Three Japanese songs accompanied by a guitar, rounded out the first part of our introduction into the Far East Japanese culture.

For the karate demonstration from Samuel and Camilla Pries, we went outside on the lawn. This gave the opportunity for physical relaxation, and following the well-practiced martial arts presentation, we could enjoy Japanese delicacies of all kinds.

Meanwhile a group of African bishops of the Brotherhood of the Cross and Star arrived and brought African conviviality into our room.

We were now a group of approximately fifty people, young and old, from Mongolia, Japan, India, Africa, America and various European countries. Gospel songs were sung, and over coffee and cake, there was ample opportunity to get to know each other, to take pictures and enjoy the informal atmosphere.
