July 18 marked a hundred years since the birth of Nelson Mandela, the human rights champion, president of South Africa (1994–1999) and Nobel Peace Prize Laureate. I stand before you today to venerate a man who epitomized the words extolled by Dr. Sun Myung Moon and Mrs. Hak Ja Han Moon, that is, "live for the sake of others." The life Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela lived was never self-serving; he always lived for the betterment of the collective whole. I am deeply and profoundly honored to deliver this message on behalf of the founder of the Universal Peace Federation, Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon.



Today, as we celebrate the centennial birthday of President Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela, let us be reminded and indeed reflect on his selfless service not only to the Republic of South Africa but to the entire human race. We call on all peace-loving citizens in the world to observe this day in particular and this centenary year of Mandela with appropriate activities and ceremonies that honor and give thanks to this icon of humanity. Let us remember and honor Madiba's valor and the sacrifices that he made for the cause of peace. It is worth noting that Madiba, in his magnanimity, always pointed out and reminded us that he did not fight the struggle single-handedly. We therefore want to remember and honor his comrades, too numerous to mention by name. Suffice to mention Mama Abertina Sisulu, Oom Beyer Naude and Ahmed Kathrada. Because of their selfless dedication and sacrifices, we enjoy freedom and democracy today.

Let us remember the words President Mandela uttered during the Rivonia trial in 1964, "I have cherished the ideal of a democratic and free society in which all persons live together in harmony and with equal opportunities. Your Excellencies, Ladies And Gentlemen: it is worth noting that President Mandela was born in 1918 and another global icon was born two years later in 1920. These contemporaries, in my view, were raised by divine purpose to bring peace to the world. Dr. Moon and Mrs. Moon are the cofounders of the Universal Peace Federation. The Universal Peace Federation is an international and inter-religious network of individuals and organizations, including representatives from governments, religions, academia, civil society and private organizations dedicated to the promotion of world peace. UPF supports the work of the United Nations, particularly in the areas of interfaith peace-building, peace education, and the strengthening of marriages and families. UPF, inter alia promotes the following principles: Stand on the common ground of universal moral principles, promoting reconciliation, overcoming barriers and building peace; promote co-operation beyond boundaries of religion, race, ethnicity and nationality; practice "living for the sake of others" as the guiding principle for building a global human community; form a network representing the diversity of the human family and all disciplines of human endeavor.

Your Excellencies, Ladies And Gentlemen! Is it not quite remarkable and profound that the ideals that President Mandela stood for and indeed "was prepared to die for" are in resonance with the principles espoused by Rev. and Mrs. Moon? One wonders what the world would have become had these colossal human beings met and worked together!

UPF is presently working with the Royal House of Mandela to actualize this, starting with today's celebration. His Majesty Nkosi Zwelivelile Mandela was with us in Dakar, Senegal, and again in South Korea earlier this year. We are together in Mvezo and I would like to use this opportunity to remind you of our joint hosting of the second Africa Summit to Celebrate the Centenary of Nelson Mandela's Birth. May the legacy of President Mandela -- of peace, reconciliation and justice for all -- live on as we navigate our way through these trying times. Let us not defer Madiba's cherished dream of a democratic and free society, in which all live together in harmony.
