

What does Father Moon want now?

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Several Unificationists have expressed to me their disappointment that since the ascension of Rev. Moon there hasn't been much of a Pentecost phenomenon like there was after Jesus ascended. Since I am a psychic medium, some have asked me if I have had any communication with Rev. Moon, and if so, what did he have to say?

Well, the answer is yes, and what he has to say isn't that much different from what he had to say when he walked among us, although he also is disappointed in the absence of a strong Pentecostal outbreak of the Holy Spirit.

There are some aspects of being in the spirit world that Father Moon considers an advantage to when he was still in his physical body. For one thing, he is no longer confined by time and space. When he was on earth, if he wanted to visit his disciples in Europe, he would have to get on an airplane and fly there. Now, he simply has to have the mental intention to travel there, and it's instantaneous. Anyone who has an ardent desire to communicate with Father Moon, no matter what geographical location they are in, may do so, and many have.

Also, from the spirit world, he has a much closer and powerful experience of God's love and presence, and is better positioned to be a channel to help us have that experience for ourselves. That experience of God's love and presence in our lives is something he is very concerned about with both those who are his disciples and the broader population as well.



There are several people who have had profound spiritual experiences with God and Father Moon since his ascension, but this phenomenon has not found expression in a broader population of Unificationists and others, yet. So is there anything we can do to facilitate such a phenomenon? I believe that there is.

In my view, the most important thing we can do is engage in prayer. We can do this as individuals of course, but if we want to bring about Pentecost it will take corporate prayer, i.e., people praying as a group. The current "God's Hope for America" tour is a great start!

Historically, many powerful revivals have begun from just a handful of people praying together. In 1857, a revival began when Jeremiah Lanphier began a prayer meeting in Manhattan with just six people. The following week there were 14, then 23. The prayer meetings multiplied across the city and the nation, and within a year one million people were converted.

In 1906, the Azusa Street revival began in Los Angeles with seven people. It spawned the Pentecostal movement, which now claims 600 million members worldwide.

In Jerusalem, the first Christian revival took place when 120 of Jesus' followers gathered in an upper room where they "joined together constantly in prayer" (Acts 1:14 NIV). The Bible says that after the Holy Spirit descended, these followers went into the streets and converted three thousand people in one day.

So prayer has been the common element in all of these cases. Keep in mind the fact that after the Crucifixion, Jesus' followers were in hiding, fearing for their lives. After the Pentecost, these very same people were empowered with a fearlessness that resulted in great numbers of conversions, healings, and other manifestations of the Holy Spirit.

Honestly speaking, many Unificationists today are dispirited, confused, and spiritually restless. A revival of our tradition of ardent prayer can heal this.

Why hasn't there been a Pentecost? Simply put, because we are the Pentecost. The Pentecost isn't something that comes from somewhere else. It comes from within us when each of us experiences our own personal encounter with the Holy Spirit of our Heavenly Parent, God.

So let's do it! It is the only experience that will heal us, transform us, and empower us.
