

# **Two New Doctoral Graduates**



The ranks of Unificationist doctoraldegree holders have been augmented by two new graduates—Dr. Whitney Shiner and Dr. Dinshaw Dadachanji. The new graduates received their Ph.D. degrees from Yale University on May 25, 1992.

To take part in the celebration, Dr. and Mrs. David S.C. Kim travelled to New Haven, Connecticut on the morning of May 25th They were met in New Haven by Dr. and Mrs. Edwin Ang, Dean Therese Stewart, and several faculty members of the Unification Theological Seminary.

The main ceremonies of the Yale University Commencement were conducted in the morning. The ceremonies started with a beautiful prayer offered by the Yale University Chaplain, Dr. Harry Adams, following which the Deans of the various schools presented their candidates for degrees. Some students had creative attires; those of the School of Forestry, for instance had various types of flowers or branches over their caps.

Dr. Benno Charles Schmidt, President of Yale University, conferred degrees on the designated candidates. A bit of Yale history was brought to memory when the participants were asked to sing Psalm 65, *Thy Praise Alone*, which was sung at the opening of the first college building in New Haven, in 1718.

Another interesting touch of this Commencement was the conferring of the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws on Dr. Neil L. Rudenstine, President of Harvard University, which, as we know is the great competitor of Yale. Yale President Schmidt displayed a bit of humor and good cheer when he mentioned that since Harvard President Rudenstine had degrees from Princeton and Harvard, a lacuna was being filled that day by giving him a degree from Yale as well.

After regular and honorary degrees were conferred, the participants were asked to sing O God, beneath Thy guiding hand, and University Chaplain closed with a benediction.

Following the main ceremonies, graduates went to their respective schools to receive their diplomas individually. The Unificationist party proceeded to the Graduate School Commencement. Dr. Judith S. Rodin, Dean of the Graduate School, officiated the awarding of Ph.D. diplomas.

Dr. Dinshaw Dadachanji received his Ph.D. in the Department of Molecular Biophysics and Biochemistry. The title of his dissertation is *Studies on the replication and transcription of minute virus of mice DNA*.

Dr. Whitney Shiner received his Ph.D. from the Department of Religious Studies. The title of his dissertation is Follow me!: Narrative and rhetorical functions of the disciples in the Gospel of Mark, Greek philosophical biographies, and the Wisdom of Ben Sira.

Following the awarding of diplomas, and at the conclusion of a joyful session of copious photograph-taking (in which President Kim officiated as master of ceremony), the two Unificationist graduates and their guests adjourned to the New Haven Unification Church

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
center for a celebration luncheon. After a scrumptious meal, there followed a lively entertainment session, ably emceed by Yale University Campus Minister Mrs. Kathleen Burton. Heart warming songs and sharing were spontaneously presented by many of those present.

Of special interest was the two graduates' account of their feat in obtaining a Ph.D. in the midst of almost unsurmountable difficulties. Dr. Dadachanji shared with us the tension he felt between his desire to finish his academic work quickly and his desire to participate fully in church life and activities. Mrs. Burton told us about a fire that hit the New Haven Unification Church center just a short while before graduation. The manuscript of Dr. Dadachanji's dissertation (his only copy!) was in the center that day. The fire caused extensive damage all around, but the manuscript itself was untouched.

Dr. Shiner talked about his experience at the Unification Theological Seminary, where he first envisioned what an academic environment could be like that is, a place where one can serve God and True Parents through academic accomplishments. He talked about his gratitude to those who had opened the way for his academic career.

Another special feature of the entertainment session was the account of the graduates' wives of their own experiences over the years as their husbands struggled with their research. Mrs. Kimberly Dadachanji said that when she married Dr. Dadachanji in 1979, her husband said he was "almost finished" with his Ph.D. work. Thirteen years down the road he actually did finish, and she said it was hard for either of them to believe it had actually happened.

Mrs. Dadachanji also told us about how difficult it was for Dr. Dadachanji to explain to family and friends why it was taking so long to finish his Ph.D. work. After a while, she said, he was even afraid to talk to them, because he knew what their inevitable question was going to be. Mrs. Dadachanji's par-

ents were present at the celebration; and they were visibly proud of their son-inlaw.

Mrs. Josette Shiner also told us of a close call in saving her husband's dissertation from destruction. Dr. Shiner's manuscript (also his only copy!) was stored in a personal computer of the kind that was targeted to be attacked by the infamous Michelangelo virus. Mrs. Shiner found out about it just a few hours before the virus was to strike. Accompanied by an associate with computer expertise, she dashed back home just in time to protect the computer from the virus.

