Interview of Bo-yeon Kim: Divine Principle Slide Presentation at Cheon Bok Gung

Question: We are here with Bo-yeon Kim, who has just given a seven-minute memorized Divine Principle lecture. Could you first tell us about how you come to Cheon Bok Gung on Sundays.

Well, first, my house is very far away. My mom and grandma go to Pyeongtaek Church, so I have to come by myself or with my brother riding the subway. It takes quite a lot of time to come here.

Question: How long does it take?

About one hour and a half to two hours; we leave the house about 7:50 and we arrive about 10 or so.

Question: What compels you to come here when you mother and grandmother go to church near your home?

Well, I first came here when I was about five or six and I have a lot of friends that stayed here.

This is a really big church, so I enjoy the events at Cheon Bok Gung. I thought it would be more fun to come here and better for me to come here so I can learn more.

Question: What do you do on the long train ride?

I usually talk to my brother or listen to music.

Question: You come so far for Sunday service but also now for lecture practice?

Since my teacher told me that I had to do it today, I have had to practice every Saturday. So I had to come to practice for about two to three hours. Yesterday, we had to change a little bit of my speech, too.



Question: How did they change it?

It was ten minutes, but then they changed it to seven minutes. I was only doing a three-minute speech and then the teacher asked me to do a ten-minute speech, but I couldn't memorize all of that, so they made it shorter, seven minutes. I practiced with my grandmother and that helped me memorize it.

Question: Was your grandmother a good audience?

She coached me, and she would correct me if I got it wrong.

Question: The pastor started this program long ago. Have you been doing this for long?

Well, I only did the three-minute speech two times, and this is the first time I did seven minutes and it

was amazing!

Question: It was amazing; I thought so, too. The pastor said he started this program here three years ago, when he started preaching here.

Well I came here only for two or three weeks -- and only on Saturdays.

Question: Did you get a certificate?

No… I got a prize. It's a small Chambumo Gyeong.



Question: Did you concentrate on the same lecture the whole time you were training?

I guess. Well, every Saturday when I came here, my teacher and other people were thinking about taking some parts out and changing it and trying to make it better. For example, yesterday, I had to change the last part, so it was difficult for me to get it.

Question: But you spoke very smoothly.

Did I? People said it was good but I'm not sure.

Question: Before today, what is the largest crowd you have ever spoken to?

This is my second time doing it in front of everyone. I did it last year. It was the first time I won the three-minute contest. The teacher told us whoever wins the three-minute contest has to do it in front of everyone. So, this is my second time.

Question: Were you nervous the first time?

Yeah, I was very nervous and kind of scared that I would get things wrong, but eventually, it was not bad, so I thought it would be OK to do it this time, too.

Question: You seemed very confident.

Well, a few days ago, there was a contest; I was the only one who did a seven- minute speech in the contest and the person who judged us said I smiled a lot and I should not do that. So I was thinking to not smile when I was doing this speech. The guy said that smiling was not OK because it made me less confident. It looked less like a good speech.

Question: Did you get to choose what part of Divine Principle you memorized?

Uhmm··· I did the short one last time, so I thought it would be easier if I did the same topic so I woudn't have to go over everything.

Question: Is this your favorite part of Divine Principle?

I'd say it's the easiest part for me to memorize. Even in the three-minute speech, it was the shortest one, so it helped me memorize better.
