he Forty-third Day of All True Things was celebrated in Korea on June 7, 2005 at the Cheongpyeong Heaven and Earth Training Center.

To celebrate the forty-third Day of All True Things with True Parents, around 7,000 people traveled from around Korea to the Cheongpyeong Heaven and Earth Training Center, arriving at different times of the early morning of Tuesday, June 7, 2005.

The pledge service began at 7 a.m. While all in the audience stood with prayerful hearts, True Parents entered the main hall, lit candles and offered their prayers and a bow to God.

After that, Rev. Dr. Kwak Chung-hwan guided everyone from the five saints in the spirit world through the various types of regional and national representatives and the remaining members in the main hall to bow to the True Parents of humanity.

As there were some Korean politicians among the participants, Father spoke simply, briefly and joyfully and in the end he asked some of the elder members to sing songs. Father, Mother, Kook-jin nim and Kwon-jin nim also joined in the singing. Father said the conclusion is that with absolute love, absolute faith and absolute obedience we should relate to all things; then God's





will for the world of creation will be fulfilled.

The commemorative service ended with a prayer from Dr. Kwak and three cheers of mansei guided by Rev. Yang Chang-shik

The altar for this historic day is quite different from our past offering tables. The front is is lined with beautiful pants and flowers symbolizing the creation. Then seven tall white candles line the next area in front of the fruit.


Even the representation of fruit includes things that have not usually been part of the offering table such as tomatoes and sweet potatoes. We remain in prayer to receive True Parents' message.

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FOUNDER'S DISCOURSE ON UNIFICATIONISM

rue Parents entered at 7 am with Kook Jin Nim and Kwan Jin Nim. Also Shin Jun the son of Hyung Jin nim and special grandchild of True Parents came also.

Father began by lighting the candles at the offering table. Mother held his arm as he lit each candle. Then Father offered an historic prayer. In the prayer he prayed concerning the dispensational history and how when Father was voung the Christian Culture was prepared to unite all cultures if it could receive God's son. Through a long course of indemnity with great sorrow due to many delays this day has finally come. Father prayed that the True Parents and True Family could restore and com-

plete every condition and dream that was left unfilled by Adam's family. Father deeply thanked God for his love and encouraged God reporting that all Blessed Families are now coming forward to fulfill the will of heaven.

With incredible grace and heart, True Parents carefully bowed before God. It was so moving. Then True Parents took their positions behind the offering table. Then True Family members bowed accompanied by the wives of the great saints. Then the blessed Second Generation bowed and then all the congregation. After that the three primary nations, the continents, the representatives of the free world and communist world. The representatives of the Han family and the Moon Family bowed. Representatives of Judeo-Christianity, Islam, Buddhism, Confucianism and Hinduism bowed. Then representatives of the free world and the com-

munist world the Abel and the Cain Worlds bowed.

All these bows were offered to God in Gratitude for True Parents and for all the blessings of creation.

Then three cheers of Mansei was offered by Rev. Yoo.

There are good days and bad days. However, what is the center? This is the key point. Even though I have lots of dreams, there is no day or night or lunchtime in which I can take my mind off of the urgent task of heaven.

Did you live well in your life, or soso? Did you live a so-so spiritual life and go down? What is your situation? Real Unificationists cannot rest. They are consumed with an understanding of the time and the providence and are concerned with how to make the conditions to improve the direction of the world to fulfill the Will of God.

If you are going in the true way, you will be opposed and thus cannot be free or totally at peace. When you say "Mansei," you may feel free and happy. However if your family is opposed, your parents are opposed, your relatives are opposed, your society is opposed, the religions are opposed and the nation and world are opposed, can you be happy? Therefore we must digest and overcome all the difficulties, challenges, impossible situations, and frustrations to be able to achieve what Heaven desires.

Why does your father oppose you? Your mother? Society? If you have determination and confidence, you may feel you can overcome all of this. However, even Jesus and all the saints cannot answer so easily about overcoming all opposition.

We must see correctly. We must not have incorrect thinking. We must have the proper fam-

ily in the image of God. I have completed the course to establish marriage in the image of God.

The true plan for the family is not man's but God's. What is the meaning of all the things or creation? Why was the Day of All Things made? Why? Because of the human fall all things were lost to God. God lost His children and His kingship, as He had no one who would honor Him as the True

True Things Speech

Father and King of humanity.

The human condition of the fall not only imprisoned and trapped humanity but also imprisoned God and all things. What is the core of the Divine Principle? Which is first, faith or love? Which do you choose, faith, love, or obedience? Which is first? Even God created Adam and Eve with the mind and heart that he was creating standard and ideal. Even for God when Adam and Eve fell He had no path to go.

When we are playing a game of yute, if you don't have the pawns (the pieces to go around the board) can you play? You must have those pieces. There are five possible moves, Do, Kay, Kul, Yute, Mo. (someone said "back - do !!!" Father said, actually I added the back do !!!) For Yute we must understand the laws of the games and have all the components. The same is true for God to fulfill the ideal. All the components must be there and the key component for God to fulfill the ideal God needs man. Without man God cannot be fulfilled. (At this point, Mother was smiling at Father and reminding him of the time !!! Then Father said: Time is running along. Mother always asks me why I talk so long and she encourages me to be briefer so I can have lunch with the grandchildren. We must be thankful for Mother. Let's give Mother applause !!!! - Father then indicated that he will listen to Mother and focus on the key message. Their give and take here was extremely loving and beautiful. If Mother

doesn't encourage Father this way, he will push himself too hard even to the point of exhaustion. Mother is constantly helping Father to maintain his best possible strength and health. Father however, forgets about himself totally and is ready to push until he collapses. In this way Mother is protecting and supporting Father.) Father continued:

What is it that God likes most? It is love. Have you ever seen love? True love is invisible. Would God like to just have invisible love or would he like a topnotch son who could please him and even be king? What kind of true love would God like? Just imaginary love, mediocre love or substantial love with a son and daughter who understands him? He would like substantial love with a real son and daughter?

What is this thing called faith? You can have desire and ambition, but what is faith? The Chinese character for faith has a character for a person and a character for the word. This means that this cannot be centered on desire or ambition; it must be a person centered on the word. It must be centered on God. If ambition comes into the picture, it must be connected to an ambition to achieve absolute faith. When God began, He began with a standard of absolute faith.

Jesus started with this kind of condition. It was the condition of absolute faith. The only thing that God can truly assert is absolute faith. What is absolute faith?

It is the kind of faith with which God created His object man and woman. He created them with his whole heart with faith that man would respond. He cre-

ated with absolute faith with no automatic guarantee that man would fulfill.

Therefore which is first, faith or love. Absolute faith is first. With faith God created and only now is he experiencing the True Love that he had faith would come when man and woman perfected themselves in True Love. Then there are three values: absolute faith, absolute love and absolute obedience. Obedience means that you must fully discard all your attachments to self and concern for the body.

When absolute faith was set as God's standard, that was the basis on which He created His son and daughter. Isn't this how you should approach your husband and wife, with this kind of commitment? With absolute faith you are creating your object partner. With no automatic guarantee that Love will come back. But only faith that True Love will be realized. The greatest desire or act of God was to create His object part-

ner. God continued to invest Himself in order to perfect His partner. For a true partner to emerge there must be a clear subject. (At this point Father mentioned an interesting thing he observed in America. He said: Americans have a habit of easily going to the refrigerator at all times to get something to eat. Some people even walk in the house of their friends and simply go right to the refrigerator without even asking. If there is an owner of the house, the owner should be asked first. There should always be a subject partner and object partner to create a happy

balanced situation. The owner should give permission to go to the refrigerator. Then all is balanced !!!) (Everyone was laughing).

Are there any personal secrets between a true husband and wife? No. Between Mother and I there are no personal secrets; she knows everything about me, inside and out. Do you think it was easy to have my wife with me at all times? Many have thought how lucky I am that I have a young and beautiful wife. Yes, its true, however, I had to raise mother to fulfill the providence of God, this was not easy.

When God created His object partner, did He want that partner to be thousands and billions of times better than Himself? Don't you want your wife to be thousands of times better than yourself? Yes, our desire is that our object partner is better than us many times over. That is why parents are pleased when their children do better than they did. In terms of family or personal matters, there are no secrets. However on the way to establish an ideal nation, for the sake of the nation there can be secrets. But they are not personal.

