Jamaican-born singer Denroy Morgan of Queens will bring the rhythm of Reggae to the New York City Celebration of Parents Day 2012 at 11:30 a.m. on the steps of the Adam Clayton Powel State Office Building on the outside stage and plaza in Harlem, New York. A declaration of congratulation from Congressman Charles Rangel to the five honorees of Parents' Day, including three couples and two single parents, will be read on his behalf. Clergy and supporters of the American Clergy Leadership Conference are expected to speak at the event that will include statements of support from the New York City Council and from state lawmakers, according to Rev. Bruce Grodner, the chief organizer of the event.

Morgan, who issued a new album of 10 songs the first week of July, says he will perform "Read Your Bible," "Get Up, Stand Up!," "I'll Do Anything for You" and the Bob Marley classic, "One Love."

Local parents will be chosen from every part of the greater New York City area. Rev. Grodner says that nominees include two single parents, one a mother and the other a blind father, each with five daughters and who raised their girls with exceptional strength, commitment and love despite their the difficulties. He says the winners of the awards will go to Washington, D.C. in September for the national event.

Awardees include Bishop Peter Armah, pastor of the Union Baptist Evangelical Temple in the Bronx,

who is the father of two young daughters. Bishop Armah has been a tireless proponent of ecumenical unity and has promoted the ideal of the family of God to his congregation for years.
