the outreach committee, encouraging sisters to witness at the book and information tables set up by CARP on various Bay Area campuses. Annie Calavan and a couple of guest speakers have been giving talks on natural healing. Pat Detlefsen gives lunch-time lectures on the UC Berkeley campus.

The Korean WFWP women hold a monthly potluck fellowship dinner and introductory program. Chaired by Mrs. Tomiko Nojima, the Japanese WFWP offers classes in the Japanese language, flower arranging, cooking and origami, as well as a monthly Principle seminar.

Southern California WFWP members set a goal to hold 40 one-day blessing workshops by the time of the 1995 blessing. To accomplish this, we planned to hold two workshops every month. A surprisingly large number of sisters volunteered to lecture. Many of them had never lectured before, but were excited to be involved on this level at this time. We planned a series of four lectures: Creation, the Fall, Consummation of Human History, and ending with Christology, or "The Restoration of the True Family." Each sister was assigned to prepare one lecture. An emcee was assigned to coordinate, and one sister volunteered to give a personal testimony at the end of each day.

The Nevada sisters are small in number and separated by wide distances. Chairwoman Robin Schwyter has faithfully convened them once a month to discuss common concerns and strengthen fellowship. In Hawaii, Claire Yasutake organizes monthly meetings, following up on the guests at their December awards banquet. Kim Gunterman has taken over leadership of the Arizona WFWP.

Communication between Dr. Sang Hun Lee on Earth and His Wife in the Spirit World

The following excerpts were taken from letters sent back and forth in November 1991, through a medium, between Dr. Sang Hun Lee on earth, and his wife. Han Sook Kim, who is in the spirit world. They were blessed with the original 36 couples.

Q. Where do you live?

A. I live in the most royal place. I can go to the lower places any time.

Q. How do you help people in the spirit world?

A. I comfort them by giving them love and by talking to them. I witness to people and tell them about True Parents. But, like many people on earth, they are not willing to listen. However, people who have merit on earth try to listen.

Q. How do people in spirit world communicate?

A. When we look at each other, our minds have give and take. We can understand each other by feelings; we communicate mind to mind. Loving light shines out of people's eyes. In the lower places, people live in darkness, and their faces are dark. When we go to those places, we communicate with light.

Q. Do you wear clothing and eat food?

A. Yes. If we think about wearing some kind of clothing, those clothes naturally appear. Since whatever we think about happens, we don't worry about food, clothing or shelter. However, people in the lower places cannot make such things happen.

Q. How can people in the spirit world rise to a higher position?

A. When their descendants do good deeds for others. If a descendant does

something that greatly helps others, they can suddenly come to the royal family place.

Q. How is music created and communicated?

A. If we want to listen to a hymn, suddenly the sound of the hymn reaches our ears. Whatever song or refined music we think about, it reaches our ears. We can hear such things together. We can dance, too. Our mood is like flowers in the full moon. It is very difficult to express unless you come here. People in the lower levels of spirit world don't have such experiences.

Q. On earth we show love by talking to people, giving them things, serving them, working together with them, and helping those who are poor or experiencing difficulties. How do people in high realms of spirit world express love?

A. Love is supreme, in both the physical world and the spirit world. Even though we live together as a royal family, we still have difficulties and go through struggles. However, if we keep a loving mind, our love is transferred to another person and melts their struggles like snow melts in springtime. In the spirit world we cannot solve problems by giving people money. Instead, we practice a serving heart.

Q. How do you express horizontal love to others?

A. We have give and take through the mind and eyes. For conjugal love we go to the physical world. Even though you don't realize it, I come near to you many times, and I come back with joy. You are a public man, but can you give me, your wife, some love too? Can you understand how pained I am to see you eating alone? I will be with you whenever you are alone. Whenever you feel alone, please look at this flower (an oriental orchid) which I am giving. This is my gift for you.

Q. What are the lower levels like?

A. People are always crying and fighting. There are bad smells. In the physical world you cannot imagine what hell is like. Though I went there a couple of times, I realize that love is the highest of all. In the higher level we live in bright weather; the lower level is like a cold winter night where there is no music.

