## INAUGURAL PRAYER LUNCHEON



On Friday, January 19<sup>th</sup>, several UTS faculty and staff attended the Inaugural Prayer Luncheon in Washing, D.C.,

sponsored by the Washington Times Foundation. The luncheon theme was "America Come Together." Over 1500 guests, ministers from virtually every Christian denomination and of all races, constituted the most comprehensive slice of Christianity ever to attend a meeting featuring our Founder – and probably the most diverse group ever to attend an inaugural prayer meeting.

Dr. Robert Schuller gave a moving and sincere speech, expressing his amazement at the diversity of the crowd. Alluding to our Founder, he praised them for attending a meeting with others holding theologies with whom they disagreed. Dr. Jerry Falwell spoke about ways the new President can honor God in his administration, for example by prohibiting partial-birth abortion and by supporting faith-based social initiatives. He also spoke of forgiveness for Rev. Jesse Jackson, whom he described as a "personal friend" who was taking responsibility for his mistake.

Other well-known speakers included televangelist Rev. Kenneth Copeland, Paul Crouch, President of the Trinity

Broadcasting Network, Rabbi David Ben-Ami reading a Jewish prayer, John Michael Talbot of the Brothers and Sisters of Charity singing St. Francis' Peace Prayer, James Merritt, President of the Southern Baptist Convention, John Corts, President of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, and singers Pat Boone and Vicki Winans. Attorney General designee, John Ashcroft made an unexpected appearance and gave a very moving speech. The President-elect did not attend.

Our Founder spoke briefly, in English, after which about 100 ministers close to him came on stage and presented him with an award. Rev. T.L. Barrett of Chicago summed up the whole luncheon with his closing prayer that we who live in the U.S.A. (United States of America) should live U.S.A. (Under Spiritual Authority).

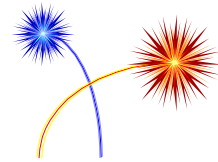

A Welcome Party for new students and in celebration of the new term will begin at:

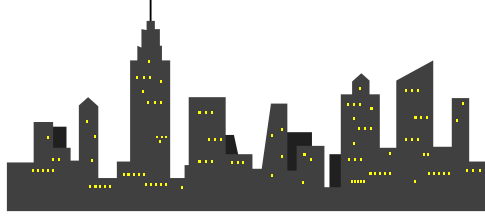
6:30 PM TONIGHT,

## RELOCATION DISCUSSION CONTINUES

Since President Hendrick's public meeting with the UTS community,



discussion has continued about possible relocation to New York City. President Hendricks recently had two meetings with Hyun Jin Nim Moon who emphasized that the location was secondary. Hyun Jin Nim stated that the key point was the Seminary's vision for the curriculum and challenged UTS to envision a leadership model that would add value to the Unification movement and its work. President Hendricks noted that Rev. Moon, in his Convocation Address at the founding of UTS likewise said, "The Seminary is not a place or building; it is the people who are equipped with the spirit and ideal given by God." While UTS is striving to add value, Dr. Hendricks said finances, and enhancing our ability to serve dictate consideration of relocation. This will be a major subject for discussion at the upcoming Board of Trustees meeting at UTS on Friday, February 2<sup>nd</sup>.

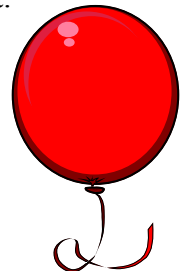

## STUDENTS FAVOR STAYING AT BARRYTOWN

Dean Corcoran distributed 60 questionnaires to UTS students at the main campus, asking if they had to choose whether they would prefer remaining at Barrytown or relocating to the New York City site. Forty-two (42) questionnaires were returned. Of these, 36 preferred staying at

Barrytown, 5 preferred moving to New York, and one was neutral. Students also had the chance to state the reasons for their choice.
