Here are 5 commitments to trust that we considered for our community during our message yesterday:

5 Essential Commitments of Trust

- 1. I will believe the best.
- 2. When other people assume the worst about you, I will come to your defense.
- 3. If what I experience begins to erode my trust, I will come directly to you to talk about it.
- 4. When I am convinced I will not be able to deliver on a promise, I will come to you ahead of time.
- 5. When you confront me about the gaps I've created, I will tell you the truth.

For your community how important is it that you can lift each other's spirit through expressing your trust for one another? When you are able to convey to the person sitting next to you that you trust them with all your heart you actually help them to open their heart, which in turn helps God and allows His spirit to touch them.
