In February 2023, a change in the leadership of the Women's Federation for World Peace was officially announced. It was sad to say goodbye to our International President and Senior Vice President, but at the same time, with excitement, we look forward to the new winds of change that will be brought to the organization. For this occasion, on March 10, WFWPI held the Presidential Transition Ceremony gathering 783 people on Zoom and YouTube.

The ceremony was divided into two programmes, including acknowledgments of **Dr. Julia Moon** and **Dr. Sun Jin Moon**, and the introduction of **Mrs. Moriko Hori. Mrs. Kefilwe Lebepe**, the moderator of the event and team leader of the WFWPI Young Professionals Team, first gave the floor to International Secretary General **Dr. Paris Moon**, who officially opened the event and introduced the outgoing leaders with words of gratitude for the years they have served together in WFWPI.

Mrs. Moriko Hori thanked the former presidents for building a strong foundation during the most difficult period in WFWP history, the COVID-19 pandemic, and said she was determined to follow in their footsteps and make the organization even stronger so that they can be proud. She added, "There are countless challenges and difficulties in the world, but as WFWP, we must create peace. The strong point of WFWP is that we have 127 chapters around the world, creating a wonderful international community, as one large entity that we can contribute to the world. I have been able to visit many developing countries and meet children and people whose lives have hope and a future because of WFWP projects. Peace is within us, and when we are happy and peaceful, our families will be peaceful, and eventually, our communities, countries and the world will be in peace. So I would like to ask you to bring peace within us, and expand it to your family and your community."

NO PEACE without WOMEN

2nd annual conference 13th June 2023 Kosovo The second conference in the series of 'No Peace Without Women' was held on 13th June 2023 at the Parliament in Pristina, Kosovo. Sponsors and partners were the Kosovo Office of the Prime Minister and the EUME branches of WFWP, WFWPI UN Office, UPF, and the International Association of First Ladies for Peace (IAFLP).

The conference opened with an address from the Prime Minister of Kosovo, HE Albin Kurti, who had excused himself from an urgent meeting on the situation in the north of Kosovo to do so. HE Liza Gashi, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs and HE Emilia Redžepi, Deputy Prime Minister were also speakers and played critical roles in the preparations and in extending invitations to Members of Parliament. The event was attended by 120 leaders, 12 of whom were Ambassadors from different nations of Europe and the Balkans, with over 20 media outlets covering the event.

The conference was a great success and a model of peace and reconciliation process through women, that aims to be propagated further. A safe space was created in a tense region where women could speak honestly of their scars- and conclude that working together for peace and mutual development was the only solution. As the series theme alludes, women must and can take a leading role in defining a new mindset, on solving differences through dialogue, reconciliation, and shared development plans, rather through violence, enmity and hate.

Besides those attending from the region, First Ladies, former presidents, government ministers, members of parliament, business and financial leaders, and youth, there were messages of concern and support coming from the Head of the UN Economic Commission for Europe in Geneva, Olga Algayerova, and Nobel Laureate, Ellen Sirleaf Johnson. Sally Becker, a humanitarian aid worker credited with saving hundreds of children's lives during the Kosovo war, returning for the first time, was one of the speakers. She captivated the audience with her testimony, including being imprisoned and shot. Her unwavering commitment to forgiveness and peace resonated with everyone, many of whom had experienced the trauma of war in their immediate surroundings.

The founder of WFWP and UPF, Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, is presently calling for a greater focus on peace education for mothers. It is mothers who naturally shape the values and beliefs of their

children, wherein lies the hope of instilling a culture of peace that starts in the home, and promote the shared leadership between women and men. This is especially important in countries like Kosovo, where traditional family values are deeply ingrained.

The 'No Peace without Women' conference has received strong support from political leaders, providing evidence of the growing recognition of the need to involve women in peace processes and helping to amplify the voices of women regarding the importance of a holistic approach to establish more inclusive and sustainable peace agreements. Participants returning to their nations throughout the Balkans were already anticipating a next "No Peace without Women" event and campaign in their region.

3rd Annual Conference – Women, Faith and Family

The Women, Faith and Family Conference is an annual event that brings together women of different faiths to discuss topics related to family, relationships and spirituality. The conference is designed to provide a forum for women to connect and learn from one another, as well as to hear from experts in the field. It is a celebration of the power and resilience of women, and a testament to the importance of community in our lives.



On June 20, the WFWP UK hosted its annual Women, Faith and Family conference online on the theme of 'Family, Faith and the Future, the Voice of Women'. The event provided a platform for five guest speakers from different faith traditions including Jewish, Hindu, Muslim, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and Sikh.

All expressed their views on the topic according to their own faith perspectives. Their talks were insightful and inspiring. They shared their experiences, challenges and successes in nurturing their families. Mothers were identified as key figures in shaping the character and values of their children. All speakers agreed about the need for character education in shaping future generations, including the creation of a more peaceful world, rooted in the culture of heart.

'Women Making a Difference in our World'

Birmingham - March 3, 2023

Our International Women's Day evening, with the theme of "Women Making a Difference in our World", was attended by about 90 women from a wide variety of backgrounds. More than 20 ladies were joining us for the first time. We were very happy to have **Mrs Mitty Tohma** with us, the current President of WFWP for Europe and the Middle East. She gave a brief overview of local, national and international WFWP activities.