However between husband and wife, we must have total trust and unity. The concept of a True Parent is the unique and universal concept that is loved by your spouse and children. The children whom God created are the raw material of true love and the foundation of

absolute faith and true love.

When God created you, He had to invest in Himself with absolute faith, absolute love and absolute obedience. You should invest in the creation and all things in this fashion. You should invest in your object partner in this way. If you can do so, God can be your very own. (You will be close to God.) When you go to a Korean house there is a living room or an pang. The owner is usually there. Then there is often a study and the father is usually there. Then



who is the owner in the living room? It is the grandfather. The mother is there to embrace all the children and unify them with the father, and through him to the grandfather.

What have I been doing for 50 years? It was preparation so that I could hold a coronation ceremony for the Kingship of God. Who was this held for? For who? For God. This is not a laughing matter. Now I ask the men. If there is a grandfather and grandmother, what keeps them together? Is it her face? No, it is through faith and commitment that hearts bind together in love. That is why they stay together. You must be able to teach these things to your grandchildren. I am happy that the dignitaries who are here can enjoy this talk and not leave. Some may say, how can the founder of this religion be using strong language and pushing the people strongly? It is good because the purpose is to cause everyone to open his heart and then come onto the path of going towards God. Its purpose is to save people.

Everything I say is based on experience. On the basis of absolute faith God then applied absolute love and absolute obedience to create His true object partner

That is the way He invested in the creation of all things. With all His heart He invested to create all things for His object partner. He did it so that He could create all the elements (plants, fruits and all creation) that would become nourishment for all humanity and become the elements to create His perfect object, humanity. He created with the heart to give joy to his object partner.

That is why we must have deep respect and reverence for all the creation. With this heart we should appreciate that the creation given by God is there to nurture and sustain us. This was done on the foundation of absolute faith, absolute love and absolute obedience.

However, the creation has never experienced true joy because the whole investment of God in creation was for the day

that it could sustain God's true object partners of true love. That is why the Bible says that the creation groans in travail awaiting the day of the revealing of the (true) sons of God.

That is why we are seeking to perfect ourselves in the image of God and totally respect the creation. This will bring the liberation of the creation.

Absolute faith, absolute love and absolute obedience are not just concepts. What does absolute obedience mean? Pok Chang (obedience), what

does it mean? Total living offering in a Chinese character has a cow and a lamb. It is the essence of total living offering, in which one is a total sacrifice. In the life of faith this is the reality. God wants absolute obedience.

If I hide everything I wouldn't be persecuted. But I don't hide the truth. This causes a lot of trouble. How about the VIP's here? Do you love me? Your laughter is a little stiff. We should become closer for the sake of Korea. We must serve God as our Parent. God's absolute faith,

absolute love and absolute obedience are that God will invest and invest to create His true love partner. His faith is that his object partner man will perfect himself and become his perfected object partner of True love. (that day has arrived in True Parents - this is why we can celebrate the Day of All True Things - the creation can rejoice because God's True Love Object partner has been realized and now they are multiplying throughout the world.)

There are many religions in the world, Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism and many others. Should they come together in harmony? Absolutely. That is God's Will. Before there is order however, there is obedience. Can the right hand tell the left had to come together? No. It is controlled by the center or the mind. When you walk your hands flow in balance from the left to right because of your mind as the center. Therefore the only way for religions to come together is by acknowledging that they all come from the one and very same God. Then they can flow in harmony together.

Chung Soo Won - are you here? The grandson of the founder of a great religion is here. Rev. Chung's grandmother was in the inside belly church. They would get caught in the holy spirit and dance without care. Our movement came out of this, and rumors were spread based on this. (Didn't David dance naked when he was caught up in the spirit?) (Father asked Rev. Chung to sing the song "Comsa Hamnida" that was sung in the inside belly church).

Then Father had several more songs for us. Then Rev. Yu from Japan sang, followed by Dr. Yang representing America, and then Rev. Kwak. Kook Jin Nim sang and brought the house down with "I Believe I Can Fly." Then Kwon Jin Nim did the same. It was great. Kwon Jin Nim sang very beautifully. Dr. Chang Shik Yang led three cheers Mansei. •

idea of the "spirit" of the message.

Unificationists must be totally serious about the family. We must live together with the absolute ideal. Offering the medicine of the way of the Principle is like healing the sick. We are bringing this kind of faith and development into our families. We must make a very clear foundation to live with all people. The whole family must be connected to the entire world. The family is the only way that this can be established. In the way of the family, you cannot just follow your wife or your children; you must follow the way of Heaven. I have been unifying seven enemy nations. Now is the time mentioned in the Bible when the sheep and the goats would be separated. Without this clarification, there will be no purifi-

In this period between the fifth and the eighth year, the family must be clarified and established correctly. All true family members must unite, centering on the family that has completed the ideal. All true families should unite in heart with True Parents; otherwise, Satan will not be completely rooted out of this world. Officials in Korea are coming to understand this providence. Through education and direction of the second generation, this path will become clearer.

The era of hunting yielded to the era of planting. I am leading a new pioneering era at this time. A pioneering tribe has emerged from history. The question is, can we be clear? We should have one mind to fulfill. We must have one mind to move toward the direction of Heaven. God has just such an idea. America or Russia cannot come up with an idea of how to go the way of Heaven. Only God can reveal this path. He is the Alpha and the Omega. Without God's way, people cannot be improved or developed. We must move on to a clear level based on an understanding of all these things.

Materialism must be overcome. Materialism centers on physical fulfillment. Without proper education, sexual desire can be taken in a physical, materialistic direction. Materialistic culture began with the hunting era and has moved through the eras of shelter and then land, becoming more and more attached to material values and measurements.

You must be absolute in your faith in God and True Parents. You must be absolute in going over the challenges of your family. Only then will the spiritual world help you. Where you go in the spiritual world is determined by your life here. If you do not live correctly, you may not go to the Kingdom of Heaven. You may go to another part of the spirit world and wait for thousands of years before getting there. We must go the way of the Principle.

Do you sleep naked with your spouse? This is a crucial part of restoration. I am very serious about all details of how to establish the ideal family as a base to enter the Kingdom of Heaven. If my

grandchildren live correctly, they will go to heaven; if not, they will go some other place. I am teaching my daughters in law that they must go the right way. If they do not, there will be problems. We must go the way of the family, centered on True Parents.

I have taught about the core of history. Without knowing history, you cannot go the right way. Through history, all things have been revealed very clearlv. (Mr. Yoon, the secretary general in Korea, is establishing this history.) Many times in history people in Japan believed that they could dominate and overcome the whole world. Though Japan or other countries may look at things this way, we have to see what is going on in the spiritual world. From the spiritual world's perspective, Japan's history is complicated; due to this, it cannot go forward easily to lead other nations. Therefore I love Japan

and try to help it overcome this history and the reality of the spirit world.

As a spouse and mother, a woman gives all of her body for the sake of her family. Even her bones are given to help the children. Everything is sacrificed for them.

Confucius and Buddha should be able to work from the spirit world to solve the final problems of communism. The communist system has a clear ideology to establish the nation at the sacrifice of the individual and family. The free world was destined for absolute trouble if the communist world had fully realized a nation. America is crucial in this regard. America must connect with God. If we don't move America the right way, the free world cannot assume its proper role and America's foundation will be lost.

I cannot accept an offering that is not complete or successful. I am totally victorious and have overcome everything. Therefore you must do the same victoriously to fulfill. Dr. Yang, please don't think that we can go the pragamatic way that sometimes seems best in America, I am telling you that if we go this way China will pass America. America must come to God.

We do not have to reach all the people. Rather, we must find the crucial family or tribe that determines the direction of the nation. Although there are many apple trees, there is one that is the center from which all trees can be engrafted. It is crucial that you find the central tree.

That is why Cheong Seong Gyeong is crucial. Through Cheong Seong

The founders of the great religions tried to do the best they could for their purpose. When I look at people, I can see their ancestries and historical backgrounds. Without the right ancestors and historical foundation, you cannot be chosen for the providence.

When I go to the spirit world, no president or religious founder or any one else in history will have a condition to accuse me of anything. Therefore the spirit world totally supports and respects me.

When I relate with Shin Jun Nim, the son of Hyung Jin Nim, I feel that there isn't any kind of indemnity connected with him. We are setting the condition of loving Shin Jun. So many of the grandchildren seek grandfather's attention. Father loves all the grandchildren; however, some are seeking his love more agressively.