In addition to answering her husband's questions, Mrs. Lee talked about preparing for the spirit world and the nature of their daily life there.

If you attend True Parents with filial piety, you don't need to worry about whether you will come to this wonderful place in spirit world. If you witness and lead a life of prayer and devotion, you can come here even without your ancestors' good merit.

Our children need to receive the blessing. Without exception, people need to receive the blessing in order to experience happiness in the spirit world. Before you come to this world, you must see that our children are blessed. Otherwise, we will not have a foundation.

Even though I miss you, I don't wait for you to come here soon. Please live a long life and attend True Parents.

We pray a lot for True Parents' health. Rev. Hyo Won Eu gives Divine Principle lectures without resting. Heung Jin Nim and Great Mother Hong pray again and again for True Parents' health with incredible sincerity. Especially Great Mother Hong prays unceasingly for True Mother, True Children and True Grandchildren.

Our daily life consists of prayer, singing hymns and service. Our life is such a beautiful heavenly kingdom life.

Report on True Parents' Birthday

When True Parents returned to America, Father asked Peter Kim to give some highlights of Mother's speaking tour. He reported that between Father, Mother and True Children, 208 speeches were given. He suggested the slogan: "Let's Remember 1993." We need to remember how hard True Parents and True Children worked to give this proclamation and how hard True Father worked to train over 50,000 Japanese women on Cheju Island.

Mr. Kim spoke of Mother's courage and bravery as she spoke on Korean campuses. He said that Korean campuses are known as "rough ground." There is communist infiltration among the students, and radical students banged the door to disturb several speeches. Mr. Kim felt it was dangerous, but Mother never skipped any campuses, and as she left each one she smiled and waved her hand.

He spoke of the record-making speech Mother gave to the Korean Congress. He explained that the Korean Congress building is not open to the public, but one righteous congressman arranged for the speech at the risk of his position, saying, "I will do it because I believe in it."

Mr. Kim spoke of Mother's fighting spirit and her unity with Father and Heavenly Father. Not a single accident occurred on the world tour because of this unity.

Father waited for Mother at Cheju Island. He helped the grandchildren sing a congratulatory song to Mother each day. Father trained 51,800 Japanese women. Sixteen hundred women leaders from this group are being sent out to 160 nations (ten to each nation) for the next three years. Let us keep these women in our prayers.

On February 16, 1994, the day after True Parents' Birthday, True Father spoke to leaders at East Garden. From 1993 to 2000 is a seven-year period. The entire world must be restored and the Kingdom of God must be established on earth. The Bride culture must be restored through WFWP. This is the role and responsibility of WFWP. After World War II, women in the West (American women) were like queens, but they couldn't take up the responsibility. There was no king. In Western society, men have been in the servant's position. If husbands were in the position of king, the wives couldn't treat them as they do. They just followed their instincts. Women are responsible to educate their husbands to be king. Children should be educated to be future kings and queens.

Father said that men are in the position to obey and treat their wife and children as queen, princes and princesses. When they are totally united and engrafted to True Father, then they can be perfected on all levels.

It's time to put the second generation out front. The year 1993 was a turning point. We should now plant a new root. Our first generation has old habits and are "stale." The second generation was born in the wilderness and are "clean."

You should have one conviction until you enter Canaan: to follow God's will. Keep telling yourself, "Even if I lose my life, I will follow this." Then you are qualified to enter Canaan. In order to protect the second generation, we must go through whatever suffering lies ahead.

Your attitude should be: "I have a baby in my womb who will be strong enough to conquer all the tribes and then enter Canaan." When Mary was carrying Jesus in her womb, she stuck her neck out. I encourage you to be willing to sacrifice your life.

Father spoke of the first Youth Conference for World Peace in Moscow, which he asked Dr. Seuk to organize. Representatives of North and South Korea, Japan, Russia, the US, and China gathered, discussed and shared together. Father spoke to the Japanese leaders about how he wants 700,000 women from Japan to come for training in 1994.

Father asked all WFWP leaders to stand. He mentioned Nora's name, saying. "By now you should be able to move this country." Father asked, "Do you want to do your mission like a machine gun or a single shooter? What about visiting every family in America? You must gather together and make a loud noise. Use your mouth more for God than for yourself and your family. When this time is over, no matter how much you offer, it will not be needed."

