Hopeful Signs Moving Toward Resolution of the Eritrean–Ethiopian Conflict

Looking back at the origin of the conflict, the Eritrean–Ethiopian War, it was one of several conflicts in the horn of Africa region, which took place between the two countries from May 1998 to June 2000. Thereafter, they entered into a state of cold war. The disputed border region named Badme overlaps northern Eritrea and southern Ethiopia. The story behind Badme region seems complicated to comprehend. The point is that the population of the region, called Tigrinyas, are living on both sides of the borderline and both nations claim Badme and its inhabitants.

From a political viewpoint, some people had begun to compare Eritrea with North Korea because of

their rather closed political regime. However, in his boldest move since coming to power last April, Dr. Abiy Ahmed, prime minister of Ethiopia, offered in June to make peace with Eritrea after twenty years of conflict in which an estimated eighty thousand people have died. The conflict separated a great number of families—parents and children, brothers and sisters, and relatives divided as occurred with the two Koreas.

In fact, Eritrea and Ethiopia have the same culture and the same religions and speak the same languages since long ago in history, to the extent that they are bound together through marriage ties. Unfortunately, just because of a borderline issue, many families found themselves disconnected on either side of the border, not even able to communicate with one another due to all means of communication being completely cut between the two countries.

The Ethiopian side launched several peace initiatives within those twenty years but always in vain. However, Dr. Abiy's attempt was such a surprise this time. No one could believe it until the moment Isaias Afwerki, the president of Eritrea, dispatched a delegation to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia's capital city, and the African Union also began to understand Dr. Abiy's intent more clearly.

A family reunion

The Eritrean delegation that came to Addis Ababa was met with a great welcome. Just a few days later, Dr. Abiy went to Asmara, capital of Eritrea, where the prime minister and his delegation received such a welcome that according to Mr. Estifanos, the Eritrean ambassador to Japan, "No other head of state had been welcomed in such a way in Eritrea."

Eritreans lined Asmara's streets with Ethiopian flags to welcome Abiy with a deeply heartfelt warmth, some shedding tears, wanting even to embrace the prime minister in their arms. Ethiopians could watch the arrival of Prime Minister Abiy in Asmara on local TV news.

At the end of the visit, the two leaders signed a five-point agreement ending twenty-year war and restoring relations between them. The summaries read as follows: 1) The state of war has come to an end. 2) The two nations will forge close political, economic, social, cultural and security cooperation; 3) Trade and economic and diplomatic ties will resume. 4) The boundary decision will be implemented. 5) Both nations will work on regional peace.

"The state of war that existed between the two countries has come to an end," Eritrea's information minister, Yemane Gebremeskel, wrote on Twitter. Hence, in the second phase of this peace agreement, President Afwerki arrived in Ethiopia for a historic visit to cement peace on July 15, which was less than a week after both nations declared peace. For their part, Ethiopians were lining the main road from the airport to the city, dressed in white traditional clothes and waving palm fronds. During his three-day visit to Ethiopia -- a horse, a shield and a spear -- the prized possessions of an Oromo traditional warrior, were gifts handed to the visiting Eritrean leader Isaias Afwerki.

Parallels to the Koreas

This deeply emotional reunion between the two countries has seen residents able to communicate to each other via telephone for the first time in twenty years as lines of communication reopened. Furthermore, Direct flights resumed within the same week. It's always touching and moving to see families reunited after a lengthy separation during which no one knows whether the other was still alive or not.

Both the African Union and the European Union agreed that the normalization of relations between the two countries is a boost for peace and security in the Horn of Africa region and on the whole continent. On July 9 in Addis Ababa, the chairperson of the Commission of the African Union, Moussa Faki

Mahamat, stated, "The ongoing normalization process between Eritrea and Ethiopia is a milestone in Africa's efforts to silence the guns by 2020."

It's interesting to notice that the situation between Eritrea and Ethiopia is quite similar to that between North Korea and South Korea, whether it be the polarized political systems, the populations, the borderline issue, the war followed by the state of cold war, the total separation of families and no-communication between the two countries, or Ethiopia's rapid economic development. All this seems quite comparable to the situation on the Korean peninsula. Needless to say, this is quite attention-grabbing.
