




Anne Bellavance

Charlotte Mukamuberwa

Charlotte currently works as a Senior Case Worker for the Victorian Aboriginal Childcare Agency (VACCA). Charlotte was vice-president of WFWP from 2017 to 2018 and is currently a Board member. Originating from Rwanda, she moved to Australia in 2005 under a Humanitarian visa and speaks five languages.

Jody Dontje is an inspirational young woman creating wide spread global change as a passionate International Humanitarian, Life Coach, Teacher, Tedx Talk Speaker, Co-Founder of FundMyCharityWork.com and Founder of The Help Nepal Appeal.

Jody, as a determined 25-year-old, dedicates everyday to empowering others to realise their full potential and to overcome disempowering conditions. Her non-for-profit humanitarian charity 'The Help Nepal Appeal' focuses on the education and empowerment of the three most vulnerable groups of peoples in Nepal: Youth, Women and Special Needs Peoples of low-socioeconomic backgrounds.

Furthermore, through her life coaching movement Empowered Coaching, Jody is transforming lives globally through in-person and online workshops / seminars that activate ones potential.



John Bellavance

John Bellavance has worked in the non-profit sector for over 30 years. In the 1980s he and his wife Anne worked with the African American community to fight crack cocaine. His efforts were recognised by the White House, were President Reagan sent him a letter of appreciation for his efforts to rid America of this social ill. In the early 90s he took this fight against drugs to his home country of Canada, were he was able to bring the issue of illicit drugs as a state campaign issue.

In Australia he is the National Vice-President of the Universal Peace Federation. He is also the Vice-president of Nelson Mandela Day Australia. He has just completed his PhD at Monash University on the role of values in the use of Information Technologies and teaches Information Technology in a Melbourne high school.



Charles Allen

The Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP) Positive Peace Framework provides opportunity for our research to support practical peace building and development at policy and community levels. Charles works with our existing and new partners to identify and support these opportunities.

Charles has an extensive history of working with partners. In his previous role with Victoria Police, Australia, his team led strategic and operational change in support of Aboriginal, LGBTI, Disability, Mental health, Multicultural, Youth and Seniors communities. His policing career including many years of operation service in general duties and investigations culminating in senior change management roles. Outside of policing he has been an active peace builder with experience as a director with not for profits and hands on project level for wide ranging social cohesion and capability building programs.

Greg Stone undertook postgraduate research in Diffraction Physics at Melbourne University, contributing to several international research publications on high-resolution electron microscope studies of various crystals. He taught at the University of Melbourne (for 4 years) and the University of Western Australia (for 1 year). He later entered the ministry and became National Director of the Family Federation for World Peace for six years. He then began work focusing on the interfaith area, working for the Universal Peace Federation in several Pacific nations. He is currently President of UPF Australia and Secretary-General of UPF Oceania Region.

**Robin Matthews** 

Robin has provided facilitation, policy development, training and project management services to government, community and business with an emphasis on stakeholder management, governance, ethics and strategic planning. Her expertise and experience is in the field of local and state government, education and training.

The ACFS was established in 1951 and promotes friendship and understanding between the peoples of Australia and China. It has a proud history in promoting friendship and has actively contributed to harmonious relationships between the two countries.

Fuga Alofipo Lio Ale was born in Apia, Samoa. He completed all his education in Samoa and graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce from the National University of Samoa in 2001. He started his banking career with the ANZ Bank Samoa. He assisted in establishing the very first Treasury Dealing Room with ANZ Samoa until 2003 when he decided to migrate to New Zealand. There he was heavily involved in the Pasefika Network and working closely with other business partners in hosting Financial Literacy and Managing Your Money Seminars focusing on the Pacific Groups. In 2013, he started a new life here in Melbourne which he now calls home. His current role is with National Australia Bank as a Senior Home Loan Specialist. He was arrested the following year and detained without trial for two years. Upon being released, Arthur went into exile and joined the Tanzania, East Africa Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

Arthur moved to Zimbabwe in the early 80's and took up post as Publicity & Information Director in Southern Africa for the Pan Africanist Congress of Azania (PAC). Graduated in Journalism at Michigan State University, USA and worked at UNITED NATIONS Radio International in New York. In 1990, Arthur moved to Australia and met his wife the following year. Currently, he is the President of Nelson Mandela Day Commemorative Committee.






**Hands for Peace**
