Judging a Religious Legacy by the Lives It Shaped: The story of Choi Won-bok applying ideals from Unificationism to education

Yet, religion correspondent Jeong Seong-su (정성수) argues in his [article](#) 24th July in the South Korean daily [Segye Ilbo](#) that an equally important fact is often overlooked: while she left the university, she did not leave education.

Instead, Choi Won-bok (최원복 - 1916 - 2006) devoted her educational abilities to new settings.

Within the [Family Federation](#) she became deeply involved in member education, teaching the movement's theology, known as the [Unification Principles](#).

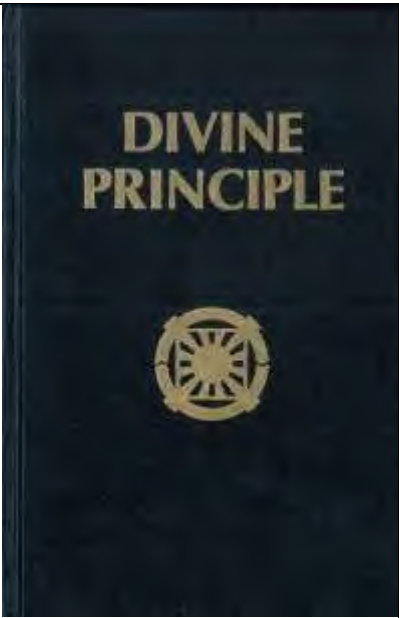
Because she spoke fluent English and Japanese, she also worked extensively in international education and missionary activities, helping translate the [Unification Principles](#) into English and contributing to communication between the [movement's](#) members around the world.

According to Jeong, these efforts helped lay part of the educational foundation for the [movement's](#) expanding international activities.

Her most visible contribution, however, came after she became principal of Sunhwa Arts Middle and High School, where she served for more than nine years between 1977 and 1987.

Jeong considers this stage of her life especially significant. Rather than remaining in the more prestigious

world of university education, she chose to devote herself to the education of adolescents. In his view, this demonstrates that she regarded education not merely as a profession but as a lifelong mission.

Many students who later achieved international recognition studied at Sunhwa during her leadership. While educational success can rarely be measured immediately, Jeong argues that the later accomplishments of these students testify to the lasting influence of the school's educational environment during those years.

Equally important, he writes, was the philosophy that guided Choi's work.

She believed schools should be places where character is formed as much as knowledge is acquired. Academic excellence was important, but it was not enough. Education, she argued, should produce people capable of maintaining integrity during hardship while also showing generosity toward others.

She often encouraged students to preserve their humanity in an increasingly technological world. Scientific and technological progress, she believed, should never come at the expense of imagination, poetry, or compassion. A truly educated person should combine professional competence with emotional depth and moral responsibility.

Her understanding of art reflected the same philosophy. Art, she said, finds its highest purpose not simply through technical brilliance or public performance but through its ability to comfort people who are suffering and bring warmth into difficult lives.

Reading also occupied an important place in her educational vision. She described books as allowing a person, even in the humblest surroundings, to learn from hundreds of great teachers. Lifelong reading, she believed, was essential for continual personal growth.

One of the concepts Jeong highlights is Choi's distinction between the "small self" and the "greater self". Human beings, she taught, should not live only for personal success or private interests. By recognizing both their relationship with [God](#) and their responsibility toward humanity, individuals discover a larger purpose that transcends self-interest. Education should therefore cultivate not only capable professionals

but also responsible citizens who contribute to society as a whole.

Jeong concludes that institutions are ultimately judged by the people they produce. Buildings may disappear and organizations may experience periods of crisis, but the lives of individuals endure as lasting evidence of the values they embraced.

He notes that the [Family Federation](#) is currently passing through one of the most difficult periods in its history. In such circumstances, he argues, it is worth looking beyond contemporary controversies to examine the lives of individuals who dedicated themselves to education, public service, and the development of others.

In his view, Choi Won-bok represents one such individual. Although she sacrificed an established university career because of her religious convictions, she never abandoned her commitment to educating young people. Instead, she spent the remainder of her life helping others grow intellectually, morally, and spiritually.

For Jeong, that lifelong commitment makes Choi Won-bok more than an important educator. It makes her part of what he considers one of the enduring educational legacies that the [Family Federation](#) has left to Korean society. Whether readers ultimately agree with that assessment or not, he suggests that the life of Choi Won-bok deserves to be considered as part of any balanced evaluation of the [movement](#)'s historical impact.

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Scholar’s Journey: She Gave Up Academia For Faith

When religious



organizations become the subject of public controversy, discussions often revolve around court cases, politics, finances, or doctrine. Much less attention is paid to another, perhaps more fundamental, question: **What kind of people has the religion produced?** If a religious movement has influenced generations of individuals, should its legacy not also be judged by the lives of those who were shaped by its ideals?