Father talked about making a United Nations Federation for World Peace. Nora (and all of us) should be able to go to the UN and speak. Father trained WFWP as lecturers and told them not to follow the tradition of man leaders in America. Sisters are united in heart with Father, and men are in the Archangel position. Sisters should follow in the footsteps of Mother and do more than the 168 speeches that Mother gave last year.

With the 1600 graduates of the Cheju Island training going to 160 countries, Father is planning to form a high-level women's organization in each country. Then these women can go to the UN and influence it as a unit.

Starting in March, Mother and True Children will speak on American university campuses. From today, we should be giving lectures eight hours a day on campuses. Use the YWCA and YMCA and give talks on scriptures. Each student should bring 100 students.

Father directed us to go back and prepare for Mother's speech. We should sell the videotapes of Mother's speech to help pay for the tour. WFWP members should offer \$10,000 to save the country.

Father led the conference with much energy, enthusiasm, and vision. We could all feel his determination to fulfill God's vision for families, tribes, nations and the world.

Battered Women Hear Speech

Laurette Heppell, the Pueblo, Colorado city leader, arranged with the director of the YWCA in Pueblo to have me present the WFWP ideals to the women of the local battered women's shelter.

It was a snowy night in November when I arrived with my two children at my parents' home. My mother was very upset that I, nine months pregnant, had made the two-hour drive in such bad weather. I had considered canceling the talk, but I had felt it might be the only opportunity for me to present Mother's speech in my hometown.

The next morning I mustered up the courage to ask my mother to accompany me to my talk. At first she said no, but then changed her mind and agreed to come. There were about ten women assembled for the presentation. Laurette set the tone with a warm welcome and introduction. I began my presentation by giving a historical perspective of WFWP activities and the work Mother is doing. I then passed out her speech and began to read.

On the second page, the YWCA director interrupted me: "You're not going to read this entire speech, are you?" she demanded. "These women want to hear how WFWP can provide assistance in domestic violence."

"Mrs. Moon has provided a religious perspective of the causes of domestic violence and the breakdown of the family and explained how God is working in history to restore these problems," I responded. I then asked, "Is there anyone who would like me to continue reading?" One woman loudly said, "I want her to read the speech."

Because of her enthusiastic response, I immediately resumed reading and read the speech in its entirety. After the presentation, we spoke more about the breakdown of the family, substance abuse, and domestic violence. Everyone agreed that these problems stem from the breakdown of the first family. Message from Heavenly Mother

Now as you come to know me you step into the awesome, unconditional core of true love. Please meet me there. I welcome you at last. My arms are free, and you, my children, are ready.

WFWP Founder to Speak on University Campuses

Concern for deteriorating family life has motivated our founder, Mrs. Hak Ja Han Moon, to make a speaking tour of American university campuses during the months of March and April, with a message of parental concern. In her speech she will address concepts such as free sex, immorality, and the role of women in a changing world.

Japanese & American WFWP Presidents Meet

Mrs. Motoko Sugiyama, president of WFWP, Japan, visited the United States for several days in January, staying in the home of Nora Spurgin, president of WFWP, America. "It was a wonderful opportunity to share our activities and concerns," says Mrs. Spurgin.

WFWP in Japan has been very active throughout Asia. They have aided a Philippines UNICEF project to provide mobile schools for children who live in the mountains and would otherwise be uneducated. One project provides scholarships to Japanese universities for qualifying women students from other parts of Asia. They provide 50 to 70 one-year scholarships for students working on graduate degrees.

Mrs. Sugiyama stated that the Japanese WFWP has four goals:

To become women of world vision. To reconstruct family values. To reconstruct education for youth. To expand the forum for international exchange and aid.

In Japan, the WFWP members maintain a sex education campaign focusing on abstinence and self control, through providing educational materials and sponsoring symposiums and seminars.

Although Japan is an enormous ocean away from America, we share many of the same concerns. Our best wishes for success to WFWP in Japan!

