Forum on Cultural Differences between Korea and the West

The first presentation was given by the publisher, Dr. Juraj Lajda. Afterwards, Dr. Lajda explained about the differences of their background and mindset and why they could not understand each other correctly. Since he has three children who are studying in Korea, he was able to tell many first-hand experiences about the differences in philosophy and outlook of people in the Far East and Europe. He also gave a short outline about the fantastic economic development after the Korean War, and many other points of interest.

The second presentation was given by Mr. Milos Prochazka, who worked as a translator for Korean companies and presently is doing post-graduate studies of the Korean language at the Comenius University in Bratislava. He talked about his own experiences with the differences in background and understanding and about resulting conflicts, be it during business meetings or between Korean management and Slovak or Czech employees.

The pertinent presentations were well received and provoked a lively discussion afterwards. All guests said that the enjoyed the meeting very much and are willing to attend similar events.
