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SEVENTH RALLY OF HOPE FOCUSES ON THINK TANK 2022: TOWARD THE PEACEFUL REUNIFICATION OF THE KOREAN PENINSULA

World leaders and experts renewed their calls for peaceful reconciliation on the Korean Peninsula during the 7th virtual Rally of Hope on September 12, 2021. The event, broadcast live from South Korea and attended by millions of online participants from around the world, featured the Universal Peace Federation's (UPF) new initiative, Think Tank 2022.

Think Tank 2022 is developing Expert Working Groups linked to UPF's seven international associations, who will work together and pool their best insights as to how peaceful reunification can be accomplished in the coming years. It has already hosted numerous webinars and will also carry out fact-finding consultations, International Leadership Conferences, and a major World Summit in South Korea.

"I truly believe that an extraordinary future awaits the people of North Koreaand I have faith that if they pursue the path of denuclearization, they will make that future a magnificent reality," former U.S. President Donald Trump said in remarks prepared for the event.

The rally was among the growing efforts of UPF co-founder Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon to address worldwide challenges, including poverty, equality, and environmental degradation. "Now the time has come for Korea to fulfill its responsibility," Dr. Moon said at the event. "The prospects for peace on the Korean Peninsula are excellent. This will happen." Samdech Hun Sen, prime minister of Cambodia, whose Asian Vision Institute will serve as the Asia-Pacific Secretariat of Think Tank 2022, said this rally would strengthen the culture of peace and mutual trust under the framework of international cooperation in the Asia-Pacific area.

Former President of the European Commission José Manuel Barroso urged the global community to create the best external conditions for the Koreans themselves to find a way for true reconciliation and peace.



Think Tank 2022 was officially launched on May 9, 2021, during the 6th Rally of Hope, in which Ban Ki-moon, former United Nations secretary-general, attested that "This network will make a difference for peace on the Korean Peninsula through international unity".

On that occasion, former U.S. Vice President Mike Pence expressed his belief that this effort would in time reap a harvest of peace that would benefit the people of Korea, the United States and all humankind.

European speakers included Vjosa Osmani, president of Kosovo, and Sarah Gilbert, a virologist who co-developed the Oxford Vaccine in response to COVID-19.


ASIA-PACIFIC THINK TANK 2022 INAUGURATION

THINK TANK 2022 FORUMS

On September 18, 2021, Hon. Michael R. Pompeo, US secretary of state (2018-2021), was the keynote speaker at the first Think Tank 2022 Forum on the future of the Korean Peninsula, sponsored by The Washington Times Foundation and UPF. "I'm concerned that the United States is returning to an Obama-era policy of 'Strategic Patience 2.0," Mr. Pompeo told an audience of dignitaries from South Korea and Japan at a virtual gathering that included remarks from other former high-level U.S., South Korean and Japanese diplomats. Focusing a portion of his remarks on the virtues of religious freedom as "the most fundamental of all human rights", he asserted that its promotion is "crucial to peace in Northeast Asia." A series of similar forums on the future of the Korean Peninsula will be organized by UPF before the March 2022 Korean elections.



INTERNATIONAL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCES - ILC 2021 -

Written by Mr. Jacques Marion, co-chair, UPF Europe and Middle East In April, June, July and August 2021, UPF and its constituent associations hosted a series of virtual conferences on peace and reunification of the Korean Peninsula, each addressing the theme from a different perspective. The ILC 2021 events were held simultaneously throughout the world. UPF Europe & Middle East hosted a total of 34 webinars, attended by thousands of participants. Eminent speakers included former heads of state, parliamentarians, religious figures and leaders from academia, the media, the arts and the business sphere.

ILC APRIL 2021 (APRIL 26 - MAY 1) - THE REUNIFICATION OF KOREA: FOUNDATION FOR A UNIFIED WORLD



On April 29 the International Summit Council for Peace (ISCP) held a webinar on the theme: **"The Implications for Europe of the Process toward Peaceful Reunification on the Korean Peninsula**", moderated by Dr. Werner Fasslabend, former Austrian minister of defense. The panelists emphasized the need for dialogue despite sanctions, and the positive role Europe can play in integrating North Korea into the world community.

A webinar on **Women in International Peacemaking (IAFLP)** moderated by H.E. Anneli Jäätteenmäki, (1), highlighted the unique role women can play in peace negotiations. The panel featured prominent women leaders from Lebanon, Russia, Germany and South Korea.