Your own family is certainly most important, however you also must understand more about the real meaning and value of the True Family from God's perspective. You must go deeper to understand its importance in dispensational history. Mother and I have gone over

all the mountains now.

Jesus was to have three people supporting him: John the Baptist, his father, and his mother. Because they couldn't fulfill, then the three disciples failed. I am very grateful that one of my inlaws is helping me in the Yeosu area. He lost his wife; so to overcome his loneliness, he has dedicated himself to the front line once again.

Mr. Kamiyama and Mr. Furuta: You made the effort to try to plant a seed in America. Then I sent you to South America. There you could make a con-

> dition representing the Mother in loving Abel and Cain. Your mission is to unify North and South America. That is why I brought you back to America.

> The time may come that there may be many people living in miserable situations; you must be aware of that. You should select 200 people from each country, based on their accomplishments. They should be in charge of the wild olive trees. They must be responsible for the fruit in the providence, even from outside our families.

> By August 20th all Tribal Messiah blessings must be done. Dr. Yang, if you don't have the opportunity in Korea, you can bless many Koreans here. Christianity in America will support you. The Muslims and all other religions are supporting you.

If Christianity had truly followed me 50 years ago, the world would be so different. It was such a serious crime that

the Christian university, Ewha Women's University, kicked out our students and professors. It made such a huge providential problem.

Based on history, I am trying to save the religious world and the political world together. I am trying to save Kim Jong Il. If the current prime minister in China doesn't do well, he will decline. The 2008 Olympics will be in China. The theme should be: True Love and True Family. America should know that China is doing its best to bring me

Internal value, centering upon the heart, will be the center for the future. We will have a special event in China on August 20. Confucian philosophy doesn't clearly know the distinct personality of God. The Chinese call their king the "son of heaven". Chinese characters reveal that the Chinese don't know the character of God. But now in a time of difficulty, they want to sup-

I understand all these things. Therefore, Dr. Yang, I'm trying to bring the foundation of America to China. If China gives me an opportunity, it will rise. Based on China and America we can bring peace, America must understand what the IIPC is doing.

We can connect Alaska to Russia with a bridge. We should mobilize our foundation to support this. (Father then looked at the map on the computer. He

Inaugural Meeting of the Executive Committee of the ACLC of Northern California

n May 20-21, 2005, the Inaugural Meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Clergy Leadership Conference (ACLC), Northern California Chapter was held at the San Francisco Hilton at Fisherman's Wharf. There were a total of 18 attendees, including nine Christian clergy and nine members of the Interfaith/ACLC Committee of the Bay Area Family Church

In his opening remarks, Rev. Dr. Man Ho Kim (Chairman of ACLC of Northern. California) warmly greeted and thanked all the participants for attending this historic meeting. He then stated the three purposes of the meeting: 1) education of the mission of ACLC, 2) practical aspects of our local ACLC organization and projects, and 3) fellowship together. He said that Rev. Sun Myung Moon, the founder of ACLC, is praying for American clergy to unite together across racial, denominational and ethnic lines to bring a moral revolution to this nation, and to return America back to her founding principles and create one nation under God, and ultimately one world under God.

Next, as meeting coordinator, Rev. David Rosenblum (Secretary-General of ACLC, Northern California) invited all the participants to introduce themselves and their hopes for the two-day meeting. Dr. Amos Brown, pastor of Third Baptist Church in San Francisco, talked of the importance of bringing peace here in our neighborhoods as

well as working for peace in Israel and elsewhere. He spoke of the Young Male Literacy Conference that he and Pastor Brondon Reems of Center of Hope Community Church in Oakland are organizing for Saturday, July 16, at the Oakland Airport Hilton.

Rev. Victor Medearis, pastor of Double Rock Baptist Church at Hunter's Point in San Francisco, told us to "Be of good courage!" as we do our work, and that "God is going to have to use some Tsunami Power to bring America to her

said, "If we're going to have True Peace, History of ACLC and Our Purpose Now." we're going to have to have a True Community - and that begins in the family." He elaborated upon his deep experiences he had with our recent peace pilgrimage to Jordan and Israel, and how he was looking forward to share some his testimony at the upcoming Community of Faith prayer breakfast meeting on May

Pastor Reems said that at a recent IIFWP Conference in Washington, DC,

His powerful message set the tone for our gathering. He said, "There's a fire raging across America and the whole world, so everybody needs to get their hands to the pump to put it out! We've no time to argue about theological differences of this or that, but to work together!" Imploring the clergy, he said, "God is calling you to something great! And when God calls you, you've got to go, even when trouble comes your

themes of ACLC are: Rebuild the Family; Restore the Community; and Renew the Nation and World." He said, "The family is the school of love...and the biggest problem in the world is the breakdown of families ...(and how) we need to be re-parented in order to grow and reach our God-given potential." Rev. Thompson said that Rev. Moon is asking each pastor to conduct a Holy Wine Ceremony for married couples in their congregation. "Holy Wine is communion to the

couple...The pastor should have at least three Blessed Couples (i.e., those who have received Holy Wine) as their primary supporters; then the pastor will have strength to do his ministry." Addressing the youth problems in our communities, Rev. Thompson said, "We have to raise our children with character-building programs." At the close of his message, he explained that everyone gathered was being invited to be members of the ACLC Northern California Executive Committee, and that we should have bi-monthly meetings.

We then broke up into three discussion groups. The first group discussed the topic: "Promoting Marriage Blessing Revivals in Churches, and Helping Churches Grow". The second group discussed: "Effective Strategies and Programs to bring Clergy together beyond Race and Denomination." The third group discussed: "Identifying the Needs of the People in our Communities, and Creating Programs to Meet Those Needs". The discussions were dynamic and fruitful, with many ideas on the kinds of projects we can work on together.

During our lunch break, we felt extra blessed to be joined by Mrs. Patricia Fleischman, president of WFWP here in No. CA. She shared, with a mother's heart, about the ongoing Womens' Middle East Peace Initiative, and inspired nearly all clergy to support this important signature campaign.

This was followed by reports by each of the discussion groups; it was an important opportunity for participants in each group to hear, and learn from, what the other groups had discussed. Rev. Kim gave closing remarks saying, "This meeting has brought us closer together as religious leaders, and as brothers and sisters. God needs us now! Let us continue to deepen our bonds with each other and work to bring God's love and healing to our communities."

It was an uplifting and encouraging meeting. We got both inspired with God's word and motivated to take action. This is now a great foundation to build upon and accomplish effective ACLC activities at the local level.

Special thanks to Rev. Man Ho Kim and Rev. Kevin Thompson for calling together this important meeting. Also, special appreciation goes to Rev. David Rosenblum and Mr. Michael Irwin for preparing many of the practical and organizational details for the meeting, and for the rest of the BAFC Interfaith/ACLC Committee and participating clergy for helping make this meeting a great success. �

I'm even thinking about Shin Jun and where his wife will come from.

Words of wisdom from Dr. Cole included his recommendations to stay committed to lifelong learning, learn to dance, don't become too materialistic, get married, and have fun.


Most of the graduates will be heading to college but many will first serve as volunteers with STF for two years.

UB re-Accredited

The University of Bridgeport Wednesday won five-year reaccreditation from a unanimous state Board of Governors for Higher Education. The board also voted to accredit UB's online bachelor's degree program in dental hygiene, and to license a doctoral program in computer science and engineering at UB. University President Neil Salonen assured the board that there has been a "sea change" on campus since the state's last visit. Enrollment is up. Private donations, particularly among alumni, are up. And red ink has finally turned to black.

"We have a balanced budget and we're proud of it. We still have a number of tasks ahead of us," he said. "It's completely different from what it was."

Board member William A. Bevacqua of Trumbull said he is pleased the university has been able to wean itself from the Professors World Peace Academy, which gets its money from the Rev. Sun Myung Moon's Unification Church.

"I was very much concerned about it. There were some suggestions that there would be an attempt to influence curriculum and student mindset at the time. That obviously never materialized," he said.

Bevacqua said Salonen has done an admirable job to restore UB to its former prominence and go in new directions with programs such as chiropractic and naturopathic medicine.

Bevacqua said he's also pleased that UB is gaining support in the Bridgeport-area community. He cited former People's Bank President David A.E. Carson's recent matching-gift challenge as an example.

