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KOREAN DREAM FORUM AND FESTA 2025

The Forum featured expert panels and grassroots initiatives focused on policy, human rights, and regional cooperation, while the Hangang Festa culminated in an inspiring evening of music, performances, and a spectacular drone and fireworks show over the Han River—uniting voices, generations, and nations in a shared call for One Korea.



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
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Uniting Faith for Development: National Multifaith Coordination Committee Launched in Rishikesh Anjali August 22, 2025

wellbeing and sustainable development.

The committee aims to establish a structured, inclusive mechanism for faith-based action on key national priorities: Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH), health, nutrition, education, child protection, and climate resilience. Voices from across India's diverse spiritual landscape, including tribal and indigenous traditions, came together in a shared commitment to align values with action.

Representing the Global Peace Foundation (GPF) India, Chairman Dr. Markandey Rai emphasized the need to move from dialogue to development. Quoting the Upanishadic verse "Ekam sat vipra bahudha vadanti" (The truth is one, the wise call it by many names), he underscored the foundational Indian principle of unity in diversity. He added, "We are here not merely to discuss what faith can do, but to define how it will do it."

The day's highlights included a meaningful meeting between Dr. Rai and Hon'ble Shri Ram Nath Kovind, Former President of India. President Kovind acknowledged the MFACC initiative as a timely and necessary step in drawing upon India's spiritual traditions to address contemporary challenges. During the event, two key publications were launched—"Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam," reaffirming the timeless ethos of global unity, and the "Indo-Pacific Peace Forum Book," a compilation of youth-led peacebuilding efforts across the Indo-Pacific region, curated by GPF India.

Reflecting on GPF India's ongoing commitment to grassroots impact, Dr. Rai also highlighted initiatives that continue to bring faith-based values into direct service. The Facets of Faith platform fosters inclusive dialogue that moves beyond conversation to collective community engagement. The Period Awareness Drive (PAD) promotes sustainable menstrual health practices through workshops, youth outreach, and partnerships with community educators. The Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam Learning Centres provide out-of-school children—especially those from migrant and marginalized backgrounds—with access to quality education and support toward formal school integration. In the environmental space, GPF India engages youth through campaigns focused on tree plantation, clean-up drives, and ecological stewardship, rooted in the teachings of all faiths on the sacredness of nature.

During the MFACC deliberations, Dr. Rai proposed a set of actionable steps to operationalize and strengthen interfaith collaboration. These included mapping existing faith-based initiatives aligned with national development goals; developing joint toolkits on hygiene, education, and climate awareness; organizing interfaith service activities across communities; and ensuring the active representation of indigenous and underrepresented faith groups. These recommendations were unanimously adopted by the committee, reflecting a shared resolve to build inclusive and value-driven action frameworks.

Importantly, the gathering also coincided with May 28, which is observed globally as Menstrual Hygiene Day. Acknowledging this, Dr. Rai reminded the assembly that no meaningful development agenda can exclude women's voices and needs. He urged that all interfaith efforts must also champion women's health, dignity, and empowerment as central to community transformation.

In addition to these proposals, Dr. Rai recommended further structural enhancements to sustain the committee's momentum. These included conducting more meetings annually, establishing a Secretariat, setting up a designated office, introducing periodic reporting mechanisms, and promoting the publication of best practices from faith-led development efforts. These recommendations aim to build a sustainable, action-oriented platform that delivers real impact on the ground.

The launch concluded with a collective pledge from all participating faith leaders to work together in the service of India's communities. As the sun set over the Ganga, the participants joined the serene Ganga Aarti, a powerful symbol of spiritual unity and shared purpose.

The formation of MFACC marks a significant step forward in aligning spiritual leadership with sustainable development. With a unified vision and a commitment to coordinated action, the committee begins its journey with deep moral grounding and practical intent. GPF India remains steadfast in its resolve to collaborate with partners across sectors, translating shared values into lasting inclusive change.

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The Global Peace Foundation (GPF) hosted the "Mongolia Forum and Retreat: Northeast Asian Peaceful Development and Korean Unification" on June 24, 2025, at the Best Western Premier Tuushin Hotel in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia. Co-hosts included Blue Banner, One Korea Foundation, Global Peace Leadership Corps, and Action for Korea United. In addition to discussing the unification of the two Koreas, Mongolia's actions to counter climate change were also highlighted.


