## Presenters

### Annmaree Sutton: Catholic Stories



Annmaree is the coordinator of a Jesuit Outreach Ministry team at Corpus Christi Community in Greenvale. She is a trained 'Giver of The First Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola' for the aged care facility of homeless men founded by Saint Teresa of Calcutta in the early 1970's.

A line in Leonard Cohen's song 'The Anthem' 'There is a crack, a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in' ... sums up my journey growing up with the foundations of a very traditional Catholic background. I did not have the maturity or the real understanding of what my Catholic

upbringing was asking of me. Over the decades and with many a twist and turn as I walked my labyrinth of life, my internal cracks stretched and splintered, corroded my thinking plundering me into my “dark nights of the soul”. My God of light and love has in time guided me to understand and truly know now that Love was never ever absent...never far from reach...was there constantly shining deep into my painful transforming cracks.

Love has been my constant navigation and with that Love, being immersed in that Love, slowing hearing, welcoming, and receiving that Love, I have come to understand with deep gratitude the gifts I received growing up Catholic. My cracks are still with me. The Light of Love continues to shine through, every breathing moment. And every breathing moment I now welcome all that is ahead of me, receiving the perpetual gifts of timeless Love and Peace.

With deep Love and gratitude, I wish to say I was a real great privilege to have been asked to share my story and to hear other women share their courageous and life inspiring stories.

### **Daniella Greenall: Unification Stories**



Born in Brazil, Daniela moved to Italy and obtained a Diploma in Tourism and Arts in Rome. In 1980 she Joined the Unification Movement in France and worked as a volunteer translator and supported peace events such as participating to bring down the Berlin Wall.

“My first experience with invisible reality, or mysticism, was through my dad's love for Jesus. I experience Jesus' love for Heavenly Father, for others, and his capacity to forgive his enemies. I feel that Jesus guided me to the Holy Spirit Association for World Christianity, now known as FFWPU (Family Federation for World Peace and Unification).



Mother Moon is a living embodiment of the same love. She is bringing together likeminded people who are working towards peace from all walks of life to manifest the power of LOVE.

I am committed to transform myself and work together to seize this golden moment and build an incredible foundation for our future generations.”

## Maureen Chen: Brahma Kumaris Stories



Maureen studied and taught Raja Yoga Meditation for over 40 years, establishing and sustaining Meditation Centres in Australia, Hong Kong, Cambodia, and the Philippines. Living in Hong Kong for 22 years, she was involved in networks promoting interfaith and values.

Maureen shared her experience of meeting her Chinese husband from Malaysia. His aim was to become a Buddhist monk and Maureen and her husband travelled to India to find a monastery to become a monk ... and nun! However, the practise was not a good fit and they returned to Australia, soon coming across the Brahma Kumaris. Maureen has now been practising and teaching Raja Yoga Meditation with the Brahma Kumaris for almost forty-five years, setting up and supporting centres throughout Asia, including Hong Kong, Cambodia, Singapore, Philippines, and Japan.



Recently publishing a book, *Mystic at the Edge: A Western Woman Coloured by Asia*, Maureen shares her spiritual insights from the 50 countries in which she has lived and taught; the psychology which she has experimented with and adopted; and her philosophy on life regarding the big questions.



## Anita Carter: Buddhist Stories

Spiritual Director and Abbot of the Buddhist Discussion Centre (Upwey) Ltd. Anita was born in India and her family settled in Australia in 1971. As Abbot and resident Dhamma Teacher she has maintained the key objectives of the Centre as a place of learning, practice, realisation, and preservation of the Buddha Dhamma. What have I learnt in the last 24 years? I

learned to give God a break! A lot I can do myself. According to Buddhism, all religions are good, and all peoples' beliefs are valid and truthful. Buddhism loves all religions and sees them as being needed by people at that time. God exist in all heavens and the Christian God is highly respected and honoured. Jesus Christ is seen as a great being.

I have learnt that life is difficult and that I need wisdom to operate and live well. I need all the help I can get, and so request help from all god's and all enlightened ones. One verse that we use



regularly to bless self, and others is:

May all blessings come to you, may all god's protect you; by the grace of all Enlightened Ones, may wealth ever abound in you! May all blessings come to you, may all god's protect you; by the grace of the Sacred Teachings, may wealth ever abound in you! religions.

To develop wisdom, I set about meditating daily and practising mindfulness to grow my concentration. To build my virtue, I keep the five precepts and practice generosity. I practice loving kindness and compassion daily.

## Barbara Galloway : Healing Stories



Barbara completed a Bachelor of Arts-Law. After practicing as an intellectual property lawyer, she ran the Victorian component of an Entrepreneurship and Business Planning program. Barbara left these endeavours in the late 1990s to become a Spiritual/Earth Healer, which became her passion and 'soul' purpose.