Both the New England Association of Schools and Colleges and Connecticut's Board of Governors of Higher Education want UB to supply a financial and enrollment report by Dec. 15, outlining enrollment projects, donor support and plans to generate revenue by selling unused campus buildings.

By the spring of 2007, UB is asked to submit a report that details the university's financial stability, relationship to the Professors World Peace Academy and its debt and related convenants.

"We just want them to corroborate what they say they're doing," said Jonas Zdanys, an associate commissioner of higher education. "It looks a whole lot better than it used to," added Commissioner of Higher Education Valerie Lewis.

The license UB received to start a doctoral program in computer sciences and engineering would make it the third in the state to offer such a program. Currently, such Ph.D. programs are offered only at Yale and the University of Connecticut in Storrs.

UB officials say the program would build on its existing bachelor's and master's degree programs in computer science and engineering that in 2003enrolled 450 students.

The program would enroll up to five full-time and four part-time students in the first year and as many as 25 full- and part-time students by its third year.

The accreditation of the online bachelor's-degree program in dental hygiene would solidify a program UB has offered for two years.

Meg Zayan, director of the program, said only 16 percent of dental hygiene students go beyond the required associate's degree. More would stay on for a bachelor's degree, putting them in line for jobs in management or teaching, if it were more convenient.

The online program would be offered worldwide and would not require students to set foot on campus. The state board's unanimous approval follows the 10-year reaccreditation UB received recently from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

offering prayers at the Madison Square Garden Blessing.





















ACLC NJ New Jerusalem Family Church


Sunday was unbelievably successful! It was such a wonderful mixed gathering of an


Afterwards, numerous people, one by one, came up to me, begging me for a copy of a tape of the sermon. It was all recorded by a camcorder and will be available on DVD.

H e called the members of the audience to deepen and broaden their perspectives.



he looks like his father in his youth. Following the Unification tradition, Mr. Moon was matched 8 years ago to his wife. They have already 4 children.

All day the boats would head out to find the best spots to fish on the Hudson. It was amazing to see all the boats and to know that we can build such fast beautiful craft.


During the holiday and the fishing tournament there was time to meet many leaders and members whom we have not seen in many years. This led to many late nights, laugh-


and listen a little.

Youth Meet in a **Haitian Church**



2005 PEACE CUP KOREA PSV-Lyon Rematch Set in Suwon

SV Eindhoven will see their Champions League quarterfinal counterparts Olympique Lyon again in South Korea on July 20, as both are drawn into Group A of the Peace Cup tournament, which will be played July 15-24.

Suwon, Kyonggi Province was picked to be the battlefield for the rematch of the top teams of the Netherlands and France. South Korea's Seongnam Chunma were also drawn in the same group, and will play against PSV in the opening match at Seoul World Cup Stadium on July 15.

Led by former South Korean national team manager Guus Hiddink, PSV beat Lyon after a penalty shootout in the quarterfinals of the Champions League earlier this month. South Korean internationals Lee Young-pyo and Park Ji-sung contributed to the win by playing full minutes in both home and away games.

This is not the first time for the two clubs to meet in South Korea. In 2003, PSV defeated Lyon 1-0 with Mark van Bommel's penalty in the rain-soaked final match of the inaugural Peace Cup event.

`We didn't expect to play against each other again in this competition," said PSV's press officer Pedro Salazar-Hewitt after the drawing ceremony held at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in Seoul on Thursday. ``We are becoming friends recently because we see each other so much during the

year. But we hope we get the same result from last time."

Lyon's press official Olivier Blanc agreed that they are building a special friendship with PSV, but looked less positive.

It was very exciting two years ago. And the result of today's draw is also exciting, but I have to admit that we will have a tough time," Blanc said through an interpreter. "We saw that PSV are a very strong team a few weeks ago. And we found that the Korean team was hard to beat last time."

Along with hosts Seongnam, eight clubs from all over the world are divided into two groups. Each team will play three games in the group stage, with top-placed teams meeting in the final match.

PSV earned a seed in Group A as the winner of 2003's event, and rest of the participants were grouped by continents, with each group having two European teams and one South American side.

The Peace Cup was started in 2003 by Chunma and their owner, Sun Moon Foundation, following the success of the 2002 World Cup in South Korea.

The organizers said that they are planning to arrange tour packages for foreign fans who want to visit South Korea to see the games, and is also negotiating for the broadcasting rights in Japan and Southeast Asia. 🌣

In a way this was for me the nicest experience, talking to children, who are still more pure in their hearts than the student-type of people we usually approach. Very refreshing. And also for them I think it was a wonderful experience. Some of them said they want do the same thing as we do, serving the community, living for something greater than their own desires. I hope they will remember us, not only

us as people but for what we came there, for making a change, for giving them a hand and making them feel special and loved.

And then, on the last day, we had of course, reflections and a graduation "banquet" with pizza and cake. Very yummie. Everybody got a certificate of appreciation for their participation. But at the end of this we were blessed with another nice surprise. The principal came to say goodbye to us and to express her deep gratitude for what we did for her school. She had writ-



ten a certificate for each one of us by hand, and she even gave one nhoto to everyone as a memorv. I real-

ly felt grateful towards this lady. She was so touched by our effort and good will. Even though sometimes it wasn't too easy, I had my little struggles here and there during these days, feeling so much appreciation can make all this fade away and the feeling that stays is. ...wonderful? Just simply peace maybe. Ah, that's why it's called Service for Peace? Hm.. maybe not, anyway, when I remember this time. I will definitely feel nicely warm and peaceful inside my heart. Europe's Spring of Service

he five-day pilot project of Serrice For Peace in Europe, titled "Spring Of Service," was held in four nations: France, Slovenia, Czech Republic and the United Kingdom.

In France, the Spring Of Service (SOS) focused on the theme of interreligious dialogue; in Slovenia on education and service to local public schools; in the Czech Republic on youth interrelations; and in the UK on national volunteerism week

Each project involved a five-day program. In France, the project ran from May 19 to 23 and involved 25 youth full time, with a total of 40 volunteers participating in the different activities. This

program produced 1100 hours of service at an estimated value of 15.000 Euros.

The first day was dedicated to an orientation for the core group of 25, representing 11 different nationalities. The educational materials included the SFP Path-Makers manual. The different games, video and evaluation helped the group to come

together and build a strong team spir-

On the following day, the volunteers started a service project, in cooperation with an intergovernmental association, at a youth center located in the city of Corbeil-Essons. The volunteers cleaned and landscaped a

garden at the youth cen-

To have a feeling of the location, the local youth leader guided the group to a local fair where the participants could see the incredible variety of ethnic groups represented in the city, particularly by the people selling their products in this open market.

The local youth also joined with us and offered a barbeque for the group. On the same day, the city mayor, also a senator in the national assembly of France, invited the group to the city hall for a meeting and presentation. We fulfilled the goal of cleaning the area on the following day, Saturday.

On Saturday also we visited a synagogue run by Rabbi Sarfarati, who is also involved in dialogue with other religions. Rabbi Safarati gave a detailed presentation on the Jewish faith and today's situation in Israel and France.

The service section of the program who shared with closed on Sunday with a visit to the main Mosque in Paris and with an interactive program in the afternoon with the youth from the Christian Coptic church, in the city of Ville of Villejui.

We were introduced to their tradition by a presentation of Father Moussa and later the SOS group played sports and games with the youth group of the church. We were the first international and non Coptic group to relate with them. The day was closed with a banquet at the church and later with the usual SFP daily evaluation.

We had a full day of reflection, and evaluation was set with the entire group plus a visit to a traditional French cas-

> At the closing banquet, we invited three religious leaders to represent their faiths: Imam Mamadou, Rabbi Drey and Father Moussa. They fully participated and shared with the group. Each participant received a certificate of appreciation and the program closed with a final evaluation and a strong word of thanks to all.



Kladno, Czech Republic The project in

the Czech Republic was organized by Service for Peace together with the International Relief Friendship Foundation under the auspices of the city of Kladno.

We had 31 participants plus four staff members including Bryant Murriel who came from Miami, USA to lead the project. I am sure we embodied the integrated Europe or even the integrated world since we were people from 12 nations: Czech Republic, USA, Australia, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, Sweden. France. Malta, Italia, San Marino, and Denmark.