Addressing the **Role of the Media (IMAP)** Mr. Lufti Dervishi (2) discussed the tension between fact- and opinion-based media reports. Other panelists, including the chairmen of *The Washington Times* and Japan-based *Sekkai Nippo*, addressed the influence of social networks and propaganda on the Korean Peninsula.

In a webinar on **Peace Through Culture (IAACP)** Dr. Rohotchenko (3) and fellow panelists described the rich arts culture of Korea. Sharing their personal experience in both North and South Korea, they underlined the role of the arts to bridge the divide between the two peoples.

A webinar on the theme "**Toward a Northeast Asian Economic Community**" (IAAP) was moderated by Dr. Swanström (4). Based on the historical experience of the European Community, the panelists, including scholars from Europe, Japan and Russia, discussed the prospects and challenges of an Asian Economic Zone.

The Role of Parliamentarians (IAPP) was discussed by Baroness Verma (5), from the UK House of Lords, and parliamentarians from Russia and Italy. They addressed the role of parliamentary diplomacy in easing the tensions on the Korean Peninsula, underlining the capacity of parliamentarians to ascertain real issues of contention.

Religious leaders, scholars and peace activists discussed **The Role of Faith in Overcoming Division (IAPD)** on the Peninsula. Reminding us that the Schuman declaration facilitated the integration of European nations after World War II, Dr. Figel (6), suggested that a similar approach could be taken on the Korean Peninsula.

ILC JUNE 2021 (JUNE 24-30) - PEACE AND SECURITY

The Role of Neutral Nations

In a webinar hosted by UPF on June 10, Major General Patrick Gauchat (photo), head of the Swiss delegation to the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC), spoke of the NNSC peacekeeping mission. Created by the 1953 armistice agreement, the NNSC is currently composed of Swiss and Swedish officers stationed at the Korean Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) in Panmunjom, whose role is to maintain a channel of communications between both sides, demonstrating that the ceasefire is still in force.



The UN and the Korean Peninsula: Toward De-escalation and Rapprochement

On June 30, focusing on the issue of nuclear weapons, panelists insisted on the negative effect of sanctions on North Korea, and suggested that a reduction policy would instead gradually allow socio-economic development and the building of trust.

On June 24, the **State of Relations between USA**, **China and Russia** was discussed by US and Russian panelists. Dr. Georgy Toloraya, director of the East Asia section at the Institute of Economics of the Russian Academy of Sciences, expressed pessimism about denuclearization. The best scenario is for North Korea to become a "conventional country," cooperating with its neighbors. To get there, however, both sides need to

feel less of a sense of danger or threat.



On June 25, UPF hosted a webinar on the **71st Anniversary of the Korean War**. Dr. No Hi Pak, senior adviser for UPF-Korea, gave a personal testimony of the tragedy experienced by Korean people during the war. He then explained about the tour he led around the world, 60 years later, with the Little Angels Children's Folk Ballet of Korea, to express the gratitude of Korean people to all the Korean War veterans.



On June 29, the topic of **Europe and Russia's Relations to the DPRK** was addressed by scholars from the UK, Russia and Sweden. Dr. Edward Howell, lecturer in politics at the University of Oxford, noted that the ultimate question was "How to build trust?" He suggested that the US change its goal from total denuclearization to a more realistic first step of threat reduction.




On June 30, scholars from Austria, New Zealand and Germany discussed the theme **Europe and the Korean Peninsula**. Dr. Beatrice Bischof, from the Foreign Affairs Association in Munich, spoke of the 136-year-long Korean-German relations. To boost people-to-people exchange, she suggested creating economic hubs in the DMZ to allow women from North and South to cooperate on common projects.



In the **Closing session**, Dr. Afsar Rathor, president of the environmental NGO of LIOS-SOIL, a Vienna-based environmental NGO, made a summary of the recommendations given by all the conference speakers, to be compiled and offered to stimulate a constructive dialogue on the Korean Peninsula.

In a webinar on **Track 1.5 Diplomacy Initiatives with North Korea** (July 27), Hon. Glyn Ford (1) and Dr. Antonio Betancourt (UPF USA) related their personal experience with "track 1.5 diplomacy" that resulted in significant initiatives, such as humanitarian aid from the European Union to North Korea during the famine, or dialogue at the highest level between US and North Korean leaders.

A webinar on **Resources and Tools of Faith Based Organizations** (July 27) involved religious leaders from Russia, South Korea and Switzerland representing Orthodoxy, Protestantism and Judaism. Rev. Dr. Stephen Kim (2) spoke about Christianity's role in unifying Korea, emphasizing it must go beyond the evangelical dimension and bring about unification through forgiveness and reconciliation.