WFWP Vice-President Josette Shiner Woman on the Move

Josette Shiner is managing editor of the Washington Times, the only conservative newspaper in Washington, DC. As managing editor, Mrs. Shiner is responsible for planning and directing of the newspaper's daily news coverage as well as coordinating a staff of 250.

Previous to her present position, Mrs. Shiner served for 15 years as a reporter and editor. During this time she covered events at the White House, three presidential campaigns and conventions. Congress and the State Department.

During the past decade, she has interviewed many world leaders, including Helmut Kohl, Margaret Thatcher and the Dalai Lama, as well as several US presidents, including Presidents Carter, Reagan, Bush and Clinton. In addition, Mrs. Shiner has made regular appearances on CNN, C-SPAN, Fox TV, and other news programs.

Beyond her interviews with American presidents, Mrs. Shiner had an exclusive interview with one of the world's hardest-to-reach leaders, Kim II Sung of North Korea. The interview with her was the first he gave to the American press in 20 years.

Mrs. Shiner is a 1975 graduate of the University of Colorado and has been listed in Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who in the East, Who's Who in Professional and Executive Women, Who's Who of Emerging Leaders in America, and International Who's Who of Intellectuals.

Recently Mrs. Shiner was interviewed in New York by Brett Moss, a former talk show host from San Francisco. The interview covered the following topics: Josette's career as a woman journalist, understanding the media, inside Washington and foreign policy. In the next two issues, parts of the interview with this exemplary woman leader will appear.

Children's Lives on the Line

When Dr. Luda Leschova from Minsk, Belarus talked, there wasn't a dry eye in the house. She spoke in Albuquerque, New Mexico on November 5, interpreting for six beautiful Belarusian children who were in Albuquerque for nine weeks to clean out their systems from radiation caused by Chernobyl nuclear power plant disaster of 1986.

Dr. Leschova works for Children of Chernobyl, an organization that has already enabled 40,000 children to visit other countries for the same cleansing purpose. She is also a professor at the Institute of Foreign Languages and Literature in Minsk.

Dr. Leschova's finest quality is her unabashed modesty. She began her talk by apologizing profusely for not wearing Belarusian clothes, but rather fancy American ones. Then she assured us that she had been no "saint" during the attempted coup of 1991. Although she had protested at the risk of losing her life and her family, she felt that she was an ordinary Soviet citizen at the time. She admonished us that we should rather admire someone like Sakharov, who spoke up long before the coup attempt.

Her personal story of how she dealt with the Chernobyl crisis cannot be adequately paraphrased. She had inadvertently exposed her family to the worst part of the radiation by going to visit her parents who live quite near Chernobyl soon after the blast. She shared her incredible joy when she found uncontaminated food on the streets of Minsk for her children. In addition, she shared her terror when she thought about her newborn baby for whom she could find no milk, and she was somehow unable to provide it.

Two thirds of the best farm land has been contaminated in Belarus, and with the breakup of the Soviet Union, the economic possibilities for Belarus are the most bleak. From the very beginning, the Soviet government distributed deadly misinformation to the world and to the Belarusian people. For Dr. Leschova, the cover-up of the tremendous Chernobyl tragedy has been the worst crime in human history.

When the Chernobyl nuclear reactor exploded, strong winds carried a cloud of poisonous radiation to the northeast. Seventy percent of the radiation fell on the fertile land of Belarus. The effects of the radiation will continue to impact the land and its people for centuries.

Dr. Leschova found hope in the people of Albuquerque, who sponsored the nine Chernobyl children through a grassroots organization called Friends-to-Friends. Much of the impetus for this organization came from Mr. and Mrs. Mark Boitano. The organization has continued to bring children to Albuquerque as well as to send goods to Minsk and the contaminated areas. Hopefully, Dr. Leschova will be able to come again next year. We will again welcome her deeply in our hearts as she has taught us much by her rare combination of modesty, love, fighting spirit and warmth. She is truly a model for any woman who belongs to this Federation.