Deputy Meyer ame to greet the participants at the begining of the program and at the end, he came to present certificates to them and appreciate their effort and contribution to the city. Our program was full of interactive style games, team building and leadership building games. We also had three lecturers speaking on various topics with discussions after. The director of a local volunteer centre, speaking about voluntarism, lecturer

participants about history and uniqueness of the Romani population and a guest from another NGO working toward connecting people of different ethnical, cultural backrounds.

Among the Czech praticipants there were two students from an orphanage. They

said that participating in this project made them start a new life. As a contribution to the city, we painted a fence around a kindergarten. A local newspaper printed an article about our program and two Czech participants will write articles to local and school newspapers in a second town.

Also we performed a cultural program for seniors at a social center in

Kladno. The program was called "One world". There were about 20 seniors and they were very moved by this youth and their performance.

We also visited an aqua park, having a lot of fun, and also the museum and a mine exhibition since Kladno is a for-

mer mine city. In this way, the participants could have a deeper connection to the area where they were working and staying.



This service project we did in Slovenia lasted for five full days and every day was different in activities and experiences. On the first day, we basically got to know each other, played many games, got to know what the con-

cept and purpose of SFP is and also did goal setting and introduced Core Values. The participants were Hungarian, Slovenian and Croatian.

The second day we were put into teams. In my team, communication was really difficult and within the team there was no one who could translate, so there had to be always someone else translating

for us. For me personally, this situation was quite challenging. Two boys in my team had a different idea of what a team is. They focused more on the work and on their friends than try-





ing to talk to the team members. So as team leader, I really wished there was more unity in the team. I know that most of the other team members tried sincerely to create a nice atmosphere and I'm really grateful for that.

A really good aspect of this SFP was,

that we emphasized values a lot. Every day had one Core Value as the theme for the day. We even had a presentation for all the students of this school where each team present-

ed one Core Value in a really inspiring and creative way.

For the first two days, we painted some classrooms and corridors, restored their playground and the surrounding of the school. Sometimes, students who

were not participating in the SFP came out of their rooms to help us. Even teachers came to express their gratitude and the headmaster came and took pictures of each one of us.

On another day, we went to the Adrenalin Park where we did crazy stuff like climbing a wall, riding this huge swing, and jumping from a high

wooden pole. Sometimes we had the feeling that death was really close doing these crazy things and afterwards, everybody was kind of more alive and really excited. This was an amazing experience and I'd like to do this kind

The program opened with an invocation offered by H.E. Pierre Tang of the Byzantine Catholic Church in Cameroon, followed by the opening address given by the IIFWP Cameroon Secretary General Mr. Pius Mbu

cational institutions.

Manchang. Special thanks were given to the Ambassadors for Peace who helped to sponsor the event.

The Chairman of IIFWP Cameroon, the Hon. Francis Nkwain presented the main speech on the theme "The World at a Turning Point" which referenced Rev. Kwak's speech from 2001. He shared his appreciation for all the efforts the founders, Rev. and Mrs. Sun Myung Moon, have made over the years to build a world of peace and proudly concluded that they were the ones who honored him with the title of Ambassador for Peace. His points were very profound and inspiring to the participants as he feels that the founders are like his parents.

The next speaker was Mr. Siakam Tchamo an Ambassador for Peace and a prominent entrepreneur in Cameroon. who attended the last conference in Korea and in the United States. Pierre Tang of the Byzantine Catholic Church shared about his recent trip in Korea where he was invited to participate in the Leadership and Good Governance Conference and the founder's Birthday Celebrations. His testimonies created so much excitement, particular his mention of the peace initiative in Israel.

After this came the long awaited Award Ceremony. The Minister of State, Mr. Augustin Frederick Koock had the distinguished honor of presenting the certificates to all the new Ambassadors for Peace who were present for the ceremo-

a solution.


























Chicago's Monthly ACLC Prayer Breakfast

Westrock Church Epworth Retreat

estrock Church, NY, held its second retreat on April 23rd and 24th at Epworth Methodist retreat center, in upstate New York, near

On a rainy Saturday morning we drove about an hour and a half up the New York Thruway to Epworth Farm. A Methodistowned retreat center, Epworth features an old farmhouse overlooking beautiful meadows and a winding river.

The program began with a reading from Father's words from the first assembly of World Religions, to shine some light on the retreat theme: "Unificationism: Church, Federation or Movement? - Does it Matter?"

I gave a brief talk about my background and what led me to help organize the retreat, and presented some guidance about what retreats are in general. This was followed by Jack LaValley's presentation about the importance of balance between organizational needs and the

needs of members, and why that is often an issue for religious institutions, including

We then took a short walk over to the dining hall for a delicious lunch. After, we divided into two smaller groups to address prepared

questions relating to the retreat theme (see the separate detailed discussion notes). After a break for time to walk on the scenic grounds, talk or just sleep, we gathered to report back about the discussions. This was wrapped up with an explanation by Philip Shanker on his thoughts about the differing missions of UC/Family Church and FFWP, and a proposed organizational plan he's working on at national headquarters.

Dinner followed (crab cakes, chicken, baklava). The conversation continued informally, with much fun and laughter. After, some had to leave while those who were staying the night settled in to watch a movie - Luther. Some talked until the small hours.

The next morning we decided to share personal testimonies and in turn, we each talked about our life and journey for awhile. For me, this was the most affecting portion of the retreat, it felt like a sacred experience to hear about some aspect of each person's life story. This took us until lunch.

Thus ended our stay at Epworth; we

drove over to the Unification Theological Seminary for the final portion of the program. Here, Gillian Corcoran gave an interesting talk introducing the labrynth; its origins, meaning



and what to expect. Then we all walked the labrynth which is essentially a prayer walk, that guides you on twists and turns to end up in the center. Labrynths have symbolic and archetypal meaning that are a spiritual guide; it was a great way

to finish. After final testimonies about the retreat overall as well as walking the labrynth, we ended the retreat with a prayer in its center.

I felt the discussions were honest, respectful as well as humorous. Did we solve any of the questions about the theme: "Unificationism: Church, Federation or Movement? Does it

Matter?" Not definitively, and we probably raised many further questions. At least for me, however, through the discussions we were able to move towards

some level of resolution in some

It seems we are not a movement anymore. Yet we are not entirely comfortable with the idea that we are 'just' another religion; we have high hopes of being more than that - but there is not a lot of clarity as to what.

The issue of our formal identity as to UC / Family Church and/or Family Federation is quite unclear and that lack of clarity extends to national headquarters. Some participants who have a formal role at headquarters said they were interested in working to clarify the distinction; apparently a proposal about this is being developed.





Some of the cultural issues in our movement spring directly from the founder and are consequently hard to change. But we do need to accept the paradox that at least some of the roadblocks to the development of the church/movement come directly from the founder.

One theme that repeatedly came up is the sense that there's a strong connection between our individual spiritual development and our ability to do God's work. They are two sides of the same coin: personal development goes hand in hand with community development and vice

versa. And it seems our church culture is weak in this area.

In conclusion: I felt there was a level intimacy and commonality created during the retreat that was hopeful and healing, even though there were many different viewpoints about the theme. New relationships were formed, existing ones strengthened, and the overall experience felt like a small slice of heaven.



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and driving home the point that we are the little "g". Please read his book to deeply understand what this means. Sacred Circle Serves Needs of the Community

his is the most wonderful thing Unification has ever done for the community" said life-long Barrytown resident and neighbor of UTS, Sandy. As she hugged me gratefully and kissed both my cheeks, she added, "It is such a blessing for our community." Sandy was speaking about the Labyrinth at UTS.

Since my husband and I built the 80 foot, outdoor labyrinth in 2002, hundreds of people from the community at large have come to the beautiful and sacred grounds of the seminary, and sought peace and communion with God as they walked the labyrinth's circuitous path.

People are drawn by the incredible sense of inner peace and well-being walking a labyrinth brings. "I don't want to leave, it's so peaceful here," is an oft heard expression as people linger, sitting beside the labyrinth, reflecting, writing in journals, or watching others as they journey through it's winding paths.

