Last month during our 'Afternoons with WFWP' workshops in Melbourne, an inspiring young lady presented an introduction to Mindfulness. During the section on 'what makes you happy', I was surprised to find out that having freedom was not an important personal value, and I reflected on why freedom received a zero score on most important. A few years ago I learnt about the '90|10 Principle' by Stephen Covey. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iKvEYKoiJ48> The thought behind the principle is that 10% of life is made up by what happens to us, and 90% of life is decided by how we react to this 10%. This means we really have no control over the 10% of what happens to us, we can only control how we respond. There is no freedom without responsibility is one of the key constructs of the philosophy presented by Rev. Dr. Sun Myung Moon, and the 90 | 10 supports this well. Do we get angry, resentful, hurt and lash out when something does not go our way, or do we remember to practice 'living for others'.

Take urgent action to combat climate change and all its impacts and the CSW 60 focus goal 5 was 'Achieve Gender Equality and empower all women and girls.'


## Support our Pacific Island Neighbours WALK-A-THON

Saturday March 5th 2016

### A project of WFWP Australia to raise funds to support the Island Projects of WFWP

The Support our Pacific Neighbours WALK-A-THON has found a new home at Silvan Reservoir Park. The park is nestled in the foothills of the Dandenong Ranges on the outskirts of Melbourne. The walk-a-thon was a community and family event in partnership with FFWPU, UPF and the YFWP. Considering the hot summer and the rainy nature of Melbourne during winter and spring, the 1st Saturday of Autumn was chosen as the date for the annual walk-a-thon. The goal of the walk-a-thon is to raise funds for the WFWP Australia projects within the Oceania Island nations. WFWP Australia has undertaken practical service projects within the Oceania Island nations since 2003. These include Books for the Islands, Sewing machines sent to support the Womens Sewing Centres and Character Education programs for youth.

Walk-a-thon participants registered from 10:00am before the walk-off and assembled behind the starting banner, as 10:30am drew near. There were two walks to choose from, a rigorous three hour walk into the Dandenong Ranges, or a 2 hour walk around the base of the park. As a family activity, participants came from different cultural backgrounds, walks of life and age groups, including children, youth, adults and seniors. Back at Silvan Reservoir entertainment by the Federation Peace Quartet and a hearty BBQ awaited us. As participants came



back to the finish line, first, second and third place winners were presented with their ribbons.

This year, funds raised from the walk-a-thon will support the New Hope Academy Kindergarten in the Solomon Islands. In 2010 WFWP Australia provided funding for the building of the Kindergarten, which is located in Honiara on the Provincial Island of Guadalcanal. Honiara is the capital city and the kindergarten is situated in the commercial area close to the city centre called Town Ground.



The kindergarten is a private school, recognised by the government and now takes care of 60 plus children. Today the school receives funding from




WFWP Japan. The school opened in 2011 with the 1st intake of 40 students ranging from 3 to 6 years old. The three classrooms are: age 3; age 4 and age 5-6. Then the children move onto the local primary schools for their schooling.

Mrs. Selina Galo, Principle of the New Hope Academy Kindergarten, explained that present opportunities for the school are to gain registration with the government. This will ease the difficulty of funding and continue its development into a primary school. The kindergarten has a strong parents association.

Challenges are always funding, Mrs. Galo explained; because as a private school in the Solomon Islands, the government provides no funding support. Mrs. Galo shared the philosophy behind the school as being value and family centred; teaching the children to develop their hearts through sharing, developing empathy and understanding.

A big thank you to all our sponsors, supporters and walkers who made the walk-a-thon a growing success. We raised just over \$2,500 on the day and have extra funds available for the Kindergarten through our



annual membership, where 50% of membership fees goes to support the Island projects. We have had a request to send used summer clothing to the recently opened Solomon Island Sewing Centre and will be sending off a shipment in the near future.

Additionally, the moral, spiritual and methodological principles that foster peacebuilding based on the teachings of Rev Sun Myung Moon were outlined. # Africa Day Australia Forum day

The 2016 Africa Day Australia Forum comprised three mini forums; academic, families and youth. The whole day event found a new home at the newly refurbished Victoria University Metro West facility in Footscray and was held on Saturday May 14<sup>th</sup>

Rabeca Mphande is the ADA Forum Chairperson and worked tirelessly behind the scenes to organise key note speakers, panellists and outreach with the support of each forum sub-coordinator and the ADA forum committee. 2016 is the fourth year that ADA has been sponsoring forums as part of the celebration of Africa Day, or African Freedom week and was the most successful forum to date. The message to showcase African Australian successes is definitely having a ripple effect within the African diaspora communities in Melbourne, plus the wider community.