On July 27, during a webinar on the **Power of Humanitarian Initiatives**, humanitarian activists introduced their work on the Peninsula. Mr. Thomas Fisler (3), who was based in North Korea with the Swiss Cooperation Agency, described how the Covid pandemic brought humanitarian aid to a halt and exacerbated the plight of ordinary people.

On July 28, economists and business leaders discussed the potential of **Private Sector Initiatives for the North Korean Economy.** North Korea's biggest problem is not denuclearization, but the economy, said Mr. Mark Tokola (4). Fundamental reforms are necessary to create incentives for North Korean entrepreneurs and foreign investors.

On July 28, panelists from the USA, Russia and Korea discussed the theme of **Culture as Peacemaker**. Mrs. Natalia Karpova (5), an official in a Russian town bordering North Korea, explained how the dismantling of the Soviet Union created opportunities for ordinary citizens to travel to North Korea. "Culture, education and sports will help preserve peace", she said.

On July 29, a webinar on the **Peace Road Initiative** described UPF projects aimed at tearing down the walls and linking people, as a model for reconciliation on the Korean Peninsula. Mr. Ali Laçej (6) reported about the Peace Road Balkans initiative, as a program that gives space for religions and cultures to coexist in harmony, creating bridges among the peoples.

Competing Worldviews Concerning Korean Reunification (Aug. 20)

On a panel jointly organized by UPF Europe and UPF USA, scholars from leading institutions and media professionals discussed the worldviews, values, and ideologies that drive the agendas and policies of the primary stakeholder nations in the process of Korean reunification. How and to what extent do they make it difficult for all stakeholders to reach agreement on the way forward? And what room is there for compromise, so that lasting peace can come to the Korean Peninsula?

Discussing the **Potential and Benefits** of **Trade with North Korea** (Aug. 20), panelists from Russia, Austria and Israel addressed the topic of economic incentives to ease tensions on the Korean Peninsula. Dr Pavel Leshakov (2) reviewed the evolution of the DPRK's economic strategy under Chairman Kim Jong Un's leadership. Yet, he said, the strict sanctions enforced on the country since 2017 have left little room for North Korea's engagement with the world economy.

Scholars from Korea, Japan and the USA discussed the theme: **The Korean People's Common History and Culture: Resources for Peace** (Aug. 21). Prof. Yoshisumi Asai (3) gave some insight into Kim Il Sung's Juche ideology, the way it emerged in the 1960s during the confrontation between China and the Soviet Union, and how the regime is maintained through the 'education' of its people, rather than the use of force. Dr Alon Levkowitz (4) explained the various economic and social advantages of cooperation between the two Koreas, centering on a long-term vision of mutual prosperity.

THE KOREA - JAPAN UNDERSEA TUNNEL

The Korea – Japan undersea tunnel project was proposed in 1981 by UPF founder Dr. Sun Myung Moon at the Tenth International Conference on the Unity of the Sciences. As the first link of a great International Highway that would run through China to the West and Russia to the North, it would contribute to the creation of a prosperous Northeast Asian Economic Zone. The Korea–Japan Tunnel Research Institute considers possible routes from Karatsu on Japan's Kyushu Island to the Korean port city of Busan, or alternatively to the city of Geoje. The tunnel would cross the Korea Strait via the Japanese islands of Tsushima and Iki, covering a total distance of 230 kilometers.

The tunnel project was the theme of two webinars during the April and August 2021 International Leadership Conferences. Experts from Europe and the Middle East contributed to the panel by giving examples of experiences from the Marmaray Tunnel crossing the Bosporus Strait in Istanbul, and the Channel Tunnel between France and Great Britain.

THE BERING STRAIT UNDERSEA TUNNEL

The Bering Strait Undersea Tunnel would connect the Chukotka region in the Far East of Russia with the state of Alaska in the United States. Crossing the Bering Strait over a distance of 89 kilometers via the Diomede islands, this bold engineering project has increasingly reappeared in experts' minds and government research since the 19th century.

In 2005, the UPF founders declared that a tunnel or bridge at the Bering Strait would make a significant contribution to world peace. By overcoming historical conflicts between the USA and Russia, the tunnel would symbolize a new era. It would also significantly shorten freight transport time between Asia and North America, thus greatly benefiting trade among the great economic powers of the region.