Walking a labyrinth is often described as a spiritual pilgrimage, a centering prayer or a walking meditation. Labyrinths are not mazes. The one path of a labyrinth leads to the center. Walkers can relax, trusting the path, journeying inward to their own centers as they move to the center of the design. The labyrinth acts as a mirror. All that happens within its sacred space can be seen as a metaphor for our life's journey, reflecting where we are at this moment in time, allowing us to see ourselves and our life's patterns with clear-

Three phases can be recognized when walking a labyrinth: 1) journeying inward (purgation), a time for letting go, releasing/purging, breathing deeply and being present in the moment. Everyone sets their own pace. Some coordinate each step with their breath as in a Buddhist meditative tradition. Children usually race along the path to the center, eager to be the first to arrive. Yet I've also seen a child, arms laden with lilacs- a gift she brought for the center-walking slowly in thoughtful procession, in preparation for her love offering. I have been known to charge straight to the center, beckoned by the loving embrace of God waiting to bathe me in love and light. I've shared such intimate moments of time beyond time with God in this sacred circle.

2) Arriving at the center (phase of illumination) can be a time of receiving God's love and "letting in" divine guidance. Having emptied and cleared the heart and mind during the inward journey, space is created to receive what there is for each one to receive. Every labyrinth walk is a unique experience, so what we need to let go of and what we receive varies from walk to walk. Being in the labyrinth is an intuitive experience, and each person stays in the center as long as feels right for

The rosette pattern, of which the center is comprised, represents God and is composed of "petals" symbolizing the six realms of creation: mineral, plant, animal, human, spiritual/angelic and mysterious divine, (order from the left as you step into the center). Spending time in one or all of the petals allows connection with the healing energies from each realm.

3) When ready to leave the center, the outward journey follows the unicursal path back out of the labyrinth (union/integration phase). The walker returns to the world, empowered to

> take action, often with new insights and inspirations, encouraged to take on a larger life, with more to

The effects of walking a labyrinth are usually felt immediately, although occasionally they may not be apparent for some time. Walking the labyrinth promotes physical, emotional and

spiritual healing. It's a good idea to walk as part of an ongoing spiritual practice. The labyrinth is a universal spiritual tool. Anyone from any religious tradition or spiritual path can walk and benefit from it.

Labyrinths first called to me five years ago when reading, "Walking A Sacred Path" by Dr. Lauren Artress. Since then I've walked almost a thousand times, beginning with one painted on canvas laid out in a gymnasium. For a year I walked an outdoor labyrinth at a Dominican Sisters retreat center. It was during a labyrinth retreat I attended there, that God called me to build one. At the time, I was Director of Admissions at UTS, and I requested the use of some land upon which to build a labyrinth. A beautiful, serene spot was found by dowsing, and the task of drawing the design and building the labyrinth

It took Chris, myself and volunteers almost a year to complete the labyrinth. The design is outlined in bricks, two thousand five hundred of them - we became expert brick foragers. The grass path is wide enough for a lawn mower, which provides the added bonus of a labyrinth walk each time the grass is cut! We are in the process of creating a beautiful, interfaith meditation garden all around the labyrinth, with plantings, benches and statues. Historically, one of the earliest labyrinths found is carved into a Neolithic tomb in Luzzanas, Sardinia, dated around 2500 BC. Silver coins minted in Greece between 300 and 70 BC are imprinted with labyrinths, and the first known Christian labyrinth reaches back to a 4th century basilica in Algeria where the words "Santa Eclesia" (Holy Church) are found at the center. In Italy there is a 9th century wall labyrinth at the St. Lucca cathedral; Christians traced the pathway with their finger before entering. One of the most famous labyrinths is found in Chartres Cathedral in France (about an hour from Paris). It was built in the 12th century as a place of pilgrimage for Christians who could no longer travel to Jerusalem due to wars.

The sense of pilgrimage, of journeying to the center, taking time out from our busy lives to reflect, pray, and renew, is increasingly being recognized as necessary in our world today, thus explaining the recent resurgence in the building and walking of labyrinths. People are seeking inner peace and labyrinths provide a path to attain it that many can walk.

A neighbor who lives around the corner from us in Red Hook, walked the labyrinth for the first time a year ago. It was one week after her mother passed to the spirit world. She said, "it was the most incredible experience of my life. I absolutely felt my mother walking with me,

we talked to each other and she comforted me greatly. The sunset was gorgeous, like God personally painted the sky for us." She is now a frequent walker, and has brought her two grown daughters to walk with her. She has thanked me many times, with tears of gratitude, for building the labyrinth.

Working with the labyrinth has opened doors for me and provided many ways to substantially serve the community. Since October of last year I have facilitated labyrinth walks and made various presentations on labyrinths at numerous events including:

 Women and Spirituality Conference, Dutchess Community College, keynote address to 180 participants

• Community of Hope, group of 25 newly commissioned lay chaplains, Church of the Messiah, Rhinebeck

 Healing the Waters of the Earth, Tsunami Relief Labyrinth Walk, Interfaith Chapel, UTS

· Seeds of Transformation Conference, Bard College (provided a World Peace Labyrinth & educational display)

• Two newspaper interviews: Poughkeepsie Journal and the Middletown Times-Herald

• A proposal to a local hospital to build a labyrinth and healing garden (currently being considered)

• Retreats and monthly SoulPaths healing arts workshops at UTS

• Monthly full moon labyrinth walks, and other special occasion walks eg Earth Day, Summer Solstice, Autumn Equinox, Candlelight Vigil on 9/11, International Day of Peace-at UTS

The energy of the labyrinth and its positive effects on people's lives, including my own, continues to grow. I am deeply grateful for this calling and encourage you to come and walk the labyrinth at UTS, or to find a labyrinth near you, so you can experience yourself all labyrinths have to offer. 
The Vice Chancellor expressed his appreciation for the efforts made by

Religious Reconciliation in South Asia

t a Hindu ashram just outside Goa, India, interreligious harmony is thriving. In this small resort town, famous for beautiful beaches and mouth-watering cashews, the eleventh annual "All Religions Seminar for World Peace" was convened on March 20, 2005. Despite the historical religious rigidity and loathing that forced the British Raj to be divided between Hindu-dominated India and Muslim-dominated Pakistan at the end of WWII and the current tensions over the divided state of Jumma and Kashmir, this conference sought to reconcile these differences by seeking common ground and mutual understand-

The seminar organizer, Shri Sadguru Parwadeshwar, a Hindu, invited and

tures that were carried in a small replica of how Maharajas would have traveled in olden days. It was obviously meant to show deepest respect for these revered writings.

About five hundred people gathered under a tent at the ashram for the first part of the day-long seminar. At an octagonal fireplace (Yagna

Kund), the religious leaders threw rice and incense on the blaze to consecrated its flames. This added to the interfaith spirit of the seminar since fire universally represents truth, love, and divine light.

A press communiqué following

the seminar noted that the group agreed to promote peace within and between neighboring countries at regional as well as international levels and to support the efforts of regional and international bodies including, in particular, the United Nations in the field

of peace-making and

peace-building. In

addition, great impor-


tance was attached

to identification and elimination of the root causes of armed conflicts.

In conjunction with non-governmental organizations such as the Interreligious and International Peace Council and World Association of Non-Governmental Organizations as well as research bodies mentioned in the U.N. General Assembly resolutions such as the Independent Bureau for Humanitarian Issues, it was decided to develop a follow-up mechanism intended to spread the interfaith message of the seminar. In this context, special mention was made of the resolutions adopted by the U.N. General Assembly regarding the promotion of a New International Humanitarian Order which is urgently needed, particularly in view of global developments since the 9/11 events.

According to reports from the World Bank, this year India will replace South Africa as the nation with the largest number of AIDS/HIV infections. The Goa Resolution acknowledges the vital role that faith-based organizations must play in stemming the tide of this incurable disease by, "Support[ing] all possible measures to promote better health, spiritual as well as physical, and to take collective measures to prevent and control... the pandemic of HIV/AIDS."


In the evening a smaller program was



held in the Rajiv Gandhi Centre where the former Chief Minister, Mr. Ravi Naik, and the current Member of Parliament, Mr. Shripad Naik, attended. Concluding this part of the seminar an advocate from Goa, Mr. S. B. Patil, was given an award for his social services and, following this, the "Goa Resolution" was passed by consensus. The entire event was covered by the local press, including regional newspapers, All India Radio

and the Indian national television network, Doordarshan.

The promotion and consolidation of this South Asian Peace Initiative will be followed up at a conference in Washington DC where the principal participants of the Goa seminar intend to suggest and support practical measures which need to be taken in order to consolidate interreligious cooperation, as well as the physical and spiritual venues needed to establish world peace. ❖



sponsored two Muslim leaders: a Sufi saint from New Delhi and a former UN representative from Pakistan (all three are Ambassadors for Peace). In addition, one representative each from the Archbishop of Goa (even though this was Palm Sunday) and from the Interreligious and International Federation for World Peace attended, along with local political leaders and two women academicians.

