Cach March, WFWP Oceania sends women delegates to New York for the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women. This year we have six women attending, five from Melbourne and the sixth is a WFWP youth leader from New Zealand. WFWP International will be holding two Parallel Events organised through CSW NGO and one



Side Event in the United Nations. During CSW62, we have the opportunity to network with women NGOs from around the world, participate in Side Events at the UN organised through UN Women, participate in Parallel Events held throughout New York, and attend the WFWPI events. It is especially advantageous for our Oceania delegates; we have the opportunity to meet with WFWP leaders from around the world and attend meetings in the evenings with our WFWP International leader, Prof. Yeon Ah Moon. After the first week of conferencing, we will attend the WFWPI Horizon Summit organised by the NY WFWP UN office. The week-end Summit provides a forum for senior WFWPI leaders and young women leaders to learn from each other, and share strategies of best practice.

Recently my husband and I have been reading a book by Damon and Coldy, The Power of Ideals. Eleanor Roosevelt is featured as a moral exemplar for her "enduring commitment to the ideals of social equality and her evident humility ... Roosevelt's humility went a long way toward disarming the strong egos of the world leaders she needed to line up behind the value-laden document [the UN's Declaration of Human Rights that she crafted] for which she was trying to gain worldwide acceptance." It was Eleanor's heart of empathy, caring and humility towards all people that brought to society the document of human rights that is still changing people's lives. Reading these pages made me think of Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, our founder. Dr. Moon is always encouraging us to live and pursue our work with the 'Mother's Heart' of unconditional love to make this world a peaceful place. Reading Eleanor's journey gave me courage that 'living by the logic of love' is not warm and fuzzy, but a powerful tool of change that brings long lasting results, and does transform lives.

Overview of the Women in Leadership Conference

Melbourne CBD, December 7-8th

Women leaders from a range of different fields including government, finance, ICT, sport, biotechnology, media and NGOs gathered together in Melbourne to attend the fifth Women in Leadership Conference. The theme for this year's conference was "Debunking stereotypes and bridging the gender leadership gap, one woman at a time". The conference offered opportunities to listen to thirty speakers presenting their views on panels or in round table sessions. While sharing their personal experiences, each speaker offered a range of solutions for women to employ when faced by the challenges in our Australian culture.

Anne Bellavance (President, WFWP Australia) was the keynote speaker for day two and her presentation titled A Conversation about Parity – equity vs equality vs parity focused on notes based on CSW61. During the presentation, Anne set the stage for attendees to recognise where we are at as women, and how we can instigate change by shifting prevailing mind-sets, attitudes and behaviours. While providing reflections on leadership of the heart, Anne described some of the policies that are working successfully on a global level along with some of the issues facing many developing countries which restrict the acquisition of equity.

A key point raised at CSW 61 was the necessity for an equal partnership between men and women if parity between genders was to be achieved. This was recognised by the WFWP when they pioneered the partnership model of peace building twenty five years ago. Women, Anne explained, are key elements in anchoring



the family and the community and their skills need to be recognised in order to create cultural change which encourages partnerships and ultimately parity between men and women. When this occurs, stability and ongoing peace are more likely to ensue.

Andrew Clark (Managing Partner for Boston Consulting Group – BCG) reinforced Anne's key points by sharing how his organisation is working towards gender parity by supporting 'Male Champions for Change' - a group of influential male CEOs in Australia. This group aims to use their individual and collective influence and commitment to ensure the issue of women's representation in leadership is elevated on the national business agenda.



A panel of speakers presenting their views on "Women who have travelled the road less travelled" inspired participants by recounting their journey towards achieving senior executive positions. They advised women to recognise their own potential by believing in themselves and by having a go. They reassured women that although it takes courage and strength to follow this pathway, the rewards were possible.

Another key speaker Susan Oliver, the Chair of Scale Investors, heads the Steering Committee for the 30% Club. The role of this Club is to lobby for 30% women on ASX 200 boards by the end of 2018. By doing this, she explained, a gender balance could be achieved on governing boards. Gender balance, she believes will not only encourage better leadership and governance but ultimately increased financial gains for both the company and its stakeholders.