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That is the question explored by South Korean religion journalist Jeong Seong-su (정성수) in a [column](#) published in the daily newspaper [Segye Ilbo](#) on 24th July 2026. Rather than discussing legal disputes surrounding the [Family Federation for World Peace and Unification](#) (in Korea often referred to as [Unificationism](#)), Jeong turns to the life of **Choi Won-bok** (최원복 – 1916–2006), arguing that her career offers an important perspective on the [movement](#)'s contribution to Korean society.

For readers outside Korea, Choi Won-bok may be an unfamiliar name. Yet within Korean educational circles, she was respected as a gifted educator, linguist, and later principal of *Sunhwa Arts Middle and High School* (선화예술중·고등학교), one of South Korea's best-known arts schools. During her years as principal, the school educated numerous students who later achieved distinction in music, dance, and the performing arts, including internationally acclaimed soprano Sumi Jo (조수미).

Jeong argues that Choi's significance lies not simply in her association with the [Family Federation](#), but in the way she embodied educational ideals throughout her life. Before becoming one of the [movement](#)'s senior members, she had already established herself as a successful academic. According to the columnist, this makes her an instructive example when considering the broader cultural and educational legacy of a [religious movement](#) that is today often discussed almost exclusively in political or legal terms.

Born in 1916 in Kaesong – today located in North Korea – during Japan's colonial rule over Korea, Choi displayed exceptional academic ability from an early age. She

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exceptional academic ability from an early age. She graduated with honors in English literature and later pursued advanced studies in linguistics and language education at the University of Michigan in the United States. At a time when relatively few Korean women studied abroad or held university teaching positions, she returned to Korea to become a professor of English at *Ehwa Women's University* (이화여대), one of the country's most prestigious institutions.

By every conventional measure, she appeared destined for an outstanding academic career.

Yet Jeong emphasizes that personal ambition was never the driving force behind her decisions. Throughout her youth she demonstrated a strong concern for justice and compassion for others. As a student she participated in Korea's independence movement (독립운동) [See editor's note below] against Japanese colonial rule and was imprisoned for her activism. Stories from her student years describe her quietly sharing financial awards with classmates who were struggling instead of keeping them herself.

Perhaps most revealing, according to Jeong, was her spiritual search. After graduating from university, Choi reportedly prayed for months with a simple request: that if **God** truly existed, He would reveal Himself personally and show her the path she should follow. The columnist presents this as evidence that she valued truth above personal advancement or intellectual achievement.

That search eventually led her, somewhat unexpectedly, to the newly established **Unification Church**.

Ironically, her first visit had not been motivated by religious interest. University administrators had asked her to investigate why some students were attending meetings of the small and little-known **movement**. Instead of relying on rumors or second-hand reports, she chose to examine its teachings herself.

After hearing the movement's message firsthand, she reached a conclusion that would dramatically change her life.

Her decision to join the **church** soon created an unavoidable

Her decision to join the church soon created an unavoidable conflict with her university career. *Ehwa Women's University* required her to choose between remaining on the faculty or continuing her new religious affiliation. She could not do both.

She chose her faith and resigned from the university.

Jeong acknowledges that this decision represented a major personal sacrifice. As a respected professor with an international education, Choi enjoyed both prestige and professional security. Leaving such a position meant surrendering a promising academic career.

[Editor's note: The **Korean independence movement** (독립운동, *Dongnip Undong*) was a broad struggle to free Korea from Japanese colonial rule, which lasted from **1910 to 1945**. It encompassed peaceful protests, diplomatic efforts, cultural preservation, education, and armed resistance, involving Koreans both on the peninsula and throughout East Asia.

Japan formally annexed Korea in 1910, ending the Korean Empire. The colonial government imposed strict political control while promoting the assimilation of Koreans into Japanese society. Many Koreans resisted these policies by establishing schools, newspapers, and religious organizations that sought to preserve Korean language, culture, and national identity.

A defining moment came on 1st **March 1919**, when Korean leaders issued a Declaration of Independence, inspiring peaceful demonstrations across the country. Millions participated in what became known as the **March First Movement (3·1 운동)**. Although the protests were largely nonviolent, Japanese authorities responded with severe repression, killing and imprisoning thousands of participants. Despite its immediate failure to achieve independence, the movement attracted international attention and strengthened Korean nationalism.

Following the *March First Movement*, Korean leaders established the **Provisional Government of the Republic of Korea** in Shanghai, China. It coordinated diplomatic efforts and supported resistance activities abroad. At the same time, armed independence fighters operated in Manchuria, Siberia, and parts of China, engaging Japanese forces in a series of guerrilla campaigns. Korean independence activists also cooperated with Chinese nationalist forces and, later, with the Allied powers during the Second World War.

Japan's defeat in **August 1945** brought an end to colonial rule. However, Korea was divided along the 38th parallel, with Soviet forces occupying the north and American forces the south. This temporary division eventually led to the establishment of two separate states in 1948 – the **Republic of Korea (South Korea)** and the **Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea)** – making the legacy of the independence movement central to the historical identity of both countries.]

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
