Even from the prison at Danbury, Father has been constantly making effort to support and nourish the ministers and clergy across the country and the membership of our Unification Church. The following are excerpts from speeches and letters that he has written in the past few months.


I have been missing you, coming back to you and seeing your faces so shining and bright, happy and filled with vitality is so very good. It's good to see you. I want you to know that we are going a pioneering path. It's not an easy path. It's a very difficult, stony, tough and difficult path sometimes. Sometimes you have to open up the path by exploding dynamite; you have to go pioneering stony path.

Father went to prison because he knew the law of indemnity; the law of restoration by indemnity. Father knew he has to pay incredible indemnity and debts. After paying that indemnity, incredible blessing will come. Father always sought to set the record to be worthy of God's blessing. If you try to turn the stage from high ground you won't do it. You have to lift up the stage at the bottom. So the perfection stages would be changed going from the bottom up, always upward.

For whom did Father enter the prison? Father entered Danbury to save America, and for those who are going to revive America. Among all young people, Unification Church youth are the ones ardently burning to save America. Father would like to give you the tradition, the inheritance of the true spirit that will not be removed from you. Father knows that every one of you walked a very difficult path up to 1984. He knows that every one of you

gave up the best time, the prime time of your life, for the sake of your mission. But then Father knew that God had been waiting for such people who could give up that time for the sake of the mission, and for the sake of the world.

"Time flies like an arrow" they say in Korea, and that is how most of us feel, as we are working to establish the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. On God's Day we had the incredible privilege to receive Father's message as a guideline for 1985. Besides the two God's Day messages, Father gave two speeches to the leaders on January 2 and January 4. At the regional workshops for our members, in January 1 have shared Father's January 2

speech with the brothers and sisters as well as during our "internal guidance" evening on Tuesday, February 12. We have planned a Metro area level seminar for our members on Saturday, March 2. At that time, we will share again Father's directions. This newsletter will contain excerpts of the midnight speech, the January 2 and January 4 speech.

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Father's Speech to Leaders History so far has been a history of January 4, '85

History so far has been a history of division. But, in the end, there has to be a history of unification. The necessity of religion becomes apparent. The reality of the fall of man becomes apparent. There are forces that go against God. The situation cannot be resolved without religion. Most important of all is the declaration of the existence of God. Our first job is to declare to the world, in the shortest possible time, that He exists, approaching it theologically, philosophically, scientifically, with commitment heart and integrity.

We should know Unification Church history, because we have a goal and history represents our path to that goal. Father is our tradition setter. To hit the target, we have to follow his tradition exactly. Don't try to make your own foundation from "scratch." Realize the value and preciousness of our tradition and lifestyle. Father is making an example to others...of the successful

way to go. Father knows our message

will get through if we come to the ministers in love and tears.

The following excerpts were taken from a letter written by Reverend Moon to ministers throughout the country.

Dear Pastor,

I feel we can build upon the precious things we share and believe in common and work together to raise up the standard of morality and justice in America . . . We feel that our primary calling is 1) to promote love and unity in the body of Christ around the world, 2) to restore the family, and 3) to counteract atheistic materialism with a God-centered viewpoint.

Writing to you from prison like this reminds me of the great Apostle Paul who wrote much of the New Testament while in prison for his faith. I have felt the presence of God in a mighty way while here. And I now understand more deeply the words that Paul wrote in Philippians 4:12:13: "I know both

how to be made low and I know how to abound: everywhere and in all things I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

I know the time will come when God will totally exonerate me, and I have tried to be a model prisoner while serving out my sentence in this prison. But until that day of exoneration comes, I ask that you pray with me, and that you speak out for and defend religious freedom for all God-loving people in America . . .

On January 12 the Raleigh center hosted a state level International Conference for the Clergy (ICC). 54 ministers attended the conference which was held at the Radison Plaza Hotel in Raleigh and co-sponsored by the Shaw Divinity School. The convenor of the conference was Dr. Joseph C. Paige, the Associate Dean of the Shaw Divinity School. Presentations were given by Reverend Tom McDevitt, and included the Unification Theology of the Creation and the Fall. Dr. Paige has been active with the efforts of CAUSA. He is the Chairman of the Rural Baptist Committee and this Spring he will host a state-wide conference for these rural ministers.

"Hesitancy To Return to God" By Isaac Brooks

(The following excerpts were taken from an article written by Isaac Brooks for the Common Suffering Fellowship newsletter. Isaac Brooks is the director of Put Religion In School Education (PRISE) and participates with several national organizations in their strategies against Communism.)

We have come a long way since May in the religious liberty arena when it was decided that encroachment by the government on religious freedoms could no longer be tolerated. We have been educated on the religious liberty issues. We have met and fellowshipped together. And we have shown compassion for each others views that may be a little different from our own.