Each forum had its own theme, listed here in order of the program on the day.

- i. Academic Forum: Advancing the Africa Australian agenda - the role of African Australian diasporas.
- ii. Families Forum theme: Holding together the African Australian family unit.
- iii. Youth Forum theme: Africa Australian youth finds a fit.

The day was opened with welcome remarks by Rabeca Mphande (ADA Forum Chairperson) and a Welcome to Country. The VIP speech was given by Hon. Robin Scott, Minister of Finance and Multicultural Affairs. Fred Alale was the MC for the academic and families' forum.

Dr. Charles Mphande moderated the panellists; who were Dr. Apollo Nsuguba-Kyobe, Mr. Hailuel Gebreselassie (Executive Director AAAA), Soeti Kadir (youth poet and co-founder of *In Our Own Words*) and Berhan Ahmed (Director of the African Think Tank). Dr. Apollo gave the closing remarks to the forty plus audience.

After a healthy African lunch, Jo Dolan from Vic. Police presented the VIP speech for the Families Forum to the fifty eight participants. Sharon Orapeleng, (mental health specialist) who flew in from Brisbane for the event, presented an energetic and insightful Key Note Address about wellbeing for new African Australians and offered a holistic approach. Rabeca Mphande was the moderator for the panel, who were: Kamil Ebrahim from Quit Victoria, Sainab Sheik, Kamil Ebrahim, Teresia Kanyi, John Bellavance, Theresa Sengaaga Ssali and David Leonard. Panel topics focused on well-being with a holistic approach, family empowerment, and violence preventions and mediation. We were honoured to have the outgoing ADA president, Stephen Sibanda give closing remarks for this segment.

Hozey, MC for the Youth Forum kept us entertained with his wit and energy during this segment. Rhoda Mphande and Lizzy Kuoth were the co-chairs who organised the panellists and a dazzling fashion show featuring RKM design by none other than Rhoda herself. Priscilla Mphande who was the runner up at the 2015 Africa's Got Talent competition, entertained us with her beautiful voice and Daniel Elia gave us a Rap about his experiences as an African youth. Melanie Augustine was the moderator for the youth segment. Panel topics focused on building youth capacity, identity at odds, success stories and cloning youth. # SYMPHONY OF PEACE PRAYERS (SOPP)

May 21st marked the first Symphony of Peace Prayers held in the Gippsland of Victoria. The event was held on an exquisite sunny day in the community hall of Rokeby, a rural community located just outside Warragul and was organised by Anda McMillan.

The SOPP day is about LOVE; the essence of all that is real in life. When we trace back any positive feelings, we always come back to LOVE. The presence of each participant was a testament to the love within people's hearts, people who felt the call to join together and send out waves of positive thoughts around the world; sending prayers of kindness and compassion. SOPP events were held throughout the world. Put together, these prayers symbolise the ONENESS of humanity in all its exquisite variety.

Laid out on the centre table were elements of earth, air, fire and water to bring a beautiful reminder that we are part of one Earth. The love that flowed during the ceremony was tangible. It was a delight to see people wholeheartedly join the sharing of prayers, even though this was their first experience of such an event.

A vital essence of SOPP is the simple act of participants with religious and spiritual leaders praying according to their faith and sending a powerful message of tolerance and harmony. During the prayer, participants remember the LOVE felt in their heart for their faith, then...for a short moment, step into the LOVE space that resides within

the heart of each faith presenter. This is a powerful moment of saying to each other; 'I respect your belief, I acknowledge our sameness, and our differences in ONENESS; I thank you for sharing.'

During the afternoon the Peace Flame burned continuously, surrounded by the flags of each nation; each representing the flame of love that is ignited in our hearts and the ONENESS of us all. The World Peace Flame was created in 1999 when seven living flames



were lit by prominent peacemakers representing five continents. The flames were brought together and united into one eternal flame as a universal symbol of humanity's combined aspirations for peace. This 'parent' flame now burns in Snowdonia, Wales and until now every peace flame has its origins from this parent flame.

