The Victorious Life of Tetsuo Tomeda February 23, 1950 - September 9, 2016

Tetsuo was born in Kojima City, Okayama, Japan, February 23, 1950. He joined the church in 1970 at the age of 20. Before that, he had joined the communist movement, but left, greatly disappointed because he could see the many flaws in communism. He was walking one day when he heard a sister giving a lecture about the four position foundation on a street corner and was instantly hooked. He signed up for the two-day workshop on the spot.

Tetsuo was Blessed to Kazuko in 1975 in Seoul in the 1,800 Blessing. He worked on various missions in Japan before being asked to come to USA in 1985 as caretaker for Sho-Fu-Den, a church property in upstate New York. There he worked on restoring the main buildings and taking care of the grounds.

True Parents visited Sho-Fu-Den several times. On

the first visit, True Father saw some deer and asked what he did with them. Testuo said he fed them apples. Father scolded saying they should be hunted. Years later, many of the True Children would visit

Sho-Fu-Den for hunting deer and bears, especially Hyo Jin Nim who loved to hunt with a bow and arrow. When the Tetsuo's last son was born in 1989, True Father visited just few days after the birth and gave name him the name "Chinam."

In 2012, Tetsuo was asked to move to Kodiak to take care of the large church-owned property in Chiniak, about 40 minutes outside of Kodiak. In Chiniak, the roads can be closed for days at a time during the winter and electric outages are a common occurrence. This would have been a difficult job for most, let alone for a couple in their 60s, but Tetsuo accepted the job without any hesitation and spent his time taking care of the ground and fixing the buildings.

Tetsuo was humble and quiet person who believed that everyday small acts such as morning Hoon Dok Hae and prayer were the foundation for a healthy life of faith. Even when he faced the most difficult situations, he always accepted them with the understanding that everything was part of his life of faith.

He is survived by his wife, Kazuko, four sons, Kazuki, Kenji, Kozo and Chinam, and three grandchildren.
