A key highlight of the visit was the participation of four WFWP representatives at the Monaghan Peace Campus for the launch of Imagine an Island, a Threads of Peace creative writing project. The initiative

focuses on women's lived experiences, exploring themes such as motherhood, borders, identity, and resilience. The project demonstrated how personal testimony and storytelling can become powerful tools for reconciliation and peacebuilding.



The delegation also visited the Project Children 50th anniversary exhibition, gaining insight into the long-term impact of sustained community engagement and peace-focused initiatives.