Mrs. Shiner also told us about her experience in the final days before the dissertation was due. Since the subject matter was so complex and technical, there was some question as to whether Dr. Shiner would be able to finish it in time. Mrs. Shiner said she took time off from her own job and worked side by side with him, literally 24 hours a day and that way they were able to meet their deadline. Through that kind of sharing, it became clear that the wives were worthy of a "Ph.D. in heart," for the enduring support they provided their husbands over the years.

Both graduates and their wives were unanimous in acknowledging their gratitude to our True Parents, as well as to Dr. and Mrs. David S.C. Kim, Dr. Edwin Ang and Dean Therese Stewart.

# Conference on How to Reach the Baby Boomer

On Friday May 29th, President Kim and I attended a conference in Albany sponsored by the Church Growth Institute of Lynchburg, Virginia. It's theme was How to Reach the Baby Boomer (people born between 1946-64). It was led by Dr. Elmer Towns. About 50 churches of various denominations attended. The conference covered topics such as understanding the boomer, sociologically and psychologically; how the boomer views the church; principles to reach the boomer; how to use hard data as well as the Bible to witness to boomers; the functional and spiritual gift orientation of boomers; their taste in worship and in church leadership; their interest in adult Sunday School; and how to "bond" them to the church and to Christ.

Boomers are significant because, among other reasons, there are about 75 million of them. They are now moving into positions of influence in society and church. They are markedly different from their parents. Materially, they have lacked nothing. They are technologically oriented, inclined towards team-work, relatively uninterested in doctrine and very interested in honesty and integrity. As they mature, they have not relinquished their youthful subculture and merged into the greater society. Rather, they have retained their values and are reforming society according to their ways.

# **Other characteristics**

- Immediate and short term in their value judgements.
- •Want religion to work, to solve their problems.
- Materialistic. They are loyal to themselves rather than to institutions and commitments. 52% of them divorce.
- Want choices, variety rather than control. For instance, they want choices of times of worship and types of worship.
- Do not like to attend meeting after work. 80% of boomer women have jobs.
- Distant church members. That is, they are away from home a lot of weekends.
- Raised in affluence and by TV on images of an ideal world, they are very idealistic and have high expectations. Churches must operate in professional ways.
- · They love peace.

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- · They are physical fitness enthusiasts. They are narcissistic. They have a tendency for their enthusiasms to burn out.
- They need counselling. Life for them consists of disconnected modules. In that sense they are dysfunctional and lack an integrating principle in their lives.
- · They are prodigious consumers. They are pragmatic. They define right and wrong by how they feel. They want practical teaching and preaching that helps them in their lives.
- · As youths they were a rebellious generation. They do not have a developed sense of guilt and will not be motivated by guilt.
- They are technological and have a need for hi-tech tools. They get their theology from the movies and from music.

#### Reasons to return to church

- · Their children; to provide them with values, relationships and family service. They want to know how to parent successfully. And how to relate successfully to their spouses.
- · Stability and symbol of belonging, for themselves.
- · Enduring values.
- · Spiritual experience. Churches that can help them "touch" God will draw them. They easily relate to Satan as a personality.
- · Security, in face of economic insecurity.

## What Boomers want from the church

- · "Fix-it" type sermons, that can be applied readily to their lives.
- · Excellence, in equipment and efficiency.
- · To be used according to their spiritual gifts. • Shared leadership, that is, team ministry.
- · Honesty, absence of hypocrisy.
- · Satisfying relationships.
- · Religious experience.
- · Cross-cultural religion.
- · Understanding of their culture.
- · Principles to live by.

· Professional quality nursery.

·Religious study, especially in groups, rather than religious teaching.

#### **Promoting church growth**

- ·Boomers need to hear the message at least three times before joining.
- · "Recruiting" needs to be very personal. They need to be contacted in various ways at least seven times.
- They should become part of a small group within a week or two. Large groups attract. But small groups keep.
- · Invest in whatever catalyst is bringing people to church. Be data-driven. Frequently survey.
- · Be people concerned more than program or doctrine concerned.
- · Have a think-tank and make sure it represents every sector of the church.
- · Use people according to their spiritual gifts. Develop missions to match gifts rather than trying the opposite.

Drs. Towns and Byrne

- · Services should encourage participation. They can be conservative but not traditional and should be experiential.
- ·Be evangelical. Teach religious truth in an expositional way. Let services be ex-citing yet dignified, inspiring awe. Provide small groups. Be congregational.

#### Leadership and Ministry

Both are needed. Seminaries promote ministry (building spirituality, developing faith and service). There is need for leadership, that is, for vision, professionalism, ability to solve problems.
