

Rose Gbadamassi's Testimony of the WFWP USA's Haiti Medical Mission Trip

I am Rose Gbadamassi, a member of WFWP Minnesota and the founder of the Haitian Community of Minnesota, a nonprofit focused on furthering the lives of Haitian families in Minnesota and in Haiti. I received the opportunity through WFWP to join Stand Up to Poverty Inc. (SU2P) for a medical relief trip to Tabarre, Haiti.

Haiti is very near and dear to my heart because it is where I was born and so I know firsthand information about the development and access issues that are present there at the moment. Also, this trip helps to prove that no matter the state of your condition, you can always help

those in need. Personally, I am disabled, and so it was uncertain whether or not I would be able to travel and help. Being that I've made it back safely and overjoyed, I can prove that this was both possible and worth it. I also want to share how the current pandemic COVID 19 impacted, yet did not halt, the trip.

Through the Haitian Community of Minnesota, I have experience collecting funds and supplies for medical surgeries in Haiti, providing assistance and support to local families; thus, when I was invited to join the WFWP delegation for this medical mission trip, I eagerly accepted. Fujiko Paul, the president of WFWP Haiti, supported us on the ground, and I cannot ignore the gift of love from WFWP USA and many generous donors that made this trip possible for Rev. Juanita Pierre-Louis and myself.

I left from Minneapolis on March 14th, flew to Miami, and then to Haiti, where I met with the main group of volunteers from New York. On March 15th, the first full day in Haiti, all of the nurses, doctors and volunteers met together for breakfast. We started accepting patients at the clinic immediately. My time at the clinic was spent mostly engaging with patients, assisting where needed, including collecting prescriptions and giving them to the doctors, and translating as needed. While patients were waiting to be seen, we discussed COVID-19 and demonstrated proper hand-washing. We allowed for questions and answers during this time.

Over the course of a week, a team of more than 100 medical professionals and other volunteers -- including dentists, surgeons, pediatricians, gynecologists and doctors specializing in diabetes -- was able to serve 850 Haitian people with a variety of needs. Quality medical care is not always readily accessible, and some people traveled several hours to benefit from our service. For example, 19 people traveled all the way from the port city of Cap-Haitien, which is about a six to eight hour journey. In addition to the medical services and medication we provided to local Haitian families, the children were entertained with face painting and jump ropes, which brought happiness as well.

Although we had originally planned to leave on March 20th, travel delays due to the evolving pandemic kept us in the country for several more days before we were able to return home safely. The mobile clinic program was very successful and everyone was well trained to serve with each other and provide excellent care to the patients and their families. Families were also very pleased with the care and personal loving attention that was shown to the children.

Thank you to all the volunteers, doctors, hosts and each and every person that contributed to this medical mission trip. Compliments also go to Rev. Juanita, SU2P Founder Astrid Fidelia and Dr. Emmanuel Samedi, who handled the education portion of this mission trip, as well as Dr. Sainteus Avis, Dr. Bruno Jean-Gilles (the medical director of CMCC), and the president of the Haitian American Veterans Association, Dr. Fritz Fils Aime.

THE NEED



Haiti's most recent demographic and health survey (DHS)

- Haiti is the poorest Caribbean nation with per capita income \$784 annually
- The middle class of Haiti reside outside of Haiti in the cities of: New York, Boston, Montreal, Paris, Miami, etc.
- \$3.5 Billion in remittances are sent to Haiti each year
- 80% of residents live in poverty
- Haiti has the highest infant mortality rate in the western hemisphere
- 67 deaths for every 1,000 live births
- 60% of people lack access to basic healthcare services



THE COLLABORATION



Stand Up to Poverty Inc. organized a medical mission with Stony Brook PA Program, Womens Federation for World Peace (WFWP USA), Haitian American Kidney Association (HAKA), Haitian American Veterans Association (HAVA), the Centre Medical de la Communauté Chrétienne (CMCC), Sante Nou and the Salesian Missions during Stony Brook's Spring Break. After the NYS Department issued a Level 4 Do Not Travel Trip Advisory, the Stony Brook PA students withdrew from the trip. Despite the political unrest and the Corona virus pandemic, the rest of the team were determined to bring much needed medical services and medicine to the impoverished. They traveled to Haiti and met up with licensed medical practitioners and provided exceptional services at CMCC which is adjacent to the Salésiens de Don Bosco en Haiti where the US delegation lodged.



THE INITIATIVE

CMCC was built in 1988 and is managed by Mrs. Marjory David, RNP Executive Director and Dr. Bruno Jean-Gilles, MD, MPH Medical Director. Its aim is to provide medical care to the most vulnerable people in the Tabarre community and surrounding areas in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. The center makes no religious considerations and its basic care and medicines have always been free. In order to promote health to combat chronic diseases and oral assignments, a medical mission supported by the STAND UP TO POVERTY group organized a medical outreach that took place during the week of March 16th–20th.