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Children's Day in Nigeria is not just a day on the calendar. It is a significant national moment for reflection on the state of the country's youngest citizens, and a call to action for society to protect, nurture, and empower them. The 2025 celebration held on May 26 in Abuja, organized by Global Peace Foundation (GPF) Nigeria in partnership with the Nigerian Television Authority (NTA), exemplified this purpose. More than a festive gathering, the event

was a powerful platform to highlight the rights, dreams, and dignity of every child, with a clear focus on empowerment, values-based education, and peacebuilding.



Hosted at the NTA Arena in Garki and broadcast live on NTA Knowledge, the event brought together over 1,500 children from more than 17 schools across Abuja, including schools for children with special needs. Millions of viewers from within Nigeria and abroad tuned in to witness a celebration rooted in the shared responsibility of families, communities, and institutions to invest in children holistically, not just financially, but emotionally, morally, and intellectually.

In her welcome address, Mrs. Bukola Da-Silva, General Manager of NTA Knowledge, reminded attendees that the future of any society depends on how well it invests in its children. She praised the event's collaborative approach and reaffirmed NTA's dedication to delivering content that educates and uplifts young minds. She added that for her and many others present, Children's Day is more than a ritual; it is a responsibility.

Several dignitaries echoed this sentiment. Representatives from the Sir Emeka Offor Foundation, the Create That Change Initiative, and the National Council for Arts and Culture delivered goodwill messages centered on creating an all-encompassing and nurturing environment for all children. Special emphasis was placed on catering to children with disabilities, recognizing their right to equal opportunities for expression, participation, and development.

One of the most powerful messages of the day came from Rev. John Joseph Hayab, Country Director of GPF Nigeria, whose remarks were delivered through the Foundation's Youth and Education Officer. He emphasized that Children's Day should serve as a solemn reminder of the fundamental rights of children, many of which remain unmet across the country. He called on stakeholders, including parents, teachers, policymakers, and media professionals, to recommit to protecting and empowering children to become peacebuilders, leaders, and change agents. "You are the heartbeat of this nation," he said, addressing the children, "Your laughter brings hope, your curiosity drives innovation, and your potential is limitless."



In line with GPF Nigeria's mission of promoting peace through values education, the celebration featured a series of performances that gave children a platform to showcase their creativity and perspectives. A standout moment was the presentation of "Echoes of Peace," a poetic and musical performance by students from High Grade International School, Mararaba. Their verses championed unity in diversity, mutual respect, and harmony, moving the audience with lines like, "In diversity, we find our strength, united we stand in love..."

The 2025 Children's Day Celebration aligned with GPF Nigeria's broader vision of integrating peace and values education into everyday life and of fostering collaboration among education, media, civil society, and faith institutions. It demonstrated a scalable model of children's programming that centers moral development and civic responsibility. More importantly, it affirmed that children, no matter their background or ability, can be empowered to build a peaceful and united nation.

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Legacy of the Americas was launched in 2020 under the sponsorship of the Global Peace Foundation. More than just a testimonial initiative, it defines itself as a civic



consciousness movement -an active force

committed to influencing the public agenda across the continent through principled ideas and proactive engagement.

The movement is grounded in a clear set of foundational principles: the existence of a Creator, the sacred value of human life, individual rights and responsibilities, free will, universal ethical values, the centrality of the family, character education, republican and democratic governance, economic freedom, ethical and innovative leadership, good governance, and a firm opposition to dictatorship in Latin America.



Legacy of the Americas Panel

Legacy began during the pandemic, starting with a series of online conferences that led to the development of a diploma program. Eight former presidents from across the region participated in these early efforts: Luis

Alberto Lacalle de Herrera (Uruguay), Carlos Mesa and Jaime Paz Zamora (Bolivia), Jamil Mahuad (Ecuador), Laura Chinchilla, Miguel Ángel Rodríguez, and Luis Guillermo Solís (Costa Rica), and Nicolás Ardito Barletta (Panama). More than 2,000 people from throughout Latin America joined these events via Zoom and YouTube.

Following the pandemic, Legacy formally organized its structure and expanded its activities. A governing board was established with members from Guatemala, Paraguay, Uruguay, Chile, Ecuador, Brazil, and Spain. Under its guidance, the Communications Group manages the official website (legadoalasamericas.org), a biannual bulletin, and a dynamic presence on social media platforms including Facebook, YouTube, Instagram, X (formerly Twitter), and TikTok.

To engage the next generation, a Legacy Youth Committee with 40 active members was created. It organizes the Youth Conference of the Americas, an open forum that addresses key issues affecting young people and features prominent voices from various sectors. The conference has already held five successful editions.

Legacy set three major goals for this year. The first initiative was the establishment of an Academic Advisory Council, chaired by former Uruquayan President Luis Alberto Lacalle de Herrera and comprising 20 respected leaders and thinkers from across the



region. The second goal was the continued growth of one of Legacy's flagship initiatives, America: Quo Vadis? — a high-level dialogue series featuring influential continental leaders, expert analysts, and an accompanying podcast.

The latest session, held on July 1, featured Argentina's Minister of National Security, Patricia Bullrich, alongside Uruguay's former Interior Minister, Nicolás Martinelli, Paraguay's Permanent Secretary to the National Security Council, Admiral Cibar Benitez, and former Argentine Congresswoman Cornelia Schmidt.

A third and long-awaited milestone was also achieved this year: the launch of the Legacy of the Americas Academy of Advanced Studies. Led by former Chilean Senator Dr. Carlos Cantero and Uruguayan psychologist Nibia Pizzo, the Academy began its first session on July 14 and will run for six months, offering weekly classes. The distinguished faculty includes former presidents, ministers, university professors, and international experts. The inaugural class includes 70 students—mainly in their twenties—representing a wide cross–section of Latin America. Participants come from diverse backgrounds, including university students, professionals, business leaders, and media communicators.

Today, Legacy of the Americas has active national chapters in Argentina, Brazil, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Cuba, Ecuador, El Salvador, the United States, Guatemala, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Paraguay, and Uruguay—demonstrating its growing reach and continued commitment to shaping the ideological future of Latin America.

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GPF Paraguay partners in preserving historic art in the Guaraní Project – Revista Ysyry

On Monday, August 25, the Ignacio A. Pane Municipal Theater hosted a historic evening: *Between Polkas and Guaranias, Tribute to the Guaraní Language*, organized by Global Peace Foundation and Instituto Patria Soñada, with the support of the National Secretariat of Culture.

The event coincided with three major commemorations: Guaraní Language Day, the centenary of the Guarania, and the 170th anniversary of the Municipal Theater itself. Within this framework, the Guaraní Project – Revista Ysyry (1942–1995) was officially presented. Declared of cultural interest, it rescues more than 14,000 poetic and musical works in Guaraní, Spanish, and Jopará.

Thanks to a digitization process launched in 2023, this valuable collection is now available in two complementary formats:

- The virtual library Oremba'e ("what is ours") offers free and open access to the materials. <u>orembae.org.py</u>
- The bilingual book Che Ñe'ē, Che Purahéi ("my word, my song"), which gathers a curated selection of nearly 200 representative works. See book

The night was filled with music and memory, featuring performances by renowned artists such as Los Alfonso, Spirit and Sound Orchestra, Rebecca Arramendi, Cristina Bitiusca, Alcides Ovelar, Julia Rosa Tarabal, and the duo Vocal Dos.

The tribute also welcomed former U.S. Ambassador to Paraguay James Cason, who spearheaded the recovery of *Revista Ysyry* and was recognized as an Illustrious Visitor of the City of Asunción.

A special highlight was a message sent by international singer Gloria Estefan, who celebrated the value of the initiative and expressed her admiration for the richness of Paraguayan music, which will inspire part of her upcoming Broadway musical.

The event gathered more than 500 attendees, reflecting the deep public interest in safeguarding Paraguay's cultural memory.

For the Global Peace Foundation, this event reaffirms our commitment to preserving the Guaraní language, strengthening Paraguayan cultural identity, and building bridges that unite generations.

