As always the South London Family Camp turned out to be as magical as ever. The weather helped with very little rain (and mainly sunshine) through out the 5 or so nights that we spent at the famous Belchamps Scout Camp in Essex (near South End). My family got down there early in the afternoon of the arrival day and got our tent sorted out, and enjoyed catching up with people as they began to arrive.

What makes our time down there so special every year is really down to a mix of different ingredients. There is of course all the preparation and well worked out plans from the staff team, there is Toby Warren's edgy humour, that always goes right to the edge when he takes a turn as MC. The short drama productions (can't really call them skits anymore – it wouldn't do them justice) are always a highlight with some zany plots & nail biting sequences, and then there is Ajay Rai's 'Review & feedback' slot that just adds an extra bit of class and is probably why the quality of the performances seems to trend upwards each year.



Then there is the fact that this is not just a bunch of teenagers or kids at a workshop with some older young people, or a bunch of relatively elderly people at a conference or a seminar, but instead it is everyone from the cradle to ...the retired. And that seems to bring a balance to the energy in the group which allows for a very cosy and warm spirit. The kids hang out with the kids, and parents hang out with each other but we are all together at the same time.



A lot of the main organisers despite doing a lot of organising still find time to hang out and talk with friends and be very present. And there is generally a very social atmosphere.

But there is, at least for me, a very special ingredient to the South London recipe, which is that, regardless of my doubts about whether it is going to be any good the 7th time around, I invariably meet with God in a very personal and profound way. This time round it was after the first early morning program (which most of the adults go to) and which is always, as with so much at the camp, so well prepared. I just had a deep sense of seeing myself and my efforts over the last 6 months of the year as God sees them: 'not great, but at least he is trying...'. Anyway not to get too personal, and long winded about it, but suffice to say I had to go off to our tent for a little while to be by myself, and shed a little tear of thanks. I can always identify those experiences, as after I tend to see everyone quite differently for a while before the ego creeps back in.



Back to the camp: we had a great trip to a lake where everyone went kayaking, a windy trip to the beach, the camp fire night, the BBQ, the races, the archery, wall climbing, and all the other usual fun things. I enjoyed helping out in the forest as one of the 'hunted'. There were moments when a team of 8 people trying to track and chase me down meant that I could relate to Jason Bourne...and I've always wanted to be able to do that.

Everything from the accommodation to the food, to the activities was well thought out and planned with precision. I especially loved the Daddy Day Care concept. Even though I only met Farad Ajay and Uncle Simon a few days before, I felt the kids would be safe enough to go with them and that they would look after them very well.

I hope you will invite our family back next year. I would appreciate as much notice of the dates as being self employed I have to let the parents know so that I can book time off and they can book time off as well. Savio will come with us next time, as like other fathers, he is isolated and needs to socialise more with other fathers and share experiences and struggles.