The project was the theme of several webinars in August 2021. Leading experts from Russia, Canada and the United States described the prospects of

FOUNDERS' MESSAGE

DREAMING OF A PEACEFUL WORLD

Excerpts from the UPF founders' autobiographies on two visionary projects that, if implemented, would lead to lasting peace in Northeast Asia: Firstly, an International Peace Highway linking Japan and Korea, as well as Asia and North America at the Bering Strait, by undersea tunnels. Secondly, the call for the UN to establish its fifth office as well as a Peace Park at the DMZ on the Korean Peninsula.



As a Peace-Loving Global Citizen, Dr. Sun Myung Moon's Autobriography, p. 343-344

We live in an age of globalism. For the sake of the future we must become one. One way I propose to facilitate that is through the International Peace Highway, a huge undertaking. It will link Korea and Japan by an undersea tunnel and create a bridge across the Bering Strait that separates Russia and North America. These great links can unify the world. When the highway is completed it will be possible to travel by car from Africa's Cape of Good Hope to Santiago, Chile, and from London to New York. There will be no roadblocks; the entire world will be interconnected as if by capillary vessels.

The world will become one integrated community, and everyone will be able to travel freely across international borders. Borders that give free passage to anyone will lose their significance as borders. Something similar will be true for religion. As the frequency of exchanges among religions increases, greater mutual understanding will arise, conflict will disappear, and the walls of separation will crumble. [...] This cultural revolution will bring the world into one.

The Silk Road was not simply a trade route that people used in order to sell silk and buy spices. It was also a vehicle for the peoples of the East and West to meet and for Buddhism, Islam, and Christianity to meet. These different cultures intermingled and gave rise to a new culture. The International Peace Highway will play a similar role in the twenty- first century. **Mother of Peace**, Dr Hak Ja Han Moon's Memoirs, p. 202-203

The United Nations established its headquarters in New York City at the end of World War II. Seventy years have since passed. There are three other major UN offices, in Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi. But even though the world has entered the Asia-Pacific era, there is no major UN office in Asia.

I have recommended that the UN open its fifth international office in Korea, specifically, in the demilitarized zone (DMZ) on the 38th parallel. I am supporting various groups, including the Universal Peace Federation and the Citizens Federation for the Unification of North and South Korea, in their efforts to turn the DMZ into a global peace park. This will bring the issue of Korean reunification to the attention of the world's people as no other action can.

All the nations of Asia would be pleased to serve as the site of a new, global UN headquarters, but I believe that Korea has unique qualifications. [...] Korea has something very deep within its culture that can serve the world.

Some 70 years ago, the UN forces shed blood and sweat for the sake of peace in Korea. By ending the division on the peninsula, the UN would complete the mission of those soldiers who gave their lives, and inspire peace in the world. In his speech given at the United Nations Headquarters in New York in 2000, my husband announced our vision of a peace park in the Demilitarized Zone. Fifteen years later, in May of 2015, at the UN Office in Vienna, Austria, I proposed that a fifth UN office be built there. The president of the Republic of Korea proposed to North Korea at the UN that a peace park be built in the DMZ. If North and South Korea invite the UN to build its fifth office in the DMZ, it will, by that very act alone, turn a theater of war-where so many on both sides of the conflict shed their blood-into a Mecca of peace.

The International Summit Council for Peace, one of UPF's primary associations, co-hosted the first Rally of Hope on August 9, 2020. It represented the latest in a series of summits, real and virtual, held since 2018. It brought thousands of world leaders together in search of a shared culture of interdependence, mutual prosperity and universal values.

Since then, UPF has continued to hold Rallies of Hope featuring distinguished world leaders, along with first-class entertainment, reaching millions of people via various broadcast providers and internet platforms.

The 3rd Rally of Hope was held in commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the Korean War, while calling for the peaceful reunification of the Korean Peninsula.

The 4th Rally of Hope was a joint effort with the World Christian Leadership Conference (WCLC), an organization affiliated with UPF, and featured more than 2,000 Christian pastors from the United States and 3,000 clerics from throughout the world.

On May 9, 2021, the 6th Rally of Hope featured the inauguration of UPF's Think Tank 2022 initiative for the reunification of Korea.

On September 12, the 7th Rally of Hope featured the launch of the Think Tank 2022 Asia Pacific Secretariat and of the Organizing Committee of the upcoming World Summit in Korea.



UPF held a series of webinars on the Abraham Accords with a distinguished panel of world leaders. This recent U.S.-brokered agreement between Israel, Bahrain and the United Arab Emirates, later joined by Sudan and Morocco, signifies a historic moment of hope in the Middle East.

The first webinar took place on January 14, 2021, with former heads of state from the Middle East, the United States, and Europe.