Anne Bellavance (WFWP Australian President and International vice-president for Oceania) gave a wonderful 10 minute presentation on the work of WFWP, which is focused on empowering women. She also outlined the service projects within the Island nations of Oceania. Anne was also a Prayer Presenter for The Family Federation for World Peace and Unification.

Igniting the divine spark for a thriving world; participants read the Fuji Declaration together. This declaration encourages all human beings from all



walks of life to raise a global consciousness together and begin to live by a new set of values in harmony with nature and all life on earth. [www.fujideclaration.org](http://www.fujideclaration.org)

As usual, the Peace Flag Ceremony won people's hearts! Some participants had been to previous World Peace Prayer events, but most had not. None had ever experienced a Symphony of Peace Prayer event.

A prayer for peace was offered for each country of the world symbolically by carrying the flag of each nation.

The name of each nation was called out, after which participants said together,

"May peace be in....." This was done for 194 countries.

In closing, Jenny Funston led participants in meditation to honour each nation, symbolised by the Peace Pole and flags. The Victorian branch of Byakko Shinko Kai has nearly 200 flags, the UN flag, nations registered with the United Nations and a special flag for nations not registered in the UN. <http://byakko.org/>

Why are the flags so special? They are handmade by a small group of Japanese

Byakko Shinko Kai members with great mindfulness; putting prayers and energy of peace into the flags as they are painted. Each flag is hand sewn, printed and painted! Only one large set & two small sets can be made each year. The flags are not representing anything political, but hold the energy of that country. There is a deeper spiritual dimension in the flags; that being the positive aspirations for each county.

# Batik Girl visits Australia

Women's Federation for World Peace invited a delegation of 'Batik Girl' to visit Australia from 29th March to 15 April. During their stay they visited many NGOs and institutes, including WFWP Australia in Melbourne and Sydney.

Ladies from many organisations, NGOs and backgrounds came to the Sydney meeting and helped to raise funds for this noble cause by purchasing the Batik Girl dolls which are clothed in Indonesian style dress.

The 'Batik Girl' roadshow travelled to Melbourne, Canberra and Sydney and had three main goals:

1. To strengthen relationship between Indonesia and Australia and gain wider Australian support for the prison program, which has 100 inmates sewing the clothing for the 'Batik Girl' and boxing the dolls, plus more than 540 inmates who benefit from the program.
2. Share the social mission of the 'Batik Girl' in the hope the program can also be applied in Australia. The 'Batik Girl' program provides therapy for the drug users in the prison.
3. Promote the 1000 Batik Girl Initiative for Indonesia. This Initiative supplies Batik Girl dolls to needy children; including those with cancer, HIV, Thalassaemia and disabilities. The aim is to provide a thousand Batik Girl dolls in 10 cities throughout Indonesia.

### United Nations Affiliation

WFWP International became a "NGO in general consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations" in 1997. This status has continued to be renewed based on the preparation of the Quadrennial Report.

Consultative status is granted by ECOSOC upon recommendation of the ECOSOC Committee on NGOs, which is comprised of 19 Member States.

There are only 139 NGOs worldwide that hold the general consultative status. The requirements of this level of affiliation include:

- ❖ Applying organisation's activities must be relevant to the work of ECOSOC
- ❖ The NGO must have been in existence (officially registered) for at least two years in order to apply
- ❖ The NGO must have a democratic decision making mechanism
- ❖ The major portion of the organisation's funds should be derived from contributions from national affiliates, individual members, or other non-governmental components
- ❖ NGOs granted General Consultative Status must submit to the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations, every fourth year, a brief report of their activities, in particular regarding their contribution to the work of the United Nations (Quadrennial Report) general consultative status is reserved for large international NGOs whose area of work covers most of the issues on the agenda of ECOSOC and its subsidiary bodies. These tend to be fairly large, established international NGOs with a broad geographical reach.

The benefits of receiving this status include:

- ❖ The NGO may propose new items for consideration by the ECOSOC
- ❖ Organisations granted status are also invited to attend international conferences called by the UN General Assembly special sessions, and other intergovernmental bodies.

WFWP International maintains a UN office in New York City. WFWP International has twenty UN representatives in seven countries: Austria, Chile, Ethiopia, Lebanon, Switzerland, Thailand, and the US.