Barbara shared what she learnt through her path so far. Her main points were:

- Our thoughts absolutely create our reality.
- Segregation is an illusion.
- As we recognise and release our past, our old beliefs and old patterns, we become more magnificent and can embrace within ourselves the joyful, playful, and wise inner child who has divine feminine and masculine attributes.



Barbara invited participants to join in a mini workshop on visualisation and meditation to see themselves as part of a vast tapestry consciously co-creating Heaven on Earth.

## New Hope Academy Begins a New Chapter

- Opening of the new SunHak Building -

February 17<sup>th</sup> | Solomon Islands

**School Vision:** Establish an environment for students to have their own vision, and provide good and smart citizens within the Solomon Islands community.

### New Hope Academy Milestones:

- ◆ 2010- 2013 - Establishment and set up of the Preschool/ Kindergarten Division is completed.
- ◆ 2014-2020 - Establishment and set up of the Primary/ Elementary Division is completed.
- ◆ 2021-2026 - Establishment and set up of the Secondary/ High school division. In 2022, the Secondary Division will begin.
- ◆ 2027 - Establishment of the New Hope Academy student boarding facilities and services.

Honiara City, Solomon Islands has added another Primary School to its list of education providers with the official opening of the new classroom building for New Hope Academy. The availability of the new SunHak building has enabled the school to reach the peak of primary school education with the addition of Year 5 and Year 6 classes.

New Hope Academy classrooms are well constructed and offer a suitable and conducive learning environment. It is the first school in the country that uses white board and white board markers instead of black boards with chalk writing in the classroom. This will reduce dust from the classrooms. The ablution (toilet) blocks for boys and girls are a good standard compare to others in the country and have a full time cleaner.

WFP Australia donated school books which enabled New Hope Academy to set up the Library room to help students with their reading. With the library books the school has set up a reading program for students. WFP Japan provided tables, chairs and equipment for the new classrooms.



WFP Australia brought the school to another level with the staff office and students activities accessing the use of projectors donated to the school.

Leaders who attended the opening were all impressed to have this standard school set in the City of Honiara. Parents of New Hope Academy are really proud to have their children enrolled in this kind of school.

For the start of the new school year, 10 new teachers were posted to New Hope Academy through the Department of Education. The teachers commented, “we are blessed to come to a different environment from previous schools.” Teachers expressed their feelings that the school environment can change staff and students lives. New Parents are still rushing to the office to look for spaces for their children.

# History of New Hope Academy and Kindergarten

## 2000 - 2021 | Solomon Islands

**Year 2000** – The concept to establish a school began during the leadership of Dr. Song (Oceania Continental Director) by WFWP Japanese Missionaries, Solomon Island mothers, and the leadership from the Oceania Regional Head Quarters located in Australia who initiated the Oceania Leadership Training (OLT) program for Pacific Islands students. Upon the students training, the regional HQ gave money to the Solomon Islands chapter to purchase land for the school where the New Hope Academy Primary was built.

During the height of ethnic tensions during the same year, the International and Interreligious Federation for World Peace (IIFWP) and the Family Federation for World Peace (FFWPU) began a joint peace-building program of International Leadership seminars (ILC) in Honiara targeting a broad audience from scholars to community members.

The population of the City of Honiara and the number of school age children was increasing as many settlements were closed. The need for more schools in the countries capital became very clear.

The New Hope Academy school vision came strongly after receiving many recommendations from the ILC participants that school is one of the best institutions to rebuild peace and promote peaceful coexistence. As peace advocates, FFWPU local members who were teachers, doctors, nurses, lawyers, administrators, community leaders, women leaders, youth leaders and IIFWP Ambassador for Peace held meetings and decided to establish a school as a national tribute to quality education and to foster peace through peaceful coexistence. FFWP members bought land in Honiara and leased it to the Interim School Board to develop a school facility.

**Year 2011** - With the the united support of local members, Ambassadors for Peace and the FFWPU communities in Honiara, a meeting was held to discuss the new Kindergarten. Each family contributed \$SI 500. With the support of FFWPU, UPF and WFWP, the School Board renovated an old building and started the Early Childhood Education Division (ECE). The New hope Academy kindergarten open in February 2011 with the ECE Division only.

The School Development Plan Board of that time were: Dr. Kim (Oceania Continental Director), Chihiro Midiorokawa representing the Universal Peace Federation (UPF) was Chairman, John Galokaniki representing Family Federation for World Peace (FFWPU) was Vice-Chairman, Alice Anthonia Houanihau represented Women Federation for World Peace (WFWP) was Secretary, Chris Bokabule who served as FFWPU Educator had the Board role of member, Miki Hata who served as the FFWPU Treasurer had the Board role of treasurer, and Selina Galokaniki represented the teachers of New Hope Academy.