We then had 4 main speakers: Amelia, Gabrielle, Nasim and Niti. Amelia spoke of the difficulty she had with her mother, Monica, leaving home twice, the first time at the age of 16, and about the help and support she received from the local charity, St Basil's, which supports young homeless people. The honesty in Amelia and Monica's relationship ultimately allowed them to reconcile, with Monica taking on a permanent job with St Basil's, helping numerous young people, many of them single parents, to gradually integrate back into society.

Gabrielle had been involved in social work for around 40 years in a variety of settings - local authority, voluntary and independent sectors. For the last 10 years she has helped to develop foster care in 10 different countries, each requiring its own unique approach. She spoke of her experiences in Bulgaria and India, and the range of problems, both structural and cultural, which had to be addressed. In Bulgaria, almost all the children kept in institutions had simply been abandoned, usually from birth. In India, most of the children held in institutions had been lost or abandoned through poverty.

Sister Nasim experienced much trauma in her life, including a very painful divorce, enabling her to empathise with many women who had been through similar experiences. Having realised the need to forgive herself, and also feeling a responsibility towards God and the bigger picture, she founded Lanterns of Light, which allowed her to help and mentor other women. In 2016 she also founded the Lady Zainab project, which has been helping numerous women and orphaned children in Syria, who have been internally displaced as a result of the many years of war there. She thanked Patricia and all the ladies who have supported this project in recent years.

Finally, Niti, a GP of many years standing, and a Managing Partner of Health4All Advisory, described her incredible efforts to establish, or improve, Primary Health Care in countries across the world. Beginning in India, she has also worked in China, Saudi Arabia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Kazakhstan, the Philippines and created a new opening to healthcare for 17.8 million people in Bangladesh!

During the evening we made a collection for earthquake relief work in northern Syria, raising £600 which was truly wonderful.

After a quiet candle-lit time of reflection, prayer and musical offerings, we enjoyed food and refreshments together, with old friendships renewed and new friendships made, and with conversations continuing late into the night. It was a truly worthwhile and meaningful occasion, which we will remember for a long time.



Leadership of the Heart

Emotional Maturity



The Leadership of the Heart (LOH) curriculum is a comprehensive programme that aims to empower individuals to become powerful leaders through three one-day interactive seminars. The programme is designed to provide participants with the tools to create peace in their lives, families, communities, nations and the world.

The LOH curriculum is based on the universal philosophy of living for the sake of others and living by the logic of love. It emphasizes the importance of knowing and loving oneself from a higher perspective and serving others from a parental or maternal standpoint. It believes that true leadership comes from the heart and is rooted in emotional maturity.

The third seminar in the LOH curriculum focuses on emotional maturity and explores emotional blocks that prevent individuals from becoming effective leaders. Participants gain essential tools to build faith and overcome fear, which are crucial components of emotional maturity. By understanding their emotions and learning how to manage them effectively, individuals can become better leaders and make positive changes in their lives, families, communities and the world.

The LOH curriculum is designed to be wholly transformational, providing participants with the skills and knowledge they need to make a positive impact in the world. The programme emphasizes the importance of personal growth and development as the foundation for effective leadership. It believes that by starting with oneself, individuals can make a difference in their neighbourhood, family, and ultimately, the world

The three ladies confirmed that they had a most uplifting and happy experience and they wish to keep in touch with each other and with WFWP. Also they could gain confidence in public speaking.



'In Aid of Afghan refugee Women and Girls in India'

An afternoon tea party and art exhibition was held at the Lygon Arms Hotel in Broadway on Sat 25th March. Forty six people attended including the two guest speakers, **Dr Marianne Rankin** and WFWP UK Director **Mrs Mitty Tohma**, and the artist and organiser, **Mrs Karen Grant**.

A raffle was held of gifts and services donated locally. Four paintings were sold and the total amount raised to support the Afghan ladies was £770.64.

One lady, Dr Rankin's sister, took up membership of WFWP at the introductory offer of £25. Mrs Tohma introduced the organisation and mentioned some of the projects undertaken including interfaith work, peace garden project, bridge of peace ceremonies and humanitarian aid overseas. She spoke a bit about the Afghan project in India. She mentioned about the suffering of men and boys as well as women and girls as a result of war, which affects whole families. Dr Rankin spoke about art and spirituality, the healing aspects of art and of how art helps us to connect more deeply with the beauty of the world around us and similarities and differences between Eastern and Western art. Also that the creative impulse is innate in us all. Dr Rankin has been the Chair of the Alistair Hardy Trust for many years and she mentioned how its founder, a marine biologist, found great comfort through painting and relief from the stresses his job brought him.

Mrs Grant rounded up the afternoon, thanking both speakers and adding the thought that if more people picked up a paint brush there would be fewer wars in the world!

About a week later a package arrived in the post containing a beautiful certificate signed by King Charles and Queen Camilla, a special pin to wear, and 2 tickets for the Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle on May 7th. I could hardly believe it. It's very meaningful because so many women have been involved over the years in our WFWP work, especially in our Birmingham Women's Peace Group, coming together on a regular basis, getting rid of fear and prejudice, building friendships, and then joining together in all kinds of ways to do something of benefit for society. I feel the award pays tribute to this as well as the broader work and ideals of WFWP.

I travelled down to Windsor on the 7th, with my husband David, and really enjoyed all the wonderful entertainment which was offered at the concert. We were seated with many of the other Coronation Champions, and I could see that they were all pure hearted people who have been working hard at the community level for the good of society. It was a memorable evening. I think the award will give respect and credibility to our efforts, and I hope that, with time, it will be possible to make our royal couple more aware of the amazing work which we are all doing in the Women's Federation.


