Dear friend,

To celebrate and commemorate Women's History Month in March here in the United States of America--to highlight, honor and recognize the great contributions women and mothers have made throughout history--is a great step indeed, as recognition of women's value has been absent for so long in human history!

Toward a New Paradigm of Peace, Partnership, and Development By Angelika Selle, President, WFWP USA

In the middle of February in subfreezing temperatures 200 men and women world leaders gathered at the International Leadership Conference in Seoul, Korea. The conference was entitled "Toward a New Paradigm for Peace and Human Development" and was co-sponsored by WFWP, Family Federation for World Peace, The Washington Times, and Segae Ilbo, a Korean newspaper.

These conferences occur twice a year in Korea. This year's setting, from February 9-12, was smaller than usual but of excellent quality. All presenters brought forth many great ideas filled with insights into what it takes to bring about change, or a needed paradigm shift, for making world peace a reality in various world areas, such as Northeast Asia and the Middle East, and in various cultural areas, such as the media and education.

The highlight of the opening session was a 10-minute Founder's Message from Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, which was read gracefully and passionately by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Julia H. Moon, general director of the Universal Ballet in Korea. It inspired many. The founder, Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, ended the conference with a Call to Action to all Ambassadors for Peace who were present, asking them to further study the

Hope for Racial Understanding

Reconciliation begins through beginning to see the good in people's differences, instead of just seeing and fearing the differences themselves. Many people are working for just such understanding. If you are one of them,

then the meeting that took place in Bowie, Maryland on Saturday, March 1 will be of interest to you.

We sat in a "talking circle" to listen to Gray - Michael GrayHawk Parsons -- introduce his story that is woven into his newly published book, Hope on Hatterask. His story is truly a story of the melting together of people of different cultures and races who intersected with each other because of their decisions to honor and respect people's differences, instead of insulating themselves in the familiar.

In Hope on Hatterask, Gray evokes the spirits of his ancestors, his maternal great-great Kim Dadachanji, Dottie Chicquelo, GrayHawk, Paul grandparents, a Scots Irishman and an Algonquin Coastal and Skura:re (Tuscarora) Native American woman. In this historical

fiction, based on their true story, their lives collide and merge with a man of Senegambian descent on the shores of Hatterask Island, North Carolina.

In case you are not familiar with the geography of North Carolina, Hatterask (Hatteras) Island, part of the Outer Banks, is a barrier island off the Carolina coast. Gray explained that many of the names that are used today are not the original Native names given to these places and rivers. For example, the present Pamlico River and Sound were originally called Pamptico by the North Carolina First Peoples.

Gray writes in his description of the book: "It is important to recognize that the three main characters represent, in a general way, the three racial ethnic groups that comprise the vast majority of the American population today. And they certainly represent those who played the most significant role in shaping what American society is today since the first recorded contact between English-speaking Europeans and Native Americans. They are Red, Black, and White people...

The story takes place in the early 1800s and chronicles their lives from early adolescence through early young adulthood. Each character's individual culture, ethnicity, spirituality, geography of origin, and ancestral history is explored in detail. Their stories are told in their voice from their perspective and with candor...

"My prayer for you is that you will discover or rediscover a profound respect and appreciation for your own ancestral past. Perhaps in doing so you may even move forward in some way with a renewed hope for your future."

She introduced the Happy Health Machine to us and explained that it uses electrical acupressure to align the magnetic fields of our body. Near-Divorce Experience

On a typical middle-of-February snow-covered morning, the Minnesota Chapter of WFWP hosted a special presentation on marriage and family. Mrs. Jeannette Henry, local WFWP chairwoman, presented an introduction and explained the significance and mission of WFWP, emphasizing marriage and family.

The main speakers, Dr. John Souza and Mrs. Deepa Ram-Souza, are family and marriage therapists who specialize in sociocultural, interpersonal, and intrapersonal issues. They gave a heartfelt presentation of their real-life experiences as husband and wife, discussing how marriages can achieve equality, how to deal with conflict, the importance of self-awareness, and how to grow as a couple. They spoke from experience and also from their training as psychotherapists.

Launching their presentation, they told the story of how they met, which was remarkable! While they were attending the same graduate school, John dialed a wrong number that just happened to be Deepa's. As they spoke, they took turns, each building on what the other said.

They call their main theory the "Near-Divorce Experience," or NDE. It is a model composed of three "lenses" that, if observed, can save a relationship, even one on the verge of divorce. The three lenses are the interpersonal, the intrapersonal, and the social-cultural.

John and Deepa explained how they personally had experienced the NDE. Their presentation was valuable because it gave advice for how to deal with conflict, how to grow as an individual, and how to develop as a couple. Their model is to teach each partner the practices and habits that help marriage become a successful "happily ever after."

Human Rights and Religious Freedom Victory --Hope for Women in Japan

In Japan, thousands of Japanese men and women have been held against their will for months and even years in makeshift prisons in order to force them to recant their chosen religion. Eighty percent of these victims of faithbreaking are women, and many are members of WFWP.

As was reported in the February newsletter, after four years of court battles, Mr. Toru Goto, who had been held against his will for over 12 years, was finally vindicated. However, this year alone, two more Unificationists have gone missing and are suspected of being held against their will by faithbreakers.

Abduction and confinement of adult Unificationists in Japan is generally conducted by the abductee's parents under the guidance of a professional "deprogrammer." But it is an experience devastating to everyone involved. After release, survivors often suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder, and often the parents who conducted the abduction find that their adult children are completely emotionally estranged. If the survivor was married with a family, the two spouses and the children experience their own trauma.

Women's Federation for World Peace USA has been involved with anti-faithbreaking efforts by creating awareness, holding local meetings with testimonies of women victims of the faithbreaking in Japan, and interviewing victims on the radio. Further, WFWP has visited dozens of congressional offices in Washington, D.C. with Japanese victims to bring awareness of this issue to U.S. lawmakers.