Hawaii Raises Money for Belarus

On December 29, the WFWP of Hawaii held an awards banquet and fundraiser at the Kahala Hilton for the Belarusian Women's Committee to Aid the Victims of the Chernobyl Disaster. A special operatic performance by Maria Y. Iida paid tribute to Teiko Kiwa. Awards were presented to an outstanding mother who volunteers at the Red Cross and an outstanding grandmother who takes care of handicapped adults.

WFWP Hosts Founder of Chernobyl Fund

W ashington state WFWP leader, Nancy Oldenettel, learned about the plight of the children who are victims of the Chernobyl nuclear explosion through a PBS special in 1990. Since that time she has been in contact with the founders of the Children of Chernobyl Fund and has recently arranged for the founder and director of the fund, Gennady Grushevoy and his interpreter, Yuri Pankratz, to visit the United States and recruit help.

With Nancy, they toured the Pacific Northwest, where they spoke in schools and at programs sponsored by WFWP. They also visited Kodiak, Alaska, for a WFWP event there.

The local newspaper cited Nancy's work in a front-page article with two large photos, describing the plight of the children who are victims of excessive radiation and giving Nancy's phone number for those who wish to contribute help.

Nora Spurgin received a beautiful letter of gratitude from Drs. Grushevoy and Pankratz. Following is an excerpt: "We had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. Moon speak in Minsk.... As representatives of the many children in Belarus whose lives have been drastically altered by the Chernobyl disaster, we extend our deepest gratitude for the effort of the Women's Federation for World Peace to make our visit to the Northwest region including Kodiak as success.

"Each person to whom we speak and each person with whom we meet increases the possibility that constructive action will be taken to help these children. As the events have unfolded in our homeland it becomes more clear that the Chernobyl accident was not only a warning to the world but also a symbol of the need for us to view our world as an 'interdependent family.' This is a time of incredible new beginning and spiritual rebirth for all of us. WFWP's efforts on behalf of our fund and the children for whom we volunteer has made our visit to the United States a beneficial one for the children of Belarus. We are indebted to you for all you have done and we will remember your kindness forever."

Mrs. Spurgin & Mrs. Jones Attend UN Meet

A Fourth World Conference on Women will be held in Beijing, China in 1995. WFWP representatives have been invited to join the Planning Committee, which is preparing for this conference and the accompanying NGO Forum (NGO stands for non-government organizations).

The Planning Committee promotes broad participation of men and women from all geographic areas in making local, national, regional and global preparations for the World Conference on Women and NGO Forum. It is also a means for exchanging information and expertise among concerned individuals, non-governmental organizations, and governmental delegates. Nora Spurgin and Betsy Jones will attend the March 5 Planning Committee at the U.N., representing WFWP.

WFWP Women Attend Moscow Conference

Two WFWP women university students, Marilyn Valdes from Columbia and Cara Jones from Princeton, attended a conference for world peace in Moscow on February 13.

Students and professors from China, Japan, the Republic of Korea, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, the United States, and Russia were in attendance. The founders of the conference, Rev. and Mrs. Moon, sent a letter of greeting stating, "as young people from East and West, you represent the future of our world. It is our hope that this future will be one of true peace as humankind moves beyond the prejudices of the past. To this end, we encourage your consideration of the theoretical and practical implications of the conference theme: 'New Values and Reassessment of Existing Values in the 21st Century,'"

Cara Jones said that "although the conference focused on the political and economic aspects of world peace, it came about because of the spiritual ideal we have always talked about. It was like sceing the work of Rev. and Mrs. Moon bearing fruit in another way. The most significant aspect was the cross-cultural dialogue."

"I give abstinence-based sexual education programs as a WFWP event, saying that one of our goals is for women around the world to exchange information on families and the education of children. I have given these programs in ten schools and am booked through March.

Linda also reports that she was able to get close enough for President Clinton to notice her and shake her hand during his January visit to Minsk. "I felt so strongly that this was not my hand but the hand representing God's work in Belarus," Linda concludes.

WFWP Statement of Beliefs

7. We believe that women can transcend religious traditions and doctrines and racial and national barriers to join together with men in facilitating global peace.

8. We believe that conflict resolution should be achieved whenever possible through dialogue and reconciliation, empathy and compassion, repentance and forgiveness, rather than by violence.
