Event Increases Human Trafficking Awareness in Tampa

The WFWP Tampa chapter has been networking with various women's organizations in order to make a foundation to launch the Global Women's Peace Network (GWPN) locally. The chapter has been working with Pastor Anne Tom-Wright, founder of (Women in Ministry) Daughters of Zion and has been meeting Sunday evenings at her church to share in Bible studies on the lives of women in the Bible. WFWP members also conducted meetings and planning events with various local women's organizations, all of which were geared to promoting awareness of issues affecting the family, youth, and women.

Based on this, on December 21 Pastor Tom-Wright held an evening program on human trafficking that was attended by 20 women, including several leaders from local women's groups. Pastor Tom-Wright brought in one deputy sheriff and a trafficking survivor as experts on the subject. The participants learned that human trafficking is taking place right here in Tampa, and through that knowledge gained the resolve to do something about it.

Mrs. Evelyne Drake, Co-Chairwoman of WFWP Florida, opened the program with prayer, and introduced what WFWP and GWPN are doing on the national and international levels, which is to bring awareness of the extent of human trafficking around the world and nationally. The women exchanged information to begin the process of cultivating cooperative efforts and relationships for future action. All agreed to meet again soon to continue the effort.

Mrs. Chimes read from the autobiography of Dr. Moon's late husband, the Rev. Dr. Sun Myung Moon, in which he dedicated one chapter to his wife, "My Wife Hak Ja Han Moon." Mrs. Chimes explained that Dr. Moon had birthed 14 children "with so much love -- and she never complained." One interesting excerpt says, "Children are God with very small hearts." This quote led to an explanation of the four realms of the development of the heart, focusing on the children's and parents' realms.

African Craft Fundraising in Boston

Throughout the year, the Boston Chapter of WFWP sells African crafts to raise money to send to the Schools of Africa Project. Where did the goods come from? Mrs. Phyllis Loum, a longtime active member of WFWP in Boston had a business importing and selling African goods.

In 2008, Phyllis passed into the spirit world, and her husband, Souleman, who is from Senegal, decided to donate seven huge trunks of African goods to WFWP in honor of his wife and to help the Schools of Africa Project.

So Mrs. Peggy Brewster and the Boston chapter began selling the goods from Africa to raise funds to support the WFWP schools in Africa. They sell the goods after their local church services as well as at flea markets, and all the money from these sales goes to Africa.

In 2013, however, because of the devastation caused by the huge storm in the Philippines, most of the fundraising done by Boston WFWP went in another direction -- to

provide disaster relief to the Philippines.

According to Mrs. Brewster, "There are a number of Philippine members in New England, and our hearts went out to the people there in the Philippines. People have been very generous and the Boston chapter was able to send more than \$2,000 plus some supplies to the Philippines. The next project will be to collect summer clothes to send. Ms. Song Ja Ono had spent time in the Philippines and even though she is dealing with her own serious health problems, she was really the prime mover in this effort."





Columbus, Ohio Chapter Conducts Survey

The Ohio chapter of WFWP conducted a survey of young women in local churches and also within the chapter membership. The main goal was to see how participants view WFWP and its role, what projects they would like to participate in, and what support they expect from the Ohio chapter. The survey was available online, as well as in printed form. Board member Mrs. Yoshie Moore translated the survey into Japanese, because some of our chapter members here have limited English proficiency. Mrs. Marcia Schlichting, WFWP chapter secretary, suggested having a survey table after her local church service and created a poster to use entitled, "What would you like to do to help and what would you like to contribute?"

The survey table and poster attracted people's attention and more people came to investigate.

Fourteen women participated in the survey. The majority of the participants were over 43 years old, and 36 percent were women younger than 35. Seventy percent of the participants were paying members, while the rest had either attended some events or had heard about WFWP but had not become actively involved.

Of the participants surveyed, 90 percent see WFWP as a project-based group that provides women with opportunities to attend talks, programs, or conferences focused on reconciliation and other peace-building activities. A total of 70 percent of the respondents believe WFWP is a vital organization representing women all over the world. Our respondents' favorite answer about the activity they would like to be involved in was the Relationship Intelligence program (50 percent). Most of the ladies would like to receive support from WFWP in the form of marriage and family relationship workshops or counseling (57 percent, including young women).
