Fusayo Irikura's WFWP Jordan Arabic Literacy Project - A Ray of Hope for Refugee Children

Jordan is currently one of the largest refugee-hosting countries in the world, and it is the children that are particularly vulnerable and in need of support. The growing influx of refugees has strained the public school system, with overcrowded classrooms and high drop-out rates, and many children are falling behind. With a strong desire to make a difference in the lives of these children and give them hope for a better future, WFWP Jordan President Fusayo Irikura launched the Arabic Literacy Project in 2016. She has made it her personal mission to provide refugee children aged 8 to 15 with opportunities to receive educational support and develop a good character in a safe and loving environment. Throughout the month of October, WFWP USA ran a fundraising campaign to support the Arabic Literary Project, and we are proud to report that we were able to send \$7,200 to Jordan.



The Jordan Arabic Literacy

WFWP Jordan is running literacy classes at the WFWP and Community Development Centers (CDC) located in the refugee camps. **Especially in 2020, the center has been able to stay open because public schools have been closed for over a year due to the pandemic.** The WFWP center is one of the few places where they can study in the area.

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total raised and sent between 2018 and 2020, which helped provide tutoring and character education to refugee children in Jordan.

Suleinnan [8th grade] ... was very shy, After spending time with us at the center, his selfonfidence became great and now he speaks perfectly. Now he is no longer shy and his icademic achievement became good."



WFWP USA ran a fundraising campaign to support the Arabic Literacy Project in 2020. With your support, Mrs. Irikura is able to renovate the centers, replace old plastic chairs and tables with new ones, purchase new school materials, and provide stipends to the dedicated tutors. The goal was to raise \$4,000 and the final result was \$5,397!





Due to finances in 2016, the WFWP tutoring center closed. Not wanting to stop activities, active core women started searching for a small space with a reasonable rent where they could open a WFWP center themselves. **They nearly gave up**. It took almost three years after the old one had closed to find a new location in 2019.



"The reason for their persistence was that they had learned through WFWP activities what is the most important thing in our lives, which is to live for others. Therefore, they could not abandon it."

Al-Zarqa, Jordan is a city industrious in its working style and modest in culture. **The city houses approximately nine million refugees for** whom the hope of resettlement has become a remote possibility. The refugee encampments are grindingly poor where daily survival is a struggle.

Of the nine million refugees in the city, 60% are children. These children have access to school but many are still unable to read or write in their local language due to poor facilities. Classrooms in the public schools have as many as 60 students, which makes learning and individualized attention difficult. The drop-out rate from these schools is also high. Many graduate still unable to read and write at the appropriate level.



HOPE FOR A BRIGHTER FUTURE

The hope for providing these children with a bright future has come through the "Arabic Literacy Program for Children" for students ages 8 to 15.

Students in the program learn how to read and write, which is essential for creating a more sustainable future of happiness and success. WFWP Jordan is running literacy classes at the WFWP and Community Development Centers (CDC) located in the refugee camps. The project aims to improve the levels of literacy among the children, and also to instill values in them which can help them overcome the psychological damage that comes from the unstable life of a refugee.

WFWP Jordan hopes to continue restoring the future of their children through a carefully designed program. At each center of WFWP and CDC, 30 students have been taken in who are taught a curriculum tailored to their learning capabilities. The program lasts a year long with a summer break in between.