For all of this we praise God and give Him glory.

Now that you and I have been to the well and drunk this rewarding water, our work has just begun. I would like to emphasize that in all our endeavors we need to pray for those victims whose religious freedoms have been encroached upon by the government, that they may gain strength in their perseverence and, above all, that their suffering will not be in vain.

In most countries of the world there is a basic religion that most of the people pursue. America is one of the few countries that has a pluralistic society with pluralistic religious aspirations. It is amazing that our Founding Fathers had the insight and fore-

sight to provide for the religious freedom of such a multi-religious country as America.

But today, we find the men and women of this country hesitant to return to God. There are basically four factors contributing to this unfortunate state: 1. Lack of conviction in the existence of God. 2. Lack of knowledge of God's purpose of creation. 3. Mixed signals coming from religious institutions; and 4. Inability to demonstrate a truly unselfish nature.

These four factors should be kept in our hearts and minds as we endeavor to minister to the people of this country and the world.

Our Founding Fathers foresaw a great direction, vision and spiritual growth for this country. However, all these elements are retarded when men and women are cut off from God, their physical selves have no conscience and no heart of love. Can you see why this factor has such great impact



Common Suffering Fellowship

At this time, over 600 ministers have attended the Common Suffering Fellowship seminars. The CSF is held weekly in Washington, D.C. with participants arriving on Monday and leaving Friday. The week includes a diverse and enriching set of activities including visits to the participants Congresional representatives on Capitol Hill, a Religious Freedom Rally in front of the White House and presentations and workshops on current issues and strategies in the field of religious freedom. Notable leaders in religious liberties activism as well as Unification Church leaders are among the presentation makers.

As important as these practical activities is the spiritual side of each week. Each day begins with a morning worship. Wednesday evening provides an "open pulpit" for voluntary preaching and testimony by participants. Song and prayer

makes this night an especially moving one. Unification lecturers provide theological stimulation through presentations on key elements of Reverend Moon's biblical interpretation, focusing on the mission of Jesus and the Second Coming.

Member's Experiences

Father had asked us last year to visit ministers and unite with them in the spirit of Christian love and brotherhood: but, up to now, I did not feel any personal accomplishment.

I did visit ministers, but I did not feel the presence of the Holy Spirit working with me. So I prayed and prayed and asked God to help me and guide me so that I would start becoming a good instrument for Him for such a respon-

In prayer, I felt strongly that God wanted me to find members who could be my examples and who could teach me how to handle that mission. I also became more and more aware of the fact that I needed more knowledge of the Bible and of the Divine Principle. I also realized that I needed to study the theology of other Christian churches.

When a friend and his wife who are members living in Virginia asked my husband and I to spend an evening with them, I expressed my need for help on the matter of visiting ministers. The give and take that we had was nourishing and uplifting. I felt that it was possible to share my thoughts and the warmth of Christian brotherhood. My heart was filled with confidence. I started to believe again that I was capable of influencing religious leaders positively towards our Father, our teaching and our church.

The following day we went to visit two Baptist ministers. We had an overwhelming experience as we listened to the sermon of a visiting minister. His topic was "Together, Togetherness." Here are some of his words:

"Satan separates, God brings together. Prayer comes before anything else we do. Husband and wife who pray together stay together, parents and children who pray together, stay together, countries who pray together, stay together. Even though God is almighty, He wants togetherness with us because we are his family."

The other minister we visited invited us into his office. He shared with us about his efforts to breed, within his own congregation, the barriers of prejudice and discrimination. He said that same morning he had given a sermon on God's love.

He spoke about the greater value of loving those whom we don't know. He said that he meant to love people who belong to other religious groups, even groups who are known to be unpopular. He talked about the damage made by the media who have tried to destroy the reputation of many religious groups. He told us that he had known for a long time that Reverend Moon was subject to unfounded religious prejudice and that he had decided not to side with such an unfair attitude.

I am deeply grateful to God for giving me such an inspiring weekend.

Two experiences

Reverend Smith gave his usual sensitive and articulate sermon a few weeks ago when we went to visit him at his church. Lately he'd been having trouble with his blood sugar level and was exhausted after delivering his ser-

When his service was over, we went with Reverend Smith to his office and told him that we wanted to pray for his health. When we were done, he wiped away his tears and told us how a congregation often doesn't know how

much a pastor needed their prayers.

Although we had spoken to Reverend Rollins by phone, this was the first time we were meeting him. After sharing with him, we asked if he would pray with us before parting. Our experience was deep and beautiful, and the next week when we were at his service he testified about it from the pulpit.

We have remained friends with Reverend Rollins. He has joined CAUSA and in a few weeks we will be hosting a CAUSA lecture at his church.
