On January 6, the UPA cadets got a tour of the National Ministry Team's offices and met with Continental Chairman, Dr. Ki Hoon Kim, who shared encouraging words with these aspiring ministry leaders. They also took the opportunity to explore Manhattan, including the Rockefeller Center and Times Square.