During this activity, many pathologies were detected and treated, such as:

- Hypertension
- Diabetes
- Parasitosis
- Anemia
- Malnutrition
- Genitourinary infections etc.

The staff was made up of several personalities including:

Physicians – (generalists, dentists, ophthalmologists, gynecologists, internists, urologists, pediatricians), surgeons, nurses, medical technologist, radiology technicians and volunteers



THE IMPACT



This year, The Womens Federation for World Peace (WFWP) International Vice President of North America and USA President Angelika Selle and SU2P became global friends. WFWP USA ran a successful online fundraising campaign to fund the National V.P, Reverend Juanita Pierre-Louis and Rose Gbadamassi's travel costs. Mrs. Selle arranged to have the WFWP Haiti President, Fujiko Paul and her team to join the medical mission.



THE IMPACT



We are so happy and grateful that International VP and National President WFPW USA Mrs. Angelika Selle and WFPW Haiti National President Mrs. Fujiko Paul, collaborated with our medical mission team to serve the Haitian people at this time of trials and challenges.

The 2 US representatives, Rev. Juanita Pierre-Louis and Mrs. Rose Gbadamassi, came with the heart of a mother. In the spirit of love and service, Rev Juanita gave a 30 minute session "Women Heal Theyself" every other day which included self healing, maintaining good spiritual and physical health. Not only did they assist in equipping those in need with practical medical help, but also spiritual and emotional empowerment and self help techniques. Mrs. Angelika Selle has been in Haiti in June of 2013, Cap Haitian, and came to know and deeply love the Haitian people. Haiti is very close to her heart. Special thanks to the entire WFPW USA staff for running an exceptional online fundraising campaign for this mission. They exceeded the \$5000 goal and raised \$7360 which was timely as we were stuck in Haiti for 3 days and incurred additional expenses. We hope and also pray, that one day, soon, all Haitian people will be living healthy, happy and fulfilled lives in Haiti!



THE IMPACT



After Rev. Juanita's passionate presentation regarding the importance of mothers, a volunteer, Gethro Mondelus, got inspired to mentor at risk boys. He explained how the boys start out as beggars when they're little then they grow up to become street thugs and take what they want forcefully. In response, Father Lex, the Salesian priest who hosted our stay offered their vocational schools to do an education outreach project with WFWP and SU2P to put the boys on a path to success. The SU2P Co-Founder / Salesian Alumni President in NY, Mr. Jean Alfred is a product of the Salesian vocational school. He became a licensed Electrical Engineer and CEO of American Electric Consulting. Because of this opportunity, he is living an exceptional life of service because with education comes transformation. With love, poverty will become history!



THE IMPACT



During our public health session, Dr. Emmanuel Samedy MD, SU2P Haiti Coordinator and Dr. Bruno Jean-Gilles MD, CMCC Medical Director gave valuable information in the waiting room and on Radyo Tele Soleil regarding the Corona virus, it's symptoms, the importance of hand washing and social distancing. The next morning, the volunteers and patients used both water stations to wash their hands. Knowledge is power!



THE IMPACT



Mrs. Astrid Fidelia gave a presentation on dental hygiene and demonstrated how to properly brush your teeth and the importance of flossing for healthy gums. The patients were very eager to receive the floss in the dental packages.



THE IMPACT



Our lead dentist, Dr. Fritz Fils Aime who is also the President of the Haitian American Veterans Association (HAVA) in NY left the US after his retirement and returned to Haiti to provide free services to the poor. He tours the countryside in remote areas and has serviced over 20,000 patients. During this mission he extracted 7 crumbling teeth from an 18 year old male. Many people have poor dental hygiene and have never been seen by a dentist before. We are making a real difference by providing dental services, medicine, lab work and dental packages.



THE IMPACT



A grieving WFWP Haiti volunteer, Lamarre Massily asked Mrs. Fidelia to console his wife as they lost their 1 year old son. Rev. Juanita and Mrs. Fidelia ministered to Emelyne and consoled her. When she was pregnant with twins, she was struck by a tire in her abdomen, had a miscarriage and the surviving twin died from a high fever. Even though they have 2 daughters, this toddler brought them so much joy. We uplifted her spirit to the point that she became a Stand Up To Poverty volunteer and spoke on Radyo Tele Soleil about the WFWP in Haiti.



THE RESULTS

Report

The medical outreach is one of the strategic means to detect and manage early certain potentially controllable pathologies. After a week, we were able to view and examine 850 patients with several different ailments which are as follows:
