National HerStory Awarded in Washington, DC

To Heal the Family, the Mother Must Be Healed

Editor's Note: As the HerStory Award was not given at the National Assembly this year, President Angelika Selle held a district gathering at the Washington Times to present the award to Ms. Valencia Mohammed. Here is her testimony.

Ms. Valencia Mohammed, well-known for her activism to support mothers of murdered victims in the District of Columbia, spoke at the Women's Federation for World Peace International, *HerStory Award* gathering on December 19, in Washington, DC.

Ms. Mohammed shared with the audience her personal experiences as a mother who lost sons to gun violence, and how she used the pain

REFLECTIONS OF A BRIDGE OF PEACE CROSSING

Introduction

Native American spirituality is a religion unto itself and thrived for thousands of years before the Europeans arrived on the shores of "Turtle Island." The First Peoples' spirituality was not acknowledged by those who came; and genocide occurred. Over 300 nations no longer exist because of this religious strife.

The genocide was perpetrated mainly as a result of Pope (1431-1503) Alexander VI's, Demarcation bull, granting Spain possession of the lands discovered by Columbus. This resulted in the Doctrine of Discovery, basically giving right of "ownership" to European Christian monarchs through expeditions finding lands that were not inhabited by Christians. It is important to realize that the First People of America's spirituality contains many solutions and answers for world peace and guardianship of Mother Earth.

Representing the ancestors of over 500 Native American nations, Rev. Dr. Linda Lucero Nishikawa, Pojoaque Pueblo and CEO of United Native American Council; walked the Bridge of Peace. Representing the Roman Catholic Church was Archbishop George Augustus Stallings, National Co-Chairman of the American Clergy Leadership Conference (ACLC), and spiritual leader of the Imani



Temple African American Catholic Congregation, headquartered in Suitland, Maryland.

transgression which is transgressions inherited from one's ancestors through the blood lineage, as

mentioned in the Ten
Commandments in Exodus 20:5. In
addition, there is a collective
violation of Divine Law that one is
partially responsible for in other
specific groups' historical trauma.
The Bridge of Peace Ceremony
allows individuals and groups who
represent specific racial, religious,
political, and regional backgrounds

to actively confront the historical, hereditary, and collective painful sufferings endured in history to give birth to individual and ancestral healing, and hope for the future.

The atrocities that the Catholic Church brought to the First Peoples in North, Central, and South America are too painful to recall. This Bridge of Peace for me was very meaningful because I crossed the Bridge with Archbishop George Augustus Stallings representing Catholicism. I cried because there is so much enmity and pain; and there are 300 or more tribes that are extinct

because of the religious strife between Catholicism and Native Spirituality which was never acknowledged. We are so fortunate to try to emulate repentance and forgiveness that really reflect we are all children under God no matter how we look, no matter what race, no matter what color.

This Bridge of Peace was a formal national ceremony held in the beautiful Washington Times ballroom. May it never cease until the Kingdom of Heaven is accomplished on Earth. Every day



we have opportunities to cross a spiritual bridge of peace in our lives that can relieve the painful heart of the Creator, our Heavenly Parent, who endures the discords of humanity. We are our brothers' and sisters' keepers, and we can comfort our ancestors. It is a victorious feeling when we know we have overcome our personal limitations. Also it is a powerful prayerful life, when we can accomplish this reconciliation within ourselves and multiply it by helping others cross a bridge to peace in their lives.

On a chilly, Saturday morning, November 21, about 40 people, mostly young people, gathered to raise funds for "Schools of Africa" and for local youth group leadership programs through raking

For the first time in more than twenty years, the Parliament of the World's Religions returned to the

United States bringing people of spirit and faith from around the world to beautiful Salt Lake City, Utah. Ten thousand people from over 80 countries and 50 different religious and spiritual traditions came together to share, learn, network and celebrate. It opened on Thursday, October 15 and closed Monday October 19.

The 2015 Parliament continues a rich tradition of initiating dialogue and nurturing relationships among people of different faiths, providing a framework for expressing many visions of a just, peaceful, and sustainable future.

The theme of the Parliament was: "Reclaiming the Heart of our Humanity". What this really



means, according to a young visionary leader, is, "Thousands of kindred spirts, grounded in faith, coming together with compassion and forgiveness, with curiosity and convictions, with expansive vision and following a deeply personal call to action in response to the urgency of these times."

Thursday started off with the inauguration of the first Women's Assembly at the Parliament. 19 women addressed the first Parliament of World Religions in 1893. This year, women comprised over 60 percent of the 2015 parliament's registrants. This plenary brought together diverse female



religious leaders to address the vital nexus of women and religion. These leaders shared their collective wisdom for the empowerment of all, in addition to celebrating their achievements within the interfaith movement. The majority of the attendees and speakers at the Parliament were women, and their voices were well represented and received. Some of the major speakers were: Marianne Williamson, Mother Maya Tiwari, Dr. Serene Jones, Mara Lynn Keller, Bishop Barbara King, Vandana Shiva, Dr. Karen Armstrong and many more.