In order to acquire a place on a Board, she advised women to strive towards leadership positions in the organisations to which they belong. Through networking with other organisations and getting others to recognise their talents, leadership roles could be achieved. She suggested that once women achieved a leadership role, they could redesign a workplace to allow other women to benefit. Cultural change, she believes, comes from a position of power so heading towards leadership positions would enable that change. She encouraged women to believe in themselves and to build on their personal resilience as this would help them to achieve success.

Head of SaaS Consulting for Aus/NZ in Oracle, Angela Mager then shared her views on the need for an emotional component within business. Leadership, she suggested, begins with the heart not the head. To encourage women to recognise the potential for success, she identified three changes in business which could energise women to feel a sense of hope.

i) Women's role in entrepreneurship: Currently, she explained it is easier for women to develop start-ups at a reasonable price as more people are investing in female entrepreneurs and the trend for blended teams of men and women is rising. Women are now investing in other women as more capital becomes available. The unconscious bias that existed within society about women is finally being challenged as more conversations are raised about this topic.

ii) Inside entrepreneurship: Women are now experiencing 'power' in a range of organisations as senior leaders. As members of blended teams and boards, women now have the power to influence decision making and change. Women, she believed, are in an enviable position to support their gender and to change the mindsets of their male colleagues. They now have the opportunity to voice their opinions and be heard. By operating in this style, women will also recognise the value of their female colleagues and thus the circle will widen. iii) Social involvement: Angela posed the question of whether or not we live in an economy or society to raise consciousness about the importance of human connections. Today, she warned, the hierarchical model of command and control is no longer viable. For businesses to thrive, building emotional and human connections are the key to success.

Continuing with valuable advice for leaders searching for advancement, Dr Jennifer Fitzgerald (CEO, Scope Australia and 2016 Telstra Victorian Business Woman of the Year) suggested that leaders need to build their own personal brand of operating. Endeavouring to build an authentic brand that engenders trust and confidence amongst their staff will have positive outcomes. Effective leaders need to be good listeners, not be afraid to share their emotions and most importantly, be ready to focus on the bigger picture to energise staff to work collaboratively towards the achievement of the business goals.

To conclude, Jennifer shared some of her favourite quotes which resonated with the audience as they encapsulated the themes of the day...

"You could certainly say I've never underestimated myself, there is nothing wrong with being ambitious." Angela Merkel

"Leadership is about making others better as a result of your presence and making sure that impact lasts in your absence." "In the future, there will be no female leaders. There will just be leaders." Sheryl Sandberg, author of *Lean In: Women, Work, and the Will to Lead.*

The Melbourne Family Church Choir accompanied by Rick McInerheney on guitar welcomed the gathering into the sanctuary with Christmas Carols.

While presenting his public address "Through the Eyes of Love", John Bellavance (UPF State Director) urged the gathering to see themselves as part of the journey established by God for the purpose of unification.

As members of the three organisations have specifically joined a movement for the realisation of God's ideal, each member, he counselled, has a role in the restoration of society towards an 'ideal state'. He invited each member to use the guiding principles of Unification Thought to work towards the creation of a society which was just, loving and prosperous. Through interdependence and the sharing of universal values, he acknowledged, mutual prosperity was attainable.

Unification Thought, John explained, is not a new religion but a systematic thought that outlines:

i) A blueprint for the order of society that satisfies God's purpose of creation and the inherent aspirations of human beings

ii) A finding of the cause of separation between God and human beings, between conscience and behaviours, and between people.

iii) How God has worked in history with human beings to restore the ideal.

In conclusion, John shared that human history is the history of the restoration of love. He encouraged the gathering to follow the advice of the poet Rumi who once said: "Your task is not to seek for love, but merely to seek and find all the barriers within yourself that you have built against it."







Then, it was time for Santa. Looking very Australian in his summer shirt and shorts, Santa arrived riding on a lawn mower! After making his way to the stage, Santa explained the reasons why he had to shed his heavy winter gear and assume an Australian persona.

After sharing some special gifts with all the chil-

Merly Barlaan visits Melbourne

Belgrave, February 10-11th

The Victorian Chapter of WFWP was honoured to invite Mrs. Merly Barlaan to Melbourne from WFWP Philippines for the week-end of February 10-11. Many of our community members participated in a get together on Sunday morning and our Board had the opportunity to share with her over coffee at Earthly Pleasures in Belgrave (one of our supporters).