As Dr. María del Carmen Giménez, of Instituto Patria Soñada, expressed:

"This project not only promotes the Guaraní language, it also connects us with the feelings and values of those who, through Ysyry, left testimony of their time and their love for Paraguay."

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Washington, D.C. — August 8th, 2025

For ten young North Korean escapees, this July was more than a trip to the United States—it was a journey from survival to statesmanship. Over eight days, the North Korean Young Leaders Assembly (NKYLA) immersed participants in the heart of American democracy, diplomacy, and dialogue. They met policymakers, engaged with thought leaders, and reflected on their own extraordinary paths from the world's most closed society to the global stage.

Since its founding in 2023, NKYLA has trained emerging leaders from the North Korean escapee community to become credible advocates for a free and unified Korea. Hosted by the Global Peace Foundation, this year's assembly brought together eight participants from South Korea and two from the United States, each with a personal history as compelling as the cause they champion.

From Military History to Defector Day



The program began on July 13 at the National Museum of the United States Army, where participants learned about the history and values that shape America's armed forces. Later that day, at the Alliance for Korea United's "North Korean Defector Day" event in Virginia, NKYLA founder Hyunseung Lee outlined the assembly's mission, and Fullbright scholar, Jihyang Kim shared her remarkable escape story—a childhood in the North, a perilous journey through China, and an unshakable belief in the power of truth.

Her words echoed across the room: "I survived, but survival is not the same as freedom. Freedom must be learned, protected, and shared." Read her full story on UPI.

Leadership, History, and the Long Road to Unification



On the designated Policy & Leadership Day, GPF International President Jim Flynn challenged participants to think of unification not as a political slogan but as a long-term nation-building project. A private roundtable with the Committee for Human Rights in North Korea (HRNK) deepened the conversation, exploring strategies to break the information blockade that sustains the Kim regime.

The next day's Diplomacy & History Day was a study in contrasts: the elegant Old Korean Legation Museum—once a symbol of Korea's sovereignty—followed by the solemn Korean War Veterans Memorial and Lincoln Memorial. Standing before the etched names of the fallen, participants were reminded that freedom always has a price.

Capitol Hill Conversations



Capitol Hill Day on July 16 placed NKYLA directly inside America's legislative heartbeat. At a congressional luncheon hosted at the Rayburn House Office Building in collaboration with Dr. Suzanne Scholte and the Defense Forum Foundation, members met policy influencers and staffers who shape U.S. policy on the Korean Peninsula.

For Tom Dokko, the moment was surreal. A former soldier in the Korean People's Army, Dokko defected by crossing the heavily militarized DMZ—an act so rare it made international headlines. "In North Korea, I was trained to see Americans as enemies," he reflected. "Today, I share a meal with them, discussing how to bring freedom and democracy to my homeland.

July 17 blended interfaith dialogue and historical reckoning. In the morning, participants joined a roundtable at the Religious Freedom Institute with American youth leaders, hosted at Pepperdine University's Washington office. The discussion underscored how religious liberty, often denied in North Korea, is a cornerstone of human dignity.

In the afternoon, the Victims of Communism Memorial Foundation hosted a panel featuring NKYLA members, GPF, and HRNK, where stories of survival met the policy frameworks needed for change.

Behind Closed Doors at the State Department



Perhaps the most consequential meeting came on July 18, when NKYLA members met privately with U.S. State Department officials. The conversation covered human rights, sanctions enforcement, and the role of escapees in shaping future policy.

For Kim Kangwoo, the discussion was deeply personal. As a

teenager, he escaped North Korea—but later risked everything to return and rescue his mother. Against all odds, he succeeded, and today they live together in South Korea. His story, chronicled in The Washington Post, is a testament to courage and the enduring bonds of family. "I once lived in a place where my voice meant nothing," he said. "Now, people in the highest offices listen." Read his story in The Washington Post.

Reflection, Culture, and Farewell

The final weekend balanced teambuilding and cultural exploration around Washington, D.C., before closing with gift shopping and tearful farewells. Bonds forged during sharing stories, deep policy debates, and shared meals will now span continents.

A Platform for the Future

North Korean Young Leaders Assembly 2025

NKYLA 2025 was not

just a program—it was a living demonstration that the future of a unified Korea will be shaped by those who have endured its division most personally. Each participant leaves not only with new skills and networks but also with the conviction that their voice can influence the course of history.

