Bob's favorite memories of his childhood were playing cowboys and later playing army with his friends and brother. He spoke often of visits to his aunt in Marietta, OK, where he rode the famed Silver Chief train. In high school he ran track and field and was a pitcher for the baseball team. He participated in the Boy Scouts for many years and excelled in his studies. Bob went on to Wabash College and earned a bachelor's degree in English

and psychology. During his college years, he met Rhonda at a summer job and they were married in June of 1970. This, however, was during the Viet Nam war and he was called to serve in the military. After basic training he was assigned to a medical unit and spent most of his service at Fort Riley, Kansas where he counseled soldiers returning from the war as well as their families.
