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This quarter, thanks to your continued support, we were able to send additional funds to schools connected to our Schools of Africa project. We are strengthening education, empowering women, and building brighter futures.

Kenya: Building for the Future

\$11,365 was sent to Handow Secondary School to support the construction of a new school building. Your gift helps bring this project closer to completion, ensuring students have a safe, permanent place to learn for years to come.



Liberia: Adapting to Serve More Children

\$10,000 supported operating expenses at Peace Hana School, which has shifted its focus to serving first-grade primary students and preschoolers preparing to enter primary school. Your support is helping the school evolve to meet the changing needs of its community.





Mozambique: Investing in Everyday Learning

Your donations helped send \$5,000 to Sun of Mozambique Secondary School to support general administrative costs - the everyday essentials that keep a school running smoothly for its 520 students. It's a reminder that even behind-the-scenes support has a direct impact on a child's ability to learn.



Rwanda: Empowering Women Entrepreneurs

\$11,000 went to the New Hope Technical Training Institute in Rwanda to launch the Women's Startup Empowerment Project 2026. This pilot program - including a business boot camp, one-on-one mentorship, and a final pitch competition - will be helping a dedicated group of young women turn their ideas into sustainable, community-strengthening businesses. DID YOU KNOW...UNESCO reports 59 million primary age children are out of school, with 54% in Africa.

Schools of Africa Project: In the early 90s, WFWP Japan launched international cooperation activities by Japanese overseas volunteers to serve all over the world. With willing hearts, these women went to nations with the greatest need and to neighborhoods in every corner of the world. They started schools, supported opportunities of education for those in need, and created opportunities for women and girls to build a promising future.

Inspired by their dedication, WFWP USA initiated the "Schools of Africa" project in 2001 to financially support 9 schools in 8 African countries founded by those faithful volunteers.

YOUR DONATIONS MAKE A DIFFERENCE:

Since 2001, WFWP USA has sent over \$715,000 to these schools, which have empowered 24,000+ African graduates through education since 1994, and continues to enroll nearly 2,000 per year thanks to your support!

- **\$5,000** sent in March 2026 and **\$3,000** in September 2025 to the **Sun of Mozambique Secondary School** for **their general administrative costs, to install a water tank for the toilets, and purchase new photocopy machines**. This year they have 520 students attending the school.
- **\$11,000** sent in March 2026 to the New Hope Technical Training Institute in **Rwanda** for the **"Women's Startup Empowerment Project 2026"**, a structured program including a business boot camp, one-on-one mentorship, and a final pitch competition to support a select group of social entrepreneurs
- **\$6,000** sent in September 2025 to **New Hope Technical Training Institute in Rwanda** to **purchase necessary training supplies** for culinary arts, beautician, and tailoring courses; these tools are invaluable for the students to practice what they are learning
 - **additional \$8,000** sent in December 2025 to the **New Hope Technical Training Institute** to fund **3 additional specialized trainings** for students to help them be more competitive upon graduation and boost the **daily lunch** so students have nutrition to focus on their studies
- **\$7,800** sent in September 2026 to **Handow Secondary School in Kenya** to **renovate their dilapidated dining hall**
- **\$3,000** sent in September 2025 to **Sunac Elementary School in Guinea Bissau** to **paint and repair their classrooms**

LIBERIA

Peace Hana School since 1998

Initially, Peace Hana was established to equip economically disadvantaged children from 3-6 years old with reading and writing skills and extracurricular courses. Later in 2002, the school was expanded to become an elementary school. There are currently 98 students enrolled. [FIND OUT MORE](#)



GUINEA BISSAU

Sunac Elementary School since 2003

Despite political and social instability in Guinea Bissau, Sunac offers classes regularly throughout the year, making the school zone a safe place for children to grow. Also, the school has a high female enrollment rate. Sunac has been able to reach 587 graduates since 2003. [FIND OUT MORE](#)

MOZAMBIQUE



Sun of Mozambique Secondary School since 1995

After a civil war in 1992, the country lacked resources and infrastructure for quality education. Sun of Mozambique offers quality education at a low fee. In addition to this, the school also provides scholarship programs to deserving students, and a library and computer lab facilities. The school has earned a worthy reputation, impacting the lives of 12,444 graduates, many of whom have gone to attend university. [FIND OUT MORE](#)



KENYA

Handow Secondary School since 1998

Handow is located in a poor neighborhood village far away from the capital with limited electricity and running water. Since its establishment, the school has successfully educated 2,130 graduates. With continuous support from WFP, the school became accredited as a public school and later implemented a tuition-free policy in 2008. Donations have been utilized in the construction of the school's infrastructure and providing school supplies to the students. [FIND OUT MORE](#)

ADULT EDUCATION



RWANDA

New Hope Technical Institute since 1998 and New Hope Professional Training Center since 2023

The institute was founded to help women and ex-soldiers after the Rwandan genocide become financially independent by equipping them with skills in culinary arts, dressmaking, and hairdressing. This has not only brought a sense of independence amongst the 2,501 graduates, but also a sense that they are loved and valued. In 2023, construction was completed on the New Hope Professional Training Center for graduates of the New Hope Technical Institute. [FIND OUT MORE](#)

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
