Approximately 50 individuals, spanning from ages three to 80, actively participated in the holiday card-making activity. The collaborative effort took place at the Hawaiian Mission Academy Ka Lama Ike in Honolulu, Hawai'i, as well as in the personal spaces of contributors.

Mrs. Marie-Francoise Mitchell encounters with veterans further enriched the experience. Meeting a blind veteran living in foster care left a lasting impression, and she expressed a desire to follow up on the connection. Another encounter with a nearly centenarian WWII veteran at the concert, who advocated living a life of gratitude, added a profound spiritual dimension to the initiative.





The journey of giving unfolded like a snowball, starting small and attracting like-minded groups eager to share the gift of joy and happiness. The culmination of this effort brought additional blessings, as WFWP's involvement was recognized in Hawaii's News Now (HNN) broadcast.