As Hyunseung Lee summarized in his closing remarks: "We are not just telling our stories; we are writing the next chapter of Korea's story."

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"Youth are the leaders of tomorrow, but also of today." These words from former UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan capture both the promise and urgency of investing in the rising generation. With the world facing complex challenges; climate change, political polarization, economic inequality, and rapid technological transformation, the role of young people as innovators and bridge-builders has never been more critical. The Global Peace Foundation (GPF) has embraced this reality by making youth leadership development one of its central missions. Through initiatives that combine values education, cross-cultural collaboration, and practical skill-building, GPF is preparing youth to inherit the future, and to shape it.

The GPF Approach to Moral and Innovative Leadership

GPF's youth leadership philosophy is rooted in the idea that young people must be developed as moral and innovative leaders. Moral leadership begins with character; living by universal principles that affirm the dignity of every person, foster trust, and guide decisions with integrity. Innovative leadership, meanwhile,

emphasizes creativity and entrepreneurship to solve the pressing problems of our time. By merging these two dimensions, GPF provides a holistic framework that equips young people to be successful in their careers and also agents of positive transformation in their families, communities, and nations.

GPF's programs around the world focus on creating opportunities where youth can practice this model of leadership. Service projects, peacebuilding initiatives, skills training, and global exchanges allow young people to gain experience in collaboration, problem-solving, and civic engagement. The guiding belief is that when given the right tools and values, youth are not passive beneficiaries of change but active architects of a more peaceful and prosperous future.

Youth Leadership in Action: GPF Brazil

In Brazil, GPF's recent initiatives illustrate how this global vision translates into practical opportunities. The JOAJU IT program, launching in São Paulo, is training young people aged 15 to 25 in information technology and artificial intelligence. The first cohort of 25 students will gain cutting-edge technical knowledge and also be guided by values that prepare them to use technology responsibly. By partnering with Paraguayan NGO NANDUTI TECH, GPF is also creating a model that can be expanded to other regions, with upcoming sessions planned in Tanzania, Goiânia, Goiás, and Rio de Janeiro.

In Goiânia, GPF Brazil is extending its commitment to youth leadership development through a professional training initiative targeting vulnerable women, including survivors of violence, single mothers, and low-income families. While providing technical skills in areas such as construction, financial literacy, and entrepreneurship, the program also emphasizes values and

dignity, ensuring that participants develop the confidence to lead both in their families and communities.

The GPF Brazil Youth Department has also taken a research-driven approach to youth development by conducting a national study on the needs of young people. The findings revealed that youth often lack avenues to fully express their creativity and ideas. In response, GPF is piloting student-led research initiatives beginning with business faculties, ensuring that youth themselves help shape the programs that will serve them.

Brazilian youth are also making their voices heard on the global stage. At the recent One Korea event in Seoul, Brazilian participants supported digital engagement efforts that helped reach over 90 million people worldwide. Later this year, a Brazilian youth representative will participate in the World Summit for Social Development in Doha, bringing youth perspectives to international discussions on sustainable development.

A Global Vision for Youth Leadership

With over 160 million young people in Latin America and the Caribbean alone, the stakes are high. This is the most connected and dynamic generation in the region's history, and their engagement will determine the course of political, social, and cultural development for decades to come. GPF, working with partners like the Esquipulas Foundation, FUNDAECO, and the Latin American and Caribbean Presidential Mission, is weaving together youth-focused initiatives into a broader ecosystem of social transformation.

The Global Peace Foundation believes that young people are not a problem to be solved but a resource to be cultivated. As GPF founder Dr. Hyun Jin Preston Moon has said, "The hopes of humanity rest upon our youth. With vision and moral courage, they can transcend divisions and become the pioneers of peace." This conviction underpins every youth program, from Al training to community resilience-building, making GPF's youth leadership work both timely and transformative.

The challenges of today demand leaders who can build trust, innovate boldly, and unite across divides. By cultivating moral and innovative young leaders, GPF is investing in a generation prepared to meet these demands. The commitment to empowering youth today is the surest path to building a more peaceful, just, and prosperous tomorrow.

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