The conference began with a religious procession, not celebrating personalities, but the sacredness of each faith's Holy Scripture. Three religious books, the Bhagavadgita, the Quran and the Bible, were carried in on a royal canopy by pallbearers.

Although the term pallbearer conjures up images of a funeral, the only thing laid to rest here was religious hatred and bigotry. To be precise though, at an interment the term pall refers not to the casket, but the cloth covering it. In fact, this word comes from the Latin pallium which is an ecclesiastical term referring to the robes worn by the Pope. This pall, or royal canopy, shaded the cloth-covered scrip-



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

SFP Global Youth Service Day

n our second year promoting Global National Youth Service Day, Service For Peace stepped up as a national lead agency in Japan and Mongolia, a national partner in the United States and a member of the International Coordinating Committee. We conducted over 70 projects that mobilized 4,151 volunteers in 20 countries—and the numbers are still coming in—a big increase over 2004, made possible in part by a series of grants made by Service For Peace to youth programs all over the world.

One of the striking features of the day as a whole was the unplanned but noticeable twin dynamic of diversity and interconnectedness. Young people in

San Diego raised thousands of dollars to send wheelchairs to injured and maimed children in the Holy Land while Muslim and Jewish children in Bet Shemesh, Israel, planted trees for peace and promised to work to build a better tomorrow. In several countries the focus was on basic health education and care for youth, ranging from a free clinic check up for a whole

village (Nepal) to instruction in proper tooth-brushing & dental care (Philippines), and even circumcision for young men (also Philippines).

Projects in London, Moscow, Bratislava and Hialeah, FL helped youth with disabilities. With the coming of Spring, many cities in America including Miami, Seattle, Oakland

and Chicago took the opportunity to plant seeds of community in public gardens or in fixing trails in city and state parks.

The day provided a strategic opportunity for Service For Peace to bring togeth-

er its global and national networks to advance the global peace perspective. In Cote D'Ivoire the project focused on resolving barriers between Catholic, Protestant, and Muslim youth organizations with three distinct goals: (a) to find the best ways to communicate and work together. (b) to educate youth about problems common to all faiths (c) To model responses to avoid conflict. In Shibuya, Tokyo, foreign students from Korea, China, Nepal, Mongolia, and Turkey joined Japanese students in the Global Youth Ser-

vice Forum to discuss how to create peace through ongoing service action.

An important theme in most locations was promoting a national culture of service through working together in close partnerships with national and local government officials. In Mangalia

ment officials. In Mongolia the project was co-organized with the municipal offices of the downtown districts of Sukhbaatar and Chingeltei, which helped it to be well covered by 5 TV stations, 5 newspapers and 3 radio stations.

Youth empowerment and transformative leadership were another integral part of the educational component of the service and learning experience. Each affiliate empowered youth leaders to work on the planning of the project on all levels including contacting government officials and promoting to the local community. Youth leaders provided examples of serv-

ice and introduced as participants either mentally or physically challenged youth, orphans, at-riskyouth or elementary school students to experience the transformative power of service and their own poten-

> tial as transformative leaders. Youth service leaders explored social justice issues and reached out to government officials to advocate for marginalized populations.

Of course there is room for improvement, too. Project themes tended to focus on

environmental issues tailored to the needs in many countries for an entry level service experience. While these were often identified by local officials as a compelling need, this also provided an important lesson to

offer suggestions of other types of successful programs and involve organizations at an earlier day to develop programs that can be part of a year round commitment to service.

Another important factor for success that became clear around the world was the essential involvement of business and corporate sponsors to offer not only financial support but also volunteers and help with planning. This is an area that needs more work for 2006.

aterloo, Iowa, held its monthly ACLC
Prayer Breakfast on Wednesday, May 4th, at the Ramada Inn. The theme was, "The Power of True Love to Heal our Families and Our Nation." As a member of the ACLC National Executive Committee, I had the honor to meet and share the vision of ACLC with our Iowa family.

On Tuesday, I was greeted at the airport by the Iowa ACLC Co-Convenor, Rev. Alan Jessen. We connected and immediately began to strategize. Rev. Jessen invited me to his home and I shared a wonderful dinner with him and his wife, Sis. Margaret Jessen. The evening went well as we shared testimonies about how we became involved in this divine movement. The Jessens have been a member of the family church for over 30 years and are still standing strong.

At the prayer breakfast on Wednesday morning, those in attendance included, Rev. Marvin Jenkins; Bishop Helen Seenster, who attended a True Family Values conference a few years ago; Rev. Daniel Phillips; Minister Michael Mohammad, who heard Father Moon speak in Iowa during his 50 state tour; Deacon Smith (a deacon at Rev. Jenkin's church), a lovely Japaneese missionary sister, and Sis. Margaret Jessen. Rev. Jessen gave the welcome, opening prayer, and future goals for ACLC of Iowa, which are to:

" Link to the national movement;

" Lift up the power of clergy and religious leaders:

After the prayer breakfast, we all had lunch together and continued the fellowship. After lunch Rev. Jessen and I visited pastors in the area. Of the pastors we met, one really stands out. Pastor Dwight Webster, director of Waterloo Urban Ministries, is the first African American to hold this position. After great dialogue, Rev. Jessen gave Rev. Webster "The Power of True Love" video and Rev. Webster asked if he could watch it with his wife. Inspired, Rev. Jessen and I both shouted, absolute-

The next morning while I was at the airport, Rev. Jessen called me on my cell phone and told me he had spoken with Rev. Webster. He shared with me that Rev. Webster and his wife were moved by the video and that for years they have been saying that Satan has been destroying our marriages and families. They want to be a part of ACLC of Iowa.

ACLC has taken on these major responsibilities, but it is all of our responsibilities - every faith, every religion, every race, every color, every creed, every state and nation - to rebuild the family, restore the community, renew the nation and the world. I believe the seed was planted in Waterloo, lowa this week and the peace kingdom is about to blossom. ��

urope is a land of conflict grounded in religious difference. Sweden's Per Olav Enquist notes that "half of Europe's wars, from the Monophystic struggles in the Roman Empire... to the German Empires' cultural battles in the 19th Century, had arisen from some sort of theological strife, and since the church was a state institution, it led to war."

The so-called "cultural differences" influencing anti-Constitution referenda have their roots in long histories of religious wars. Not only have they never been solved, they've never been addressed. In 1648 they began to be ignored.

This effort to ignore religion results in dominant European powers stumbling in the darkness, and tripping flatfooted over matters of religion. France, a massive player in EU politics was deemed in violation of International Law in its discriminatory headscarf ban, and likewise Germany has had the dubious distinction of being declared a human rights violator by numerous human rights watchdogs and organizations — most notably including the U.S. State Department, the United Nations Human Rights Committee, the Rutherford Institute, Human Rights Watch/Helsinki and the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe.

In Catholic Europe's largest dioceses in Germany, France, Italy, and Ireland, the percentage of Catholics who attend Mass regularly has slipped to as low as 20 percent, and in a few cities, like Paris, has reached as low as the single digits, according to figures compiled by the church. Yet pope John Paul II and the Vatican pressed for an explicit recognition of Christianity in the European constitution. Although that effort ultimately failed, the Pope staved resolute on the importance of the continent's Christian patrimony. "Whether or not it is recognized in the official documents," he said, "it is an undeniable fact, which no historian can overlook." Yet 15 million Muslims live in Europe, up to 3 times the number of Muslims living in America. 10 million Muslims live in France and

Only Radical Change Can Save the European Union

Germany alone, and Muslim Turkey remains in its 4th decade of seeking European status.

An EU is a wonderful idea. It should happen. Success in that effort would help the whole world. Unfortunately this cannot happen so long as it is pursued on the patently unworkable notion that a union of any sort can be built on purely economic and political designs.

One downside of trying to cobble political and economic unions together while remaining blind to the spiritual and religious aspects of "cultural" rootedness is that you end up with 60,000 word, 265 page constitutions. The United States constitution based as it is on a declaration of self-evident truths, that all men are created equal, ... endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights is one 12th the size.