Merly gave an overview of her activities as the WFWP Philippines President. The programs are explained in brief below:

1. WFWP Peace Leadership Conference for Social Development– An advocacy aiming to forge partnership between the primary pillars of social development: Government, Educators, and Civil Society Sectors, and to promote Heartbased, Parental Leadership paradigms by integrating the universal peace principles through the "living for the sake of others" leadership model in local and national governance system.

2. Mothers' Hearts Network: Mother's Raising Filial Children and Patriots for the Nation – a grassroots-based project, designed as a national campaign to provide vision, educate, inspire, and empower women to practise their role as women leaders and nation-builders by raising patriotic children, creating a community of peace-makers, using a feminine and holistic, soft power leadership paradigm to end all forms of corruption and promote peace and social development.

3. Patriots of the Nation Leadership Training Program – a holistic leadership training program for the youth, geared towards empowering youth to blossom to their fullest potentials, and become honourable future leaders and incorruptible stewards of the nation introducing the core leadership values of Pure Love, Filial Piety, and Patriotism.

4. Peace Village Movement: – is a family-centred, community-driven development program based on universal peace principles and organizational principles of Interdependence, Mutual Prosperity, and Universally Shared Values. This program intends to build model villages substantiating the over-arching goals of the UN Sustainable Development Goals through partnership with the local government units.

Books for Vanuatu Project

Sydney, February

While participating in a youth volunteer program in Australia for a year, Lina Tuzet from Canada visited Vanuatu to work on a service project there. On her visits to several schools there, she realised that most of the libraries were empty and this inspired her to make a change by promising to send them books to fill their shelves.

On her return to Australia, Lina was determined to fulfil her promise and embarked on a search for books in Sydney. One of the schools she contacted was Lycee Condorcet - a French School who willingly offered 67 boxes filled with French school books, stationery and educational games. Their generosity was most inspirational!

Donations of books and money were received from many other kind people in Sydney and a community in Montreal Canada. The money will be used to ship these boxes to Tanna Island in Vanuatu. Funds from WFWP Chapters will assist in sending these boxes to Vanuatu.

Giulia Iacono, a volunteer with WFWP in Melbourne who had accompanied Lina in Vanuatu, collected eight boxes of books in Melbourne which will also be sent to Vanuatu. The WFWP have been strong supporters of projects such as this one by providing finance and arranging shipping through known contacts.

Kalgin International Shipping Company in Sydney one of the WFWP contacts will ship these boxes to Vanuatu. This company has supported many of the WFWP projects over the years and we are grateful for their support.

Over a hundred boxes will be transported to Tanna which will involve a range of people in Vanuatu from customs officials in Port Vila to the boat operators and truck drivers. Without their help, this project would not be possible and we are truly grateful to all of them.

United Nations Affiliation

WFWP International became a "NGO in general consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations" in 1997. This status has continued to be renewed based on the preparation of the Quadrennial Report.

Consultative status is granted by ECOSOC upon recommendation of the ECOSOC Committee on NGOs, which is comprised of 19 Member States.

There are only 139 NGOs worldwide that hold the general consultative status. The requirements of this level of affiliation include:

- Applying organisation's activities must be relevant to the work of ECOSOC
- The NGO must have been in existence (officially registered) for at least two years in order to apply
- The NGO must have a democratic decision making mechanism
- The major portion of the organisation's funds should be derived from contributions from national affiliates, individual members, or other non-governmental components
- NGOs granted General Consultative Status must submit to the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations, every fourth year, a brief report of their activities, in particular regarding their contribution to the work of the United Nations (Quadrennial Report) general consultative status is reserved for large international NGOs whose area of work covers most of the issues on the agenda of ECOSOC and its subsidiary bodies. These tend to be fairly large, established international NGOs with a broad geographical reach.
- The benefits of receiving this status include:
- The NGO may propose new items for consideration by the ECOSOC
- Organisations granted status are also invited to attend international conferences called by the UN General Assembly special sessions, and other intergovernmental bodies.

WFWP International maintains a UN office in New York City. WFWP International has twenty UN representatives in seven countries: Austria, Chile, Ethiopia, Lebanon, Switzerland, Thailand, and the US.
