Exploring Mother Moon's Wisdom: Highlights from WFWP USA's *Empathy and Action* Webinar

On December 2, 2023, WFWP USA hosted a GWPN webinar on the topic of "Empathy and Action: The Art of Giving and Forgetting." This webinar explored the topic of giving rooted in the perspective of Mother Moon, co-founder of WFWP. The two speakers and moderator delved into how intentional giving brought joy, renewal, and purpose and the season was celebrated with stories of empathy, action, and the transformative art of giving and forgetting.

President of WFWP USA, Kaeleigh Moffitt opened the event with a summary of Mother Moon's perspective on the topic:

True love is defined as giving, forgetting and wishing to give more, or "living for the sake of others."

The nature of true love is circular and infinite. The more we practice it the more we are filled with it ourselves.

True love involves selflessness and sacrifice.

First to share was Ms. Ethel Luzario, a realtor by trade who has found fulfillment in international philanthropy work and is the co-founder of The 3000 Club, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization which focuses on food rescue, disaster relief and recycling initiatives. Ms. Luzario shared with the audience the story of her transformation, from working in the halls of the United Nations to taking a leap of faith, moving to Arizona and beginning to serve on the grassroots level. "It was only through moving to Arizona that I actually found my true purpose...and also through the 3000 Club's Market on the Move that [God] had given me my dream ministry." She also shared that there are times where selfless giving may not come naturally, to which she advised the audience to just start immersing oneself in the environment of their community. "When you open up, the world will open up also."

Next was Ms. Margaret Bower, the Director of Development for Sewpportive Friends, an organization that teaches women in remote villages,

primarily in Zimbabwe, to sew their own washable, reusable menstrual pads. "I feel that giving out of the love in our hearts is really getting something ourselves...it's kind of addictive because it fuels your soul," Ms. Bower shared. On this theme she then shared some stories in which she had experienced the addictive thrill of being able to give, from just giving a smile and kindness to an older man in a store to a pregnant woman in distress and in dire need of clothing that she met on one of her trips with Sewpportive Friends to Uganda. "Whenever I come back from these trips I am exhausted beyond belief but I would do it again in a heartbeat because it really does fuel my soul."

President Moffitt then introduced one of WFWP USA's projects, the Schools of Africa, to the audience, before inviting up both speakers for a round table discussion. The discussion featured topics such as the barriers to living a lifestyle of living for the sake of others, how one can be motivated to persevere when undergoing times where it feels like they have no more to give and what advice each speaker would give to people to help steer the world in a better direction.

Inspired by their dedication, WFWP USA initiated the "Schools of Africa" project in 2001 to financially support 9 schools in 8 African countries founded by those faithful volunteers.

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2023 IMPACT

Liberia: Peace Hana School used funds from WFWP USA to pay for much-needed improvements to the school and various expenses to develop new educational opportunities.

Mozambique: With WFWP USA's donations this year, the school was able to update their infrastructure, installing new iron gates to protect the students and a new courtyard, which had not been updated since the school was built in 1995!

Rwanda: Construction was completed this year on a secondary institute called the New Hope Professional Training Center. This training center will be attended by graduates of the New Hope Technical Institute (NHTI).

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

EQUATORIAL GUINEA

Pilar Momo Elementary School since 2011 and Motoko Shiroma Primary School since 2001

WFWP established two schools in Equatorial Guinea. Motoko Shiroma Primary School was named after Ms. Motoko Shrioma, a Japanese volunteer teacher who lost her life during her service. WFWP USA continues its support in the improvement and maintenance of the buildings and securing the safety of the students in both schools. So far, the schools impacted more than 369 graduates in Equatorial Guinea. FIND OUT MORE



GUINEA BISSAU

Sunac Elementary School since 2003

Despite political and social instability in Guinea Bissau, Sunac offers classes regularly throughout the year, making the school zone a safe place for children to grow. Also, the school has a high female enrollment rate. Sunac has been able to reach 587 graduates since 2003. FIND OUT MORE



LIBERIA

Peace Hana School since 1998

Initially, Peace Hana was established to equip economically disadvantaged children from 3-6 years old with reading and writing skills and extracurricular courses. Later in 2002, the school was expanded to become an elementary school. There are currently 98 students enrolled. FIND OUT MORE





MOZAMBIQUE

Sun of Mozambique Secondary School since 1995

After a civil war in 1992, the country lacked resources and infrastructure for quality education. Sun of Mozambique offers quality education at a low fee. In addition to this, the school also provides scholarship programs to deserving students, and a library and computer lab facilities. The school has earned a worthy reputation, impacting the lives of 12,444 graduates, many of whom have gone to attend university. FIND OUT MORE



KENYA

Handow Secondary School since 1998

Handow is located in a poor neighborhood village far away from the capital with limited electricity and running water. Since its establishment, the school has successfully educated 2,130 graduates. With continuous support from WFWP, the school became accredited as a public school and later implemented a tuition-free policy in 2008. Donations have been utilized in the construction of the school's infrastructure and providing school supplies to the students. FIND OUT MORE

RWANDA

New Hope Technical Institute since 1998 and New Hope Professional Training Center since 2023



financially independent by equipping them with skills in culinary arts, dressmaking, and hairdressing. This has not only brought a sense of independence amongst the 2,501 graduates, but also a sense that they are loved and valued. One Hope Garden Literacy Class since 2014


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
