True Parents Award First Prize to Generation Peace Academy at Choir Competition

Five months of rigorous practice paid off for the Generation Peace Academy (GPA) choir when it dazzled its audience and took the first prize of \$10,000 at the Second Unification Church Choir Competition in Cheong Pyeong, South Korea at the Cheon Jung Gung on January 27, 2012.

With its ladies dressed in traditional Korean *hanbok* and its young men dressed in western suits, the GPA choir performed Queen's "Somebody to Love" and a breathtaking medley of "Daniel Goes to Battle" and "Glory, Glory Hallelujah" in a meaningful display of cultural diversity. Unlike many of the other competing choirs, which had been preparing to perform before True Parents for more than a year, the GPA choir had been training at the Lovin' Life Learning Center in New York with conductor Nancy Kubo only since September of 2011.

The choirs participating in the competition were the following: The Cheon Bok Gung Cheon Shim (Heavenly Heart) Choir, the Cheon Bok Gung Cheon II Eum (One United Heavenly Sound) Choir, the Changwon One Love Choir, the Nigata Pure Hearts Choir, the Jiba Seonhak Choir and the GPA Choir, representing the United States.

True Father, True Mother and members of the True Family attended the event and selected the first-, second- and third-place winners after an extraordinary 14-hour *hoondokhwe* session, which lasted from 2:00 a.m. that morning up until 5:00 p.m., at which time the program for the competition began. In light of the True God's Day festivities taking place, the theme of the competition was "Celebrating True Father's 93rd Holy Birthday, True Parents' Golden Wedding and Jubilee Year and True Mother's *Gohui*."

"I missed a whole week of classes to be here and I have to say, it was wonderful," said Preston Shin-Myung Moon, one of True Father's grandchildren who had provided custom-fitted suits for the GPA choir though his clothier Bespoqe. "When I saw the different choirs, some of which were made of little kids half my height just belting it out, I wondered, 'What's going to happen to GPA? It's stiff competition!' But then GPA came up in dapper suits and beautiful *hanboks* and even before hearing them sing, I was speechless. The two songs were wonderful and I couldn't have been happier for them. Thank you for making my grandparents, aunts and uncles so happy!" he added.

Roland Platt, director of GPA commented: "This experience of ten minutes performing – and winning! – for True Parents, True Family and our movement will forever mark these young people's lives. In Jin Nim gave us an incredible opportunity to carry out her vision. They took it, worked tirelessly on it, and through the concerted effort of many people delivered internal and external excellence."

"These kids were transformed through their experience," said conductor Kubo. "They started from zero and went to a thousand. They developed their voices and as a choir so quickly it was astonishing. They've come so far and they're so united. They're like one voice. Coming to this competition, I had a lot of fear that things would be out of my control, that I wouldn't be able to fix things that weren't quite to my liking. So we all had to give ourselves up and trust God and trust our support team and that everyone was doing their utmost, which they did."

Eika Davis, third-year trainee: "Korea has been amazing. For me, the journey of being in a choir and being in an elder-sister role in the choir has been a journey of heart of attendance. I was so surprised that we were able to win the choir competition, but at the same time its not so far fetched because of how much support and love In Jin Nim put into the choir.