The second webinar on February 25, 2021, was convened

with parliamentarians to include the perspectives of all major stakeholders in the Abraham Accords.

The third webinar on April 15, 2021, convened by the Europe and Middle East branches of UPF and its International Association of Parliamentarians for Peace (IAPP), brought together experts from Morocco, Israel, the United States and Europe to discuss the Morocco Tripartite Agreement.

UPF Europe and the Middle East and its Interreligious Association for Peace and Development (IAPD) organized an online conference on February 4, 2021, in conjunction with the Al-Liqa' Center for Religious and Heritage Studies in the Holy Land. Founded in 1982 by Palestinian Muslim and Christian academic and religious leaders, the center aims at fostering interfaith and cultural dialogue and understanding between the three Abrahamic religions.

Entitled "A Dialogue toward Peace, Harmony and Fraternity Confirmation", the webinar commemorated two United Nations observances: World Interfaith Harmony Week and the first International Day of Human Fraternity. As this new UN Day was inspired by the Higher Committee of Human Fraternity established in 2019 by Pope Francis, and Al Azhar Grand Imam Al-Tayeb, the two keynote speakers at the webinar were Msgr. Yoannis Lahzi Gaid, former private secretary to Pope Francis and Judge Mohamed Abdelsalam, secretary general of the Higher Committee.

A second event was organized on May 28, 2021, with the theme "Building a Culture of Truth and Love during Times of Crisis: The Role and Responsibility of the Church." Speaking against the backdrop of the recent hostilities between Israel and Palestine, prominent church leaders and scholars, including His Eminence Cardinal Bechara Boutros Al-Rahi, patriarch of the Maronite Church, and His Beatitude Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Latin patriarch of Jerusalem, addressed that crisis. Speaking from Jerusalem, Beirut, New York, and Mexico City, the panelists also addressed the global pandemic and related questions in the field of medical ethics.

THE BALKANS AND THE KOREAN PENINSULA

On March 27, 2021, a webinar on the theme "The Balkan and Korean Peninsulas: Similarities, Learning from Experiences and Possible Cooperation" was organized by UPF and its constituent association International Summit Council for Peace (ISCP) with Albanian journalist Lutfi Dervishi as the moderator. After an introduction by Dr. Yeon Ah Moon, H.E. Alfred Moisiu pointed out that the Korean and Balkan peninsulas, although geographically and culturally far apart, have gone through many similar challenges throughout their history. H.E. Filip Vujanović noted three similarities between both peninsulas: their geostrategic and geopolitical importance on a global level; a challenging and tragic 20th century marked by war, destruction and human tragedy; and their necessity for long-lasting peace.

In a speech read by Mr. Gani Rroshi,

H.E. Fatmir Sejdiu, president of Kosovo (2006-2010), said that although the Balkan Peninsula is blessed with an abundance of underground resources, surrounded by oceans and in the midst of continental cultures, it also has been cursed with conflict throughout its history.

Other speakers were Hon. Ho-Jin Lee, Dr. Hyung-Suk Kim, Dr. Heung-Soon Park, Dr. Hyun-Young Lee, and Dr. Katsumi Otsuka.



PEACE ROAD MARATHON PROMOTES HEALTHY LIFESTYLE FOR YOUTH Written by Dmitry Samko, Chairman, UPF Moscow







Moscow, Russia - The supermarathon "Children against Drugs - I Choose Sport!" concluded after 1,150 kilometers.

From June 12 to 26, 2021, a total of thirty-five children and fifteen adults ran a relay race through the historic cities of Russia's Golden Ring. In addition, about 500 people joined in as the supermarathon passed through their town or city.



The organizer of the project was Ambassador for Peace Sergei Suprunyuk, the chairman of the Supermarathon Runners for a Healthy Lifestyle organizing committee. UPF has been a co-organizer for many years, along with the General Directorate for Drug Control of the Russian Ministry of Internal Affairs.

For the fourth year in a row the supermarathon received a grant from the Presidential Grants Fund, and for the sixth year the theme has been "Children against Drugs—I Choose Sport!" The young athletes running are showing an example of sports and physical education as a real alternative to drug use, alcohol consumption, smoking, and various doping.

During the 15 days of the race, the marathon receive huge coverage in the media.

Many meetings were organized in cities along the route—with schoolchildren, youth, residents of orphanages and social rehabilitation centers for minors; and with representatives of government bodies, public organizations, and drug control units of the Ministry of Internal Affairs.

The supermarathon finished in the Moscow region on June 26 which was also the United Nations' International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking.
