In late July, we had the pleasure of attending our first Summer Family Camp, and bringing our granddaughter, Chloe, with us. We were blessed with good weather but, much more than that, we were blessed to be part of a really well organised, family-oriented programme, inclusive of all ages, where friendliness, respect and creativity were the order of the day. We found ourselves asking "Why didn't we come to this before?!" This was reflected in Chloe's experience. On the first morning, she was a bit reluctant to stay, talking about home, but by the end of our stay she was very reluctant to go, sad to leave and say goodbye to everyone, having made friends with young people of all ages.



Of course, the Summer Camp has been running for many years now, but it still takes a lot of organising by a very dedicated core group of both older & younger people. Witness the daily Tesco/Sainsburys etc 'home deliveries' arriving outside the main door of Cleeve House each morning, with enough food to 'feed the five thousand' for the day.

Unfortunately, staying in an air bnb, we weren't able to join the Hoon Dok Hae and then physical exercises at the crack of dawn, but we could see they were well attended and gave a nice, meaningful start to the day for all those taking part.

Mind / body balance. After morning service and breakfast, the main part of the day was usually taken up with a variety of team games most of them greated by the indefatigable Simon Posselli, and implemented by Alex and Arvan, with some

help from other young adults. There were no winners and losers, in the sense that all the different teams gradually accumulated points as the games went on through the week, but the striking thing was how all the team members were involved, and played their part, whether 8, 18 or 28 years old. You can imagine the scene.

The team spirit was also abundantly evident in carrying out practical responsibilities during the day, particularly at meal times, with food preparation in the kitchen, serving everyone in the main hall, and even in the washing up. Those of us who are more advanced in years all felt so much warmth and love from the children and young adults serving, as we queued up to receive our breakfast, lunch and dinner.