In the United States the ideal of human equality is based on the assertion that we are created this way. Our rights are endowed by our creator. "Europe" on the other hand extracts rights and equality by drawing inspiration from the cultural, religious and humanist inheritance of Europe. Of the

25 "plenipotentiaries" affirming that human equality arises from Europe's inheritance, almost a third sign as his or her majesty or royal highness.

As Enquist notes, Europe has hosted and exported religious conflict from its earliest days, but worse for its well-being is its recent 400 year experiment of hoping that religion if ignored will go away.

Religious fighting decimated and exhausted Europe in the 17th Century. It tired people of religion, but left state churches in place. Religious tiredness and state churches continue in

Europe today, but the ascendant reign of the contra-religious intelligentsia never served to heal the ancient strife. Why? It is because healing division is itself a spiritual and religious act. That is the job of God and religion, to make things "one."

The United States has yet to realize perfectly its ideals of universal rights and human equality, but it remains a union of the most far ranging diversity in history. It is a union that begins with the plain and unabashed acknowledgment that equality and rights are endowed by a creator, not inspired by fractious threads of philosophical and ideological inheri-


All progressive and clear-thinking people should long to see a European Union. But, so long as the spiritual mission of "making things one," is misconceived as purely political and economic, and so long as religious hostilities and prejudices remain enshrined in the hearts of people, prospects remain near hopeless.

tance.

Enlightened religious leaders are needed to light the way out of this history. But how dark is their path in modern-day Europe? ❖














2nd Gen. Graduates Shine in Alabama


his was the 1st 7-day Tongll Moo-Do training in Nepal, which turned out to be quite successful. We started the training program from April 3 and concluded on April 10. There

Aside from the student seminar, the



Living in the Kingdom of God

own. After many years of trying, I know that only God can do this in my life. Hence the desperate need for prayer in my life. Also, I cannot do this without the help of a substantial Abel in my

It is much easier to obey an invisible God than to obey a visible Abel. It is so easy to say that I love God, but can I love the people I see every day, in my home, or my work, or my church?

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This article is about basics: the fundamental ideas all civilizations live by, and how they change over time. An earlier version of this article appeared in 1995.

vy League scholar Thomas Kuhn popularized the term 'paradigm' to denote technological foundations, and basic assumptions about the way things work. Popular usage has added social and spiritual elements to the concept, so it's perfect for our purposes.

What are some of these basic paradigms?

Let's begin with ideas about the world itself. Early civilizations spoke of a world resting upon a turtle's back, and Ptolemaics a spherical planet in the center of the universe. Galileo and Copernicus put the Sun in the middle, Shapley our Milky Way galaxy, then Hubble (of telescope fame) found countless receding galaxies. Now Hawking, Krauss, and others have modified cosmology yet again.

Mathematics has earned student complaints since Babylonian times, but actually it's gotten better over the millennia. Ever tried to calculate using Roman numerals? The concept of zero, and later the imaginary and infinite numbers, made a lot of difference. The most obscure and difficult equations keep surprising people with practical uses

Industry has gone though many revolutions. Primitive men who lived near oil seeps were annoyed when sticky tar got on their feet. When they learned how to build boats, the stuff became useful as calking. Little did they imagine that oil-fired motors would propel them across the water and land, and asphalt pave its pathways, much less hurl them through the very air. Space travel is still in its infancy, difficult now, but not forever.

We're all thankful for medical advances. Primitive man had no idea how the body functioned, and in case of illness or injury, gathered herbs and potions that trial-and-error showed efficacious. The Egyptians (along with most Asians) thought the human torso was the seat of our souls, and the brain so unimportant their diligent mummifiers would throw it away. DaVinci risked imprisonment to examine cadavers and gain some real understanding. Pasteur, Lister and others studied germs, and thus created modern medicine. Now medical science is advanc-

ing so quickly you'd have to read journals all day long, just to keep up.

Political freedom, taken for granted by so many, took ages to develop. Roving tribes, with a few dozen people at most, once clung to the strong and cleverest leader—or perished in a wild and harsh landscape. Walled cities allowed monarchs to live in splendor, and bonded thousands of citizens in common purpose, while bonding others in slavery. Later, Kings ruled widespread realms, exercising their whims by so-called divine right. Now democracy is spreading around the world. May its final success come with-

Religion has gone through stages. Vague animism dominated prehistory, then got replaced by a host of rambunctious pantheons. Zoroaster and Abraham introduced the concept of a single creator God. Jesus showed that God loves us as a father. Maimonides, Al-Kindi, Aquinas and others meshed science and philosophy with formal theology. Now Rev. Moon has shown that God suffers, and takes delight, right along with every one of us.

FUTURISTS

The overall concept of 'paradigms' implies that new and more comprehensive ones await, and that each will affect us in profound ways.

There are many speculations. Entire industries revolve around this, including futurist scholars, professional prognosticators, and the science fiction genre. At a recent conference I was privileged to hear several members of the World Futures Studies Federation. The public seems to enjoy all this. Star Wars keeps setting box office records, and books such as Megatrends are

Optimistic predictions have always been an American specialty. Back in 1893, and again in 1930, major Expositions were held with themes about the future. They depicted a larger USA, with towering cities and flying cars. All in all, they foresaw it pretty well.

Many 'versions' of the future are good, even ethereally beautiful. (Utopian.) Others are mediocre, with the same old drag in faster surroundings. (Unimaginative.) Some versions are dark, like Blade Runner or worse. (Dystopian.) We've been challenged by people who despise the future itself, and wish to recreate a Caliphate that flourished in imagined splendor a thousand years ago. (Retrotopian.) SF author Vernor

Vinge posits that, after certain key advances are made, everything changes, and the future becomes literally unknowable. (He termed it the Singularity, and perhaps it's a kind of technological Nirvana.)

One might generally describe the wonderful visions as 'Abel type,' and the uninspired or terrible ones as 'Cain type,' following the Divine Principle's general outline of human archetypes.

CHANGE

How do these amazing changes take place? Lots of people are busy right



now, mostly unrecognized, thinking and working hard to make them happen. On a policy level, one professor spoke of America as being, "A nation of talk shows, debating without answers." He said, "That is the democratic process; it works, though it is slow."

Oddly enough, the very idea of 'paradigm shifts' is that they're sudden and drastic events, inspired by a few rare geniuses, rather than gradual developments.

Is democracy the answer to everything? Any number of people could talk indefinitely, but somebody still has to come up with the correct answer. (In addition to scientific conferences, your author listens to lots of talk show debates.)

Plenty of amazing devices have been invented, and medicines tested, only to languish for a decade or more, before gaining acceptance. (Hopefully, but not always, within the inventor's lifetime.) Sooner or later the majority of people will understand, and do accept, new contraptions and concepts.

for scholars, these shifts are often generational in nature. In regard to exotic concepts such as quantum physics, Max Planck said, "Its opponents eventually die, and a new generation grows up that is familiar with it." One can hope that a Heavenly Nation would respond more quickly.

The term paradigm has become quite popular, and is frequently misused. In religion, every New Age guru claims to bring the new paradigm; an improved, if not ultimate, new Way. Most of them have books to sell, and often, things

far more costly.

Ideologies are subject to the same chicanery. As seen on many a Volkswagen bumper sticker, radical iconoclast Noam Chomsky has said, "Subvert the dominant paradigm." What he'd replace it with would, in practice, be really terrible.

CONCLUSION

Regular readers of this column can guess where I'm headed. You know who's introduced, not one, but many new paradigms. Who has been widely ignored by an uncomprehending,

or actively hostile, mainstream media and political leadership. Happily, clergy people, with hearts inspired, and scholars, committed to objectivity, are coming to recognize our Founder's contributions. Industry, science, ideology, theology, and many other spheres owe much to Rev. Moon, the Principle, and their followers.

How big of a paradigm shift does he dare propose? The world has many calendars, such as the Chinese, Jewish, Bahai, and Muslim versions. They're used for calculating cultural and religious holidays, while for business, darn near everybody uses the standard Gregorian calendar. If the entire world switched to an An Shin II type eight day week (perhaps Monday, then Moonday?), that would be a new social paradigm indeed.

The Principle's paradigm would be nothing less than the total heartistic transformation of individuals and society. In worldwide practice it might get watered down, but really that's up to us. Either way, it's big! So let us honor Rev. Moon, the ultimate futurist. ❖

our selfishness, laziness, greed, arrogance, pride, lying, lustfulness, desire for credit, showing off, insincerity, and so on, which is our common base with Satan. 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

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
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
